The proposed mission of the Washington Fruit Community Center is to foster inclusive participation by providing a variety of quality, fun and safe programs for people of all ages



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1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Yakima City Council directed City staff to bring back a proposal to Council to manage and program the Washington Fruit Community Center based on the Harman Center model, primarily using

City staff for management, allowing for third party partners and community input on all future programming to include budgetary impacts of the proposed change. Yakima Parks and Recreation has a long history of providing recreation programs and facilities for the city. Yakima Parks & Recreation had provided senior citizen programming for the Northeast section of Yakima starting in the early 1970's at the now Washington Fruit Community Center, however, the City received a \$4 million-dollar donation from the Harman Foundation to build a new senior center. The Harman Center was opened in 2004. This ended the senior programming at the Washington Fruit

Community Center. The Harman Center was built on

land donated by the Clevenger family which is now known as Gailleon Park. Yakima Parks and Recreation has also been providing recreation programming for children for many years. Much of the indoor youth programming has been within the Yakima School District buildings. The Beyond the Bell after school program for elementary age students began in 2010. Prior to the Beyond the Bell program, The Yakima Parks & Recreation Division utilized AmeriCorps workers to run programs at various Yakima Elementary Schools. Hoover, Adams and Garfield Elementary Schools housed these after school programs. The Yakima School District received a grant to provide programs within these schools utilizing their own staff. At that time Roosevelt Elementary School was chosen by the Yakima School District as the best location for the Beyond the Bell program. The Yakima Parks & Recreation Division has long been hoping to be able to return programs to the Northeast section of Yakima. Many of the children served by the Beyond the Bell program live in this area. Having a facility to program as needed to best serve the various populations is very desirable. Operating the Beyond the Bell program in another organization's facility has been frustrating at times, due to school functions taking precedent over Yakima Parks and Recreation programs. Moving the program to the Washington Fruit Community Center will eliminate these issues.

The proposed plan to operate within the Washington Fruit Community Center includes programming for seniors, children and adults.

In addition to programming of various types within the building, utilizing the community center to support outdoor activities in Miller Park would also become a possibility. Utilizing the center as a place for check in and registration for youth sports and recreation programs, like futsal, basketball, and soccer clinics would be easier. Another benefit of providing a wide variety of positive activities in a park is that the activities make

it a less desirable location for the negative activities that sometimes occur in and around the park and community center.

During the summer months, Yakima Parks & Recreation coordinates the Viva la Musica concert series which takes place in both Miller Park and Martin Luther King Jr. Park. The Viva la Musica concert series will be planned for the summer of 2021 and will occur, if permitted by the Yakima Health District. Continued events like the concerts and other events will help to increase neighborhood pride.

The Yakima Parks and Recreation staff are very excited about the possibility of having a place to call home and provide easily accessible and quality bilingual recreation and community benefitting programs for this area of Yakima for people of all ages.

2.0 PROPOSED MISSION STATEMENT

A mission statement has been created for the Washington Fruit Community Center. It is a work in progress and can be modified or rewritten when community input occurs.

"The mission of the City of Yakima's Washington Fruit Community Center is to foster inclusive participation by providing a variety of quality, fun and safe programs for people of all ages".

3.0 BRIEF HISTORY


The Washington Fruit Community Center was built in the early 1970's and served as the Yakima Parks and Recreation Senior Center at Miller Park until 2004 when the Harman Center opened. In 2004 the Yakima Police Athletic League was formed and operated programs for 4 years. There were also other organizations that operated programs at the center during that time.

Miller Park & Washington Fruit Community Center Location Map





6. SERVICE AREA AND NEIGHBORHOOD SURVEY AREA

During the Yakima City Council meeting on January 5, 2021, discussion included community input into the programming and services offered at the WFCC. Yakima Parks and Recreation conducts a community wide survey every five years as a part of the comprehensive master planning process required by the State of Washington in order to be eligible for grants to improve parks and purchase land for parks. The same process of surveying the community can be used to gather community input on programming. When allowed by the Covid – 19 guidelines, in person community meetings to gather additional information can occur. The planned survey area has been established to cover a total of 3.2 square miles around the center. The rationale is that people from within this area will be the families that will utilize the center the most.

The center will be open to all. Ample street parking and a 22 stall parking lot adjacent to the center will allow for many people to park close to the park and center.

- 3. To provide a support system for students' academic endeavors
- 4. To provide positive role models for children of all ages
- 5. To provide a positive alternative to gang and criminal involvement
- 6. To provide activities for senior citizens to learn new skills, engage with friends and receive positive social interaction
- 7. To provide a place for free senior citizen wellness programs Eg. Blood pressure checks
- 8. To provide a safe gathering place for all ages, helping to build strong multi-generational relationships
- 9. To allow participants to experience a greater understanding of diversity for the residents and neighbors at Washington Fruit Community Center
- 10. To give the community a safe and inclusive space to socialize and provide healthy activities and programs for youth and adults
- 11. To provide youth with positive guidance and personal development
- 12. To promote community pride, sense of ownership and a sense of belonging and demonstrate that neighborhood children and adults are a valued part of the community
- 13. To provide programs that will continually evolve to reflect the community's needs, preferences and desires
- 7.2 Goals, Objectives and Policies Yakima Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Master Plan

In the 2017 – 2022 City of Yakima Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Master Plan, goals, objectives and policies for the recreation area have been established. Many of the goals, objectives and policies directly correlate with the proposed operational plan for the Washington Fruit Community Center. 2.0.0 Goal: Provide active recreation programs that meet the leisure interests and needs of the community and offer a wide variety of other recreation opportunities to all the people of Yakima.


- 2.1.0 Objective: Utilize the 2017 2022 Comprehensive Plan Community Survey for program suggestions and ideas to meet the recreation interests of the community and to enhance the program opportunities and program quality.
- 2.1.1 Policy: Work cooperatively with local agencies, organizations, and special interest groups to support and enhance city recreation programs and services.
- 2.1.2 Policy: Encourage recreation staff to keep abreast of current and future recreation trends by attending professional conferences and workshops as budget allows.
- 2.1.3 Policy: Continually identify community interests and needs relating to recreation programs and services.
- 2.1.4 Policy: Evaluate the effectiveness of programs and activities through the use of questionnaires, surveys, and participation evaluation forms.
- 2.2.0 Objective: Collaborate with Special Olympics and other agencies serving special populations three times per year to provide more recreation opportunities for community members with special needs.
- 2.2.1 Policy: Establish new programs to meet the changing and expanding needs of older citizens and those with special needs.
- 2.2.2 Policy: Work with the Harman Center, Henry Beauchamp Jr. Community Center, and Yakima Police Athletic League/Washington Fruit Community Center to establish recreational programs and services at those sites.
- 2.2.3 Policy: Offer programs directly or by working cooperatively with the Yakima School District and other local agencies to provide a variety of activities for youth and teens with special emphasis on programs during after school hours and during summer months.
- 2.3.0 Objective: Communicate with culturally diverse leaders within the community to establish recreation programs to meet the needs and interests of the city's culturally diverse population.
- 2.3.1 Policy: Establish, coordinate and direct recreation programs for the city's culturally diverse population.
- 2.3.2 Policy: Establish and offer adult and youth special interest classes that are taught by bilingual individuals.
- 2.3.3 Policy: Establish bilingual promotional materials to encourage participation of Spanish speaking individuals in Parks and Recreation programs.

- 2.4.4 Policy: Provide users friendly access to park facilities and, when feasible, support those offering special events.
- 2.4.5 Policy: Encourage staff to become familiar with community programs and services in order to provide referrals and options to citizens.
- 2.5.0 Objective: Solicit sponsorships and donations to supplement the cost of recreation program delivery.
- 2.5.1 Policy: Establish collaborations and sponsorships with community service organizations and businesses to maximize the effectiveness of existing resources, to increase the affordability of programs and services and to bring Parks and Recreation services within the financial reach of all members of the community.
- 2.5.2 Policy: Develop opportunities for volunteer support of Parks and Recreation services and programs.
- 2.5.4 Policy: Develop scholarship programs for youth and low-income families.
- 2.6.0 Objective: Facilitate and support recreational services offered throughout the community by not for profit groups, service agencies, and/or faith-based organizations.
- 2.6.1 Policy: Share professional and, when available, financial resources to enhance recreational services to the people of Yakima.
- 2.6.2 Policy: Promote community access to recreational services by acting as a clearing house and promoting those services.
- 2.6.3 Policy: Create service delivery collaborations and partnerships with community groups and agencies.
- 2.7.3 Policy: Explore options for networking to provide community events.

8.0 ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

An organizational chart of current staff has been created. This organizational chart is the current chart under which the Yakima Parks and Recreation Division operates. No change to the organizational chart is needed. All positions on the chart are currently budgeted and filled. Additional staff would need to be employed, if the second summer playground program was established at Miller Park.

12.0 FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Many of the cost's associated with the proposed operation plan for the Washington Fruit Community Center are currently in the 2021 City of Yakima Parks & Recreation budget. Moving current staff and programs to the center will require no additional funding. The Beyond the Bell program is currently held at Roosevelt Elementary School. This program has not operated within the Yakima School District Elementary School since March of 2020 and will not be able to operate within the building until Fall of 2021 at the earliest. As an outside agency, the Yakima Parks & Recreation Division does not have first priority for the school facilities. The financial information below does not include funding for additional programs that could added in the future. Some new programs will provide revenue to offset costs.

13.0 PROGRAMMING

13.1 Youth Programs

The City of Yakima Parks & Recreation Division has a long history of youth programming. Currently, the Yakima Parks & Recreation Division has 2.75 FTE's dedicated to youth programs. Many temporary employees are also budgeted to assist with youth programming in addition to the Beyond the Bell temporary staff. These employees assist with sports camps and clinics and special events, such as the annual Easter Egg Hunt.

13.12 Beyond the Bell

The program description for Beyond the Bell is a program for school-aged kids that

allows them to explore stimulating, constructive and just plain fun things to do. The program is dedicated to providing affordable, convenient, high-quality out of school time programs with well supervised and enjoyable activities to ensure positive development. Yakima Parks & Recreation offers quality after school and summer programming concurrent with Yakima Public School schedules at designated locations. Students participate in engaging,



interactive exciting games and activities that keep their minds and bodies energized when they're not in school.

13.13 Beyond the Bell Program Statistics



The Beyond the Bell after school program statistical data for 2018 – 2019 are listed below. Due to school closure during the 2019 – 2020 school year, those statistics do not accurately reflect the population served. The Beyond the Bell program in 2019 – 2020 consisted of 63% Hispanic/Latino, 20% Caucasian/White, 3% Black, 10% Asian, 4% native. The children in the program are from many areas of Yakima. Many ride the Yakima School bus to Roosevelt Elementary School. Family members pick up their children at the end of the program time.

13.5 Program Costs & Fees

The Yakima Parks & Recreation Division makes every effort to keep programming costs as low as possible. Sponsorships, grants and donations have helped in assisting to keep costs

affordable. Whenever possible, volunteers are utilized to bolster program supervision. The Beyond the Bell Program utilizes kids that have "aged out" of the program to assist with the supervisor of the program. Youth sports programs also utilize volunteers and temporary staff, which are paid minimum wage for program operation. The Beyond the Bell program cost is \$3.00 per day. The program is from 3:00 pm to 6:00 pm Monday through Friday. Youth Sports programs vary in cost. Our Itty-Bitty Soccer program for children ages 4 to 5 costs \$36.00 for the 4 week program. Senior



Program costs at the Harman Center vary in cost also. Seniors can visit the center and socialize at no cost. A fee of \$1.00 is charged for a daily program participation. A quarterly fee for programs is \$12.00. Similar fees could be charged at the Washington Fruit Community Center.

14.0 FLOOR PLAN

The Washington Fruit Community Center has had renovations in the past and additional improvements are planned. Recently the restroom received a complete remodel and are in great condition. Planned improvements include a new roof and HVAC system. The funds have been received and are allocated for these improvements. KDA Architecture is currently under contract to complete the master planning process for the facility. Direction on the plans for the function of the building and

planned programs will assist with the master planning process. Community outreach meetings were planned to receive community input, but due to the pandemic, these meetings were not allowed. When gatherings are allowed, the community meetings can be held at the center. In its current condition, the building provides a wide variety of options for programming. Careful consideration will be made regarding the best function for each programmable space.

15.0 MILLER PARK PLANNED IMPROVEMENTS

Improvements are in process at Miller Park. Miller Park and the Washington Fruit Community Center will work in concert to provide additional programming for people to enjoy. Utilizing the Washington Fruit Community Center for storage of recreation equipment and provide park program participants with a restroom will be a key component of this proposal.



Miller Park Planned Improvements

In July, Alicia Garza, a local business owner, spoke with Mayor Byers in regards to starting a fundraising effort to make improvements to Miller Park. Mayor Byers provided Alicia Garza with contact information for the Yakima Parks & Recreation Division and a meeting at Miller Park was held on Tuesday, July 21, 2020. A group of Northeast business owners, parents, coaches, community leaders and basketball players met with Ken Wilkinson, Parks & Recreation Manager, at the park to identify their ideas for improving the park. An initial committee meeting was held on July 28, 2020 with the community members, Mayor Byers, Council Member Macias and staff. A purpose statement was created by the

group; "Revitalizing Miller Park as the Heart of the Community". A list of improvements was created by the group and ranked by priority. The number 1 & 2 priorities are to resurface and reline the basketball courts and provide lights for safety and to allow play to continue later in the evening. Some of the other identified improvements are a new restroom, a second picnic shelter, a new playground, added walkways, additional picnic tables and benches. Cost estimates were developed and shared with the group at the second meeting which was held on August 11, 2020. Three of the community members presented their ideas to the Parks & Recreation Commission on Wednesday, August 12, 2020. The Park & Recreation Commission was grateful to the group and supports their efforts. Nicole Donegan from the Field Group

joined the committee and created an

information and fund-raising brochure for the proposed park improvements. Another meeting was held on Monday, August 24, 2020 to provide more input for the information and fund-raising brochure. The brochure has been created and has been distributed to a variety of funding sources. The Yakima Streets Division removed and resurfaced one of the four courts in November. Parks and Recreation funds were used to pay for the materials for the resurfacing. The other three courts do not need to be removed. They just need to be recoated and relined. Information is being gathered and grant applications are

being prepared for submission to various organizations for the identified improvements. The Yakima Parks & Recreation Division is pleased to be working with another group of energetic and motivated community members that want to make improvements to a Yakima park. Miller Park is the first designated park in the City of Yakima and needs significant renovation. Miller Park has several amenities; four basketball courts, a dilapidated playground, a performance area, a spray park and a small picnic shelter. At one time, a swimming pool was located in this park, but was removed in 2005 due to its poor condition.

15.1 Project Need

As with so many parks and recreation departments around the State of Washington and the entire country, funding for improvements to parks is a challenge. The City of Yakima has faced these same struggles over the past many years and updates to parks, like Miller Park, have not been possible without the assistance of grants and donations. Fortunately, Yakima is a generous community and we have been able to complete some projects over the past years using alternative funding sources. Additionally, we have received grants from the State of Washington Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) to match donated and budgeted capital funds from the City of Yakima. Improvements to Miller Park is the next step in our renovation plans as identified in our 2017 – 2022 Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Master Plan, which has been approved and accepted by RCO. Miller Park is located in Northeast Yakima, which is an area with over 75% Hispanic population and 58% of the families living below the poverty line. Miller Park is the only green space and park within walking distance for many children and their families in a densely

populated area. The park is a place where many families gather, recreate and enjoy the great weather here in Yakima. Various events occur in the park throughout the year and the small picnic shelter and performance area are available for reservations by groups. The Yakima Parks & Recreation Division has hosted concerts and events in the park in years past, but due to the COVID – 19 crisis, no concerts or events were held in 2020. The basketball courts in the park are well used, but need to be repaired. In November, the City reconstructed one of the courts because it had deteriorated to a point of being a safety issue. The addition of lights for the basketball courts will assist in providing security for those utilizing the park. Lights have been added to the park in years past through a Yakima Police Department grant, but more lights are needed. The current playground is over 20 years old and finding replacement parts is becoming exceedingly difficult.

15.2 Planned Improvements & Costs

Utilizing the list of planned improvements identified by the community leaders, quotes for the costs of the project have been gathered and are identified below. The Yakima Streets Division has removed and resurfaced one of the four courts in November, due to its hazardous condition. The other three courts need to be recoated and relined.

15.22 Fundraising Efforts

Currently, fundraising efforts are underway. The Field Group assisted with the development of the informational brochure and the website. The Yakima Valley Community Foundation has agreed to receive the donations and assist with fundraising outreach. The website for the donated funds and information sharing is <u>restoremillerpark.org.</u> Service Clubs in Yakima have been approached regarding donations. Drew Harris, one of the community leaders driving the efforts, spoke to Yakima Southwest Rotary in November to present the fundraising opportunities. A grant of \$5,000 has been received from the Walmart Corporation.

15.23 Funding Request

The fundraising efforts will be ongoing. The project total estimated cost is \$651,880.53. A request of \$625,000 has been made to the State of Washington Office of Financial Management.

16.0 CONCLUSION

The Yakima Parks & Recreation Division is excited about the possibility of providing recreation programs and wellbeing services within the Washington Fruit Community Center as well as Miller Park. This opportunity will provide a space that can be called home and a place of pride within the neighborhood. The evolution of the programs and services offered through partnerships with third party organization is also exciting and bringing back vibrancy and activity to the Washington Fruit Community Center and Miller Park has amazing potential.








