CITY OF YAKIMA PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the Vietnam War was fought from 1961 to 1975, and involved North Vietnam and the Vietcong in conflict with United States Armed Forces and South Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, on March 30, 1973, the United States Armed Forces completed the withdrawal of combat troops from Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, the Vietnam War was an extremely divisive issue among people in the United States, and the members of the United States Armed Forces who served bravely and faithfully were, upon their return home, caught in the middle of public debate about involvement of the United States in the Vietnam War; and

WHEREAS, there were 1,123 members of the United States Armed Forces from Washington State killed or missing in action and more than 171,980 Vietnam-era veterans who live in Washington. Our nation stands together for their service; and

WHEREAS, the people of Yakima, Washington realize that one of our most fundamental obligations is to show respect and dignity to all who have worn the uniform of the United States, and to honor their sacrifice by serving them as well as they served us; and

WHEREAS, Washington passed legislation which was signed by Governor Jay Inslee in 2013 proclaiming March 30 of each year as Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day in our State; and

WHEREAS, the Yakama Warriors Association Veterans group of Toppenish has held annual ceremonies honoring Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans with keynote speakers, wreath laying, full military honors, 21-gun salute and taps at the Korean-Vietnam memorial within Sarg Hubbard Park.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Patricia Byers, Mayor of the City of Yakima and behalf of the Yakima City Council, do hereby proclaim March 30, 2024 as

"WELCOME HOME VIETNAM VETERANS DAY"

in the City of Yakima and encourage all residents to honor all Vietnam Veterans.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

1. Executive Session regarding pending litigation pursuant to RCW 42.30.110(1)(i)

MOTION: Brown moved and Deccio seconded to adjourn to Executive Session for 20 minutes to discuss pending litigation pursuant to RCW 42.30.110(1)(i). The motion carried by unanimous vote.

Present for Executive Session: Mayor Byers, Assistant Mayor Brown, and Councilmembers Berg, Deccio, Glenn, Herrera, and Roy.

Executive Session was held at 5:00 p.m. and adjourned at 5:20 p.m. The regular meeting was called back to order at 5:30 p.m.

2. Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Byers led the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. Interpreter Services

Mayor Byers introduced Jorge Villaseñor who announced interpreter services are available in Spanish.

4. Public Comment

Peter Rasmussen, City employee & President of IAFF, thanked Council for purchase of new reporting system for the Yakima Fire Department and stated concerns regarding the elimination of the public education position.

The following participants spoke in support of adjusting the Council boards and commissions structure, streamlining processes, enhancing efficiencies and removal of the Sustainable Yakima Committee and Community Integration Committee: Joel Ackeret, Dave Carson, Matt Clem, Frieda Stephens, Jenny Reed, Scot Stephens, Dana Johnson, and Roy Dove.

The following participants urged Council to reconsider the proposal to restructure the boards and commissions and expressed opposition of repealing the Community Integration Committee and Sustainable Yakima Committee: Coleen L. Anderson, Jennifer Gindt, Sandra Aguilar, Tiffany Pitra, and Frank Purdy.

City employees Brian Jones, IT Services; and Brenda Blakk, Water Division spoke regarding hiring practices and uncompetitive wages.

David Macias, City employee and AFSCME President, encouraged Councilmembers and City Manager to visit the various divisions and department throughout the City.

Charley Mulvey, Yakima resident, advocated for more trees in the community and distributed an article published in the Yakima Herald Republic regarding urban forests.

Natalie McLendon, spoke regarding the Council Rules of Procedures.

The public comment portion ended at 6:10 p.m.

ii. Washington Fruit Community Center (WFCC) Masterplan Presentation

Parks & Recreation Manager Ken Wilkinson presented the Washington Fruit Community Center (WFCC) Master Plan options identified by KDA Architecture. Completion of the plan allows the City to be eligible for state or other grant funding opportunities for potential improvements and future expansion of the facility. The three design options include:

- Minimalistic immediate repairs/improvements of existing facility
- Intermediate minor upgrade/remodeling of facility
- Grand major remodeling/expansion of facility

The cost estimates are dependent on the options provided and range between \$2 million and \$15 million. The Council did not take any action.

2. Public comment (allow 15 minutes)

Natalie McClendon, Yakima resident, spoke about the public comments portion of the previous Council meeting where some City residents were not allowed to speak due to lack of time and some non-City residents were allowed to speak.

Ron Pelson, Selah resident and Yakima business owner, commented that increases to building permit fees and the new energy code regulations are not helping with construction of affordable housing in Yakima.

Daniel Mohrbacher, Yakima resident & business owner, stated that existing AED batteries will expire in June and proposed a community collection of funds to assist with replacing them.

Communications & Public Affairs Manager Randy Beehler briefed Council on the history of the development and regulation of the public parking lots. Currently, maintenance of the downtown parking lots are supported by funds authorized through the formation of the Downtown Yakima Business Improvement District (DYBID) and the North Front Street businesses. In 2022, a parking study analysis recommended charging for parking to generate revenue for lot maintenance and improvements. During the COVID pandemic, enforcement of parking regulations were temporarily suspended and resumed in 2023 under the responsibility of the Yakima Police Department. In June 2023, business owners presented an alternative plan to the City Council which was adopted and ultimately implemented in the Fall of 2023. Due to additional concerns from downtown businesses and employees, City Council placed a moratorium on parking enforcement and a public meeting was held in January 2024 to receive input from the downtown community and allow for the development

of another plan.

City Engineer Bill Preston informed Council about the current condition of four downtown parking lots (Millennium Plaza, 2nd Street, Staff Sgt. Pendleton, and 1st Street at Crafted), revised rehabilitation proposals for each lot, and ongoing maintenance of the existing downtown parking lots. The revised maintenance proposal includes crack seal, fog seal (oil coating), sidewalk and curb repair, section repair and striping. The total maintenance proposal cost is approximately \$82,340 and the total stormwater drainage improvements amounts to approximately \$1,149,200.

Interim City Manager Dave Zabell outlined the major policy issues and provided preliminary options for the public's feedback and Council consideration. Option 1 is the major reconstruction of city-owned parking lots and is more expensive. Option 2 includes incremental repair and improvements to address failed areas, drainage systems, and regular maintenance and is more cost effective than a complete rebuild.

The following recommendations were presented:

- keeping the length of the free parking period at 2 hours;
- enforcement hours to be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.;
- retaining the cost of a monthly permit at \$50;
- reducing the parking infraction fine to \$20 per infraction;
- exploring a QR code option with the technology application; and,
- public education and consistent enforcement of on-street parking.

Council discussed the potential to provide warnings prior to citations being issued and the ability to add multiple users to permit passes. Staff proposed conducting another community meeting on March 21st to gather input and feedback from the community. A final proposal could be provided on March 26th and Council could take action on April 2nd.

4. Review of Property Maintenance Code Enforcement

Code Administration Manager Glenn Denman briefed Council on the Property Maintenance Code (IPMC) regulations and explained general enforcement strategies. He noted that previous codes resulted in confusion for staff and the public due to overlapping and varying requirements with similar case types. Mr. Denman addressed Councilmembers' concerns related to inoperable vehicles, pre-existing/non-conforming uses, anonymity of complaints, residential vs. commercial uses, tire disposal, graffiti, and pest elimination.

The following information and recommendations were proposed by staff:

- modify the definition to include "apparently" or "visibly" inoperable to prevent blight and accumulation of inoperable vehicles;
- pre-existing/non-conforming means that previously approved structures or uses can continue to exist without changes, even if codes change;
- requirement for complainants to provide contact information to prevent frivolous or malicious complaints and promote transparency;
- the IPMC does not distinguish between residential and commercial case types but there is a distinction between "habitability" within dwelling spaces;
- create an ordinance that requires tire dealers to obtain a regulatory license to prevent unauthorized accumulation and dumping of waste tires;
- graffiti is a public safety concern which is now addressed by the Refuse Clean City program; and,

• delete the section regarding pest elimination and instead regulate insanitary or other condition to prevent pest infestations.

Council further discussed extenuating circumstances, landlord/tenant issues, clear procedures specified in the ordinance, removing unlicensed vehicles from the inoperable classification, and expanding complaint and enforcement criteria. Staff will provide a follow up report to Council in the near future.

5. Adjournment

MOTION: Brown moved and Herrera seconded to adjourn to the next Council regular meeting on March 19, 2024, at 5:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers at City Hall. The motion carried by unanimous vote; Roy absent. The meeting adjourned at 7:08 p.m.

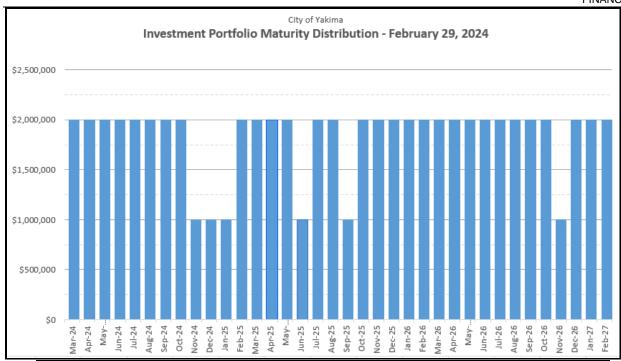

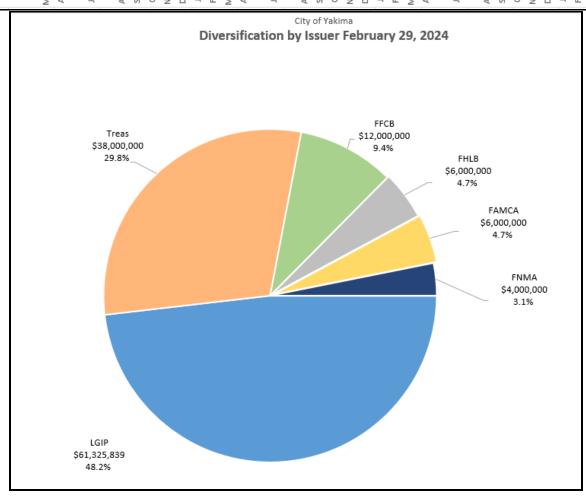

Disbursement Approval Process

Payment of claims and payroll are submitted monthly for review and approval by City Council. The payments listed in the schedule cover all claims and payroll payments during the month prior to the date of the Council meeting. Support documentation and further details are available from the Finance Division.

Internal Controls. The City's internal controls include certification of the validity of all payments by the appropriate department prior to submission for payment. The Finance Department has processes and controls in place to ensure review and validation of vouchers and authorization of payments by Finance, Accounts Payable, and Payroll staff. Processes are in place to empower Department Directors and the City Manager to have budgetary control over their responsible areas. The Director of Finance and Budget regularly reviews processes to ensure appropriate internal controls are in place and submits annually to an independent audit.

Governing Statutes. RCW 42.24 governs the process for audit and review of payroll and claims payments for the City. RCW 42.24.180 requires the review and approval of all payments at a regularly scheduled public meeting on a monthly basis.

RCW 42.24.080 requires that all claims presented against the City by persons furnishing materials, rendering services, or performing labor must be certified by the appropriate official to ensure that the materials have been furnished, the services rendered, or the labor performed as described, and that the claims are just, due, and unpaid obligations against the City.

RCW 42.24.180 allows expedited processing of the payment of claims when certain conditions have been met. The statute allows the issuance of warrants or checks in payment of claims before the legislative body has acted to approve the claims when:

- (1) the appropriate officers have furnished official bonds;
- (2) the legislative body has adopted policies that implement effective internal control;
- (3) the legislative body has provided for review of the documentation supporting the claims within a month of issuance; and
- (4) that if claims are disapproved, they shall be recognized as receivables and diligently pursued.

The City meets all these conditions.

WHEREAS, the City of Yakima (City) needs to relocate Russell Lane to align with the existing traffic signal at S 1st Street; and

WHEREAS, the Contract will be null and void if bond, certificate, and required insurance certificate and endorsement are not received within specified timeframe; and

WHEREAS, the Scope of Work and Budget included in this Contract meets the needs and requirements of the City for this project; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Yakima finds that entering into the Contract with Knobel's Electric Inc for construction of the Russell Lane Improvements Project 2650 is in the best interests of the City and its residents; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YAKIMA:

The City Manager is hereby authorized to execute a Contract with Knobel's Electric, Inc., attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, not to exceed Five Hundred Eighty-Four Thousand One Hundred and Twelve Dollars (\$584,112) to provide construction services for work outlined in the Contract at the intersection of South 1st Street and Russell Lane.

That in consideration of the terms and conditions contained herein and attached and made a part of this agreement, the parties hereto covenant and agree as follows:

I. The Contractor shall do all work and furnish all tools, materials, labor and equipment for THE BID AMOUNT OF: \$\frac{584,112.00}{}, for **Russell Lane Improvements, City of Yakima Project No. 2650,** all in accordance with, and as described in the attached specifications and the 2024 Standard Specifications for Road, Bridge, and Municipal Construction which are by this reference incorporated herein and made a part hereof, and shall perform any alterations in or additions to the work provided under this contract and every part thereof.

Work shall start within ten (10) days after the Notice to Proceed and shall be completed in forty (40) working days. The first chargeable working day shall be the 11th working day after the date on which the City issues the Notice to Proceed.

If said work is not completed within the time specified, the Contractor agrees to pay to the Owner the sum specified in the Standard Specifications for each and every day said work remains uncompleted after expiration of the specified time, as liquidated damages.

The Contractors shall provide and bear the expense of all equipment; work and labor of any sort whatsoever that may be required for the transfer of materials and for constructing and completing the work provided for in this contract and every part thereof, except such as are mentioned in the specifications to be furnished by the City of Yakima.

- II. The City of Yakima hereby promises and agrees with the Contractor to employ, and does employ the Contractor to provide the materials and to do and cause to be done the above described work and to complete and finish the same according to the attached plans and specifications and the terms and conditions herein contained and hereby contracts to pay for the same according to the attached specifications and the schedule of unit or itemized prices hereto attached, at the time and in the manner and upon the conditions provided for in this contract.
- III. INDEMNIFICATION. The Contractor shall release, indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents, representatives, insurers, attorneys, and volunteers from all liabilities, losses, damages, and expenses related to all claims, suits, arbitration actions, investigations, and regulatory or other governmental proceedings arising from or in connection with this Agreement or the acts, failures to act, errors or omissions of the Contractor, or any Contractor's agent or subcontractor, in performance of this Agreement, except for claims caused by the City's sole negligence.
 - a. Industrial Insurance Act Waiver. It is specifically and expressly understood that the Contractor waives any immunity that may be granted to it under the Washington State industrial insurance act, Title 51 RCW, solely for the purposes of this indemnification. Contractor's indemnification shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount of damages, compensation or benefits payable to or by any third party under workers' compensation acts, disability benefit acts or any other benefits acts or programs. Contractor shall require that its subcontractors, and anyone directly or indirectly employed or hired by Contractor, and anyone for whose acts Contractor may be liable in connection with its performance of this Agreement, comply with the terms of this paragraph, waive any immunity granted under Title 51 RCW, and assume all potential liability for actions brought by their respective employees. The Parties acknowledge that they have mutually negotiated this waiver.
 - Should a court of competent jurisdiction determine that this Agreement is subject to RCW

- 4.24.115, then, in the event of liability for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damages to property caused by or resulting from the concurrent negligence of the Contractor and the City, the Contractor's liability, including the duty and cost to defend, shall be only to the extent of the Contractor's negligence.
- c. Nothing contained in this Section or this Contract shall be construed to create a liability or a right of indemnification in any third party.

ARTICLE 3 SCOPE OF ARCHITECT'S BASIC SERVICES

- § 3.1 The Architect's Basic Services consist of those described in this Article 3 and include usual and customary structural, mechanical, and electrical engineering services. Services not set forth in this Article 3 are Supplemental or Additional Services.
- § 3.1.1 The Architect shall manage the Architect's services, research applicable design criteria, attend Project meetings, communicate with members of the Project team, and report progress to the Owner.
- § 3.1.2 The Architect shall coordinate its services with those services provided by the Owner and the Owner's consultants. The Architect shall be entitled to rely on, and shall not be responsible for, the accuracy, completeness, and timeliness of, services and information furnished by the Owner and the Owner's consultants. The Architect shall provide prompt written notice to the Owner if the Architect becomes aware of any error, omission, or inconsistency in such services or information.
- § 3.1.3 As soon as practicable after the date of this Agreement, the Architect shall submit for the Owner's approval a schedule for the performance of the Architect's services. The schedule initially shall include anticipated dates for the commencement of construction and for Substantial Completion of the Work as set forth in the Initial Information. The schedule shall include allowances for periods of time required for the Owner's review, for the performance of the Owner's consultants, and for approval of submissions by authorities having jurisdiction over the Project. Once approved by the Owner, time limits established by the schedule shall not, except for reasonable cause, be exceeded by the Architect or Owner. With the Owner's approval, the Architect shall adjust the schedule, if necessary, as the Project proceeds until the commencement of construction.
- § 3.1.4 The Architect shall not be responsible for an Owner's directive or substitution, or for the Owner's acceptance of non-conforming Work, made or given without the Architect's written approval.
- § 3.1.5 The Architect shall contact governmental authorities required to approve the Construction Documents. The Architect shall respond to applicable design requirements imposed by those authorities.

Preliminary selections of major building systems and construction materials shall be noted on the drawings or described in writing.
- § 3.2.5.1 The Architect shall consider sustainable design alternatives, such as material choices and building orientation, together with other considerations based on program and aesthetics, in developing a design that is consistent with the Owner's program, schedule and budget for the Cost of the Work. The Owner may obtain more advanced sustainable design services as a Supplemental Service under Section 4.1.1.
- § 3.2.5.2 The Architect shall consider the value of alternative materials, building systems and equipment, together with other considerations based on program and aesthetics, in developing a design for the Project that is consistent with the Owner's program, schedule, and budget for the Cost of the Work.
- § 3.2.6 The Architect shall review with the Owner an estimate of the Cost of the Work prepared in accordance with Section 6.3.
- § 3.2.7 The Architect shall submit the Schematic Design Documents to the Owner, and request the Owner's approval.

§ 3.3 Design Development Phase Services

- § 3.3.1 Based on the Owner's approval of the Schematic Design Documents, and on the Owner's authorization of any adjustments in the Project requirements and the budget for the Cost of the Work, the Architect shall prepare Design Development Documents for the Owner's approval. The Design Development Documents shall illustrate and describe the development of the approved Schematic Design Documents and shall consist of drawings and other documents including plans, sections, elevations, typical construction details, and diagrammatic layouts of building systems to fix and describe the size and character of the Project as to architectural, structural, mechanical and electrical systems, and other appropriate elements. The Design Development Documents shall also include outline specifications that identify major materials and systems and establish, in general, their quality levels.
- § 3.3.2 The Architect shall review with the Owner an update of the estimate of the Cost of the Work prepared in accordance with Section 6.3.
- § 3.3.3 The Architect shall submit the Design Development Documents to the Owner, advise the Owner of any adjustments to the estimate of the Cost of the Work, and request the Owner's approval.

§ 3.4 Construction Documents Phase Services

- § 3.4.1 Based on the Owner's approval of the Design Development Documents, and on the Owner's authorization of any adjustments in the Project requirements and the budget for the Cost of the Work, the Architect shall prepare Construction Documents for the Owner's approval. The Construction Documents shall illustrate and describe the further development of the approved Design Development Documents and shall consist of Drawings and Specifications setting forth in detail the quality levels and performance criteria of materials and systems and other requirements for the construction of the Work. The Owner and Architect acknowledge that, in order to perform the Work, the Contractor will provide additional information, including Shop Drawings, Product Data, Samples and other similar submittals, which the Architect shall review in accordance with Section 3.6.4.

- § 3.4.3 During the development of the Construction Documents, the Architect shall assist the Owner in the development and preparation of (1) procurement information that describes the time, place, and conditions of bidding, including bidding or proposal forms; (2) the form of agreement between the Owner and Contractor; and (3) the Conditions of the Contract for Construction (General, Supplementary and other Conditions). The Architect shall also compile a project manual that includes the Conditions of the Contract for Construction and Specifications, and may include bidding requirements and sample forms.

- § 3.4.4 The Architect shall review with the Owner an update of the estimate for the Cost of the Work prepared in accordance with Section 6.3.
- § 3.4.5 The Architect shall submit the Construction Documents to the Owner, advise the Owner of any adjustments to the estimate of the Cost of the Work, take any action required under Section 6.5, and request the Owner's approval.

§ 3.5 Procurement Phase Services (requires prior written authorization by the City to proceed)

§ 3.5.1 General

The Architect shall assist the Owner in establishing a list of prospective contractors. Following the Owner's approval of the Construction Documents, the Architect shall assist the Owner in (1) obtaining either competitive bids or negotiated proposals; (2) confirming responsiveness of bids or proposals; (3) determining the successful bid or proposal, if any; and, (4) awarding and preparing contracts for construction.

§ 3.5.2 Competitive Bidding (requires prior written authorization by the City to proceed)

- § 3.5.2.1 Bidding Documents shall consist of bidding requirements and proposed Contract Documents.
- § 3.5.2.2 The Architect shall assist the Owner in bidding the Project by:
 - .1 facilitating the distribution of Bidding Documents to prospective bidders;
 - .2 organizing and conducting a pre-bid conference for prospective bidders;
 - .3 preparing responses to questions from prospective bidders and providing clarifications and interpretations of the Bidding Documents to the prospective bidders in the form of addenda; and,
 - .4 organizing and conducting the opening of the bids, and subsequently documenting and distributing the bidding results, as directed by the Owner.
- § 3.5.2.3 If the Bidding Documents permit substitutions, upon the Owner's written authorization, the Architect shall, as an Additional Service, consider requests for substitutions and prepare and distribute addenda identifying approved substitutions to all prospective bidders.

(Paragraphs deleted)

§ 3.6 Construction Phase Services (requires prior written authorization by the City to proceed)

§ 3.6.1 General

- § 3.6.1.1 The Architect shall provide administration of the Contract between the Owner and the Contractor as set forth below and in AIA Document A201TM–2017, General Conditions of the Contract for Construction. If the Owner and Contractor modify AIA Document A201–2017, those modifications shall not affect the Architect's services under this Agreement unless the Owner and the Architect amend this Agreement.
- § 3.6.1.2 The Architect shall advise and consult with the Owner during the Construction Phase Services. The Architect shall have authority to act on behalf of the Owner only to the extent provided in this Agreement. The Architect shall not have control over, charge of, or responsibility for the construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures, or for safety precautions and programs in connection with the Work, nor shall the Architect be responsible for the Contractor's failure to perform the Work in accordance with the requirements of the Contract Documents. The Architect shall be responsible for the Architect's negligent acts or omissions, but shall not have control over or charge of, and shall not be responsible for, acts or omissions of the Contractor or of any other persons or entities performing portions of the Work.
- § 3.6.1.3 Subject to Section 4.2 and except as provided in Section 3.6.6.5, the Architect's responsibility to provide Construction Phase Services commences with the award of the Contract for Construction and terminates on the date the Architect issues the final Certificate for Payment.

§ 3.6.2 Evaluations of the Work

§ 3.6.2.1 The Architect shall visit the site at intervals appropriate to the stage of construction, or as otherwise required in Section 4.2.3, to become generally familiar with the progress and quality of the portion of the Work completed, and to determine, in general, if the Work observed is being performed in a manner indicating that the Work, when fully completed, will be in accordance with the Contract Documents. However, the Architect shall not be required to make

exhaustive or continuous on-site observations or any inspections to check the quality or quantity of the Work. On the basis of the site visits, the Architect shall keep the Owner reasonably informed about the progress and quality of the portion of the Work completed, and promptly report to the Owner (1) known deviations from the Contract Documents, (2) known deviations from the most recent construction schedule submitted by the Contractor, and (3) defects and deficiencies observed in the Work.

- § 3.6.2.2 The Architect will consult with the Owner concerning whether to reject Work that does not conform to the Contract Documents that comes to the attention of the Architect. Whenever the Architect considers it necessary or advisable, the Architect shall have the authority to require inspection or testing of the Work in accordance with the provisions of the Contract Documents, whether or not the Work is fabricated, installed or completed. However, neither this authority of the Architect nor a decision made in good faith either to exercise or not to exercise such authority shall give rise to a duty or responsibility of the Architect to the Contractor, Subcontractors, suppliers, their agents or employees, or other persons or entities performing portions of the Work.
- § 3.6.2.3 The Architect shall interpret and decide matters concerning performance under, and requirements of, the Contract Documents on written request of either the Owner or Contractor. The Architect's response to such requests shall be made in writing within any time limits agreed upon or otherwise with reasonable promptness.
- § 3.6.2.4 Interpretations and recommendations of the Architect shall be consistent with the intent of, and reasonably inferable from, the Contract Documents and shall be in writing or in the form of drawings. When making such interpretations and recommendations, the Architect shall endeavor to secure faithful performance by both Owner and Contractor, shall not show partiality to either, and shall not be liable for results of interpretations or recommendations rendered in good faith. The Architect and Owner will review matters relating to aesthetic effect and the Owner will make any final decisions on these matters with the intent expressed in the Contract Documents.
- § 3.6.2.5 Unless the Owner and Contractor designate another person to serve as an Initial Decision Maker, as that term is defined in AIA Document A201-2017, the Architect shall render initial decisions on Claims between the Owner and Contractor as provided in the Contract Documents.

§ 3.6.3 Certificates for Payment to Contractor

- § 3.6.3.1 The Architect shall review and certify the amounts due the Contractor and shall issue certificates in such amounts. The Architect's certification for payment shall constitute a representation to the Owner, based on the Architect's evaluation of the Work as provided in Section 3.6.2 and on the data comprising the Contractor's Application for Payment, that, to the best of the Architect's knowledge, information and belief, the Work has progressed to the point indicated as reviewed against the agreed upon schedule of values, the quality of the Work is in accordance with the Contract Documents, and that the Contractor is entitled to payment in the amount certified. The foregoing representations are subject to (1) an evaluation of the Work for conformance with the Contract Documents upon Substantial Completion, (2) results of subsequent tests and inspections, (3) correction of minor deviations from the Contract Documents prior to completion, and (4) specific qualifications expressed by the Architect.
- § 3.6.3.2 The issuance of a Certificate for Payment shall not be a representation that the Architect has (1) made exhaustive or continuous on-site observations or any inspections to check the quality or quantity of the Work, (2) reviewed construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures, (3) reviewed copies of requisitions received from Subcontractors and suppliers and other data requested by the Owner to substantiate the Contractor's right to payment, or (4) ascertained how or for what purpose the Contractor has used money previously paid on account of the Contract Sum.
- § 3.6.3.3 The Architect shall maintain a record of the Applications and Certificates for Payment.

§ 3.6.4 Submittals

§ 3.6.4.1 The Architect shall review the Contractor's submittal schedule and shall not unreasonably delay or withhold approval of the schedule. The Architect's action in reviewing submittals shall be taken in accordance with the approved submittal schedule or, in the absence of an approved submittal schedule, with reasonable promptness while allowing sufficient time, in the Architect's professional judgment, to permit adequate review.

- § 3.6.4.2 The Architect shall review and take other appropriate action upon, the Contractor's submittals such as Shop Drawings, Product Data and Samples, but only for the limited purpose of checking for conformance with information given and the design concept expressed in the Contract Documents. Review of such submittals is not for the purpose of determining the accuracy and completeness of other information such as dimensions, quantities, and installation or performance of equipment or systems, which are the Contractor's responsibility. The Architect's review shall not constitute review of or approval of safety precautions or construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures. The Architect's review of a specific item shall not indicate review of or approval of an assembly of which the item is a component.
- § 3.6.4.3 If the Contract Documents specifically require the Contractor to provide professional design services or certifications by a design professional related to systems, materials, or equipment, the Architect shall specify the appropriate performance and design criteria that such services must satisfy. The Architect shall review and take appropriate action on Shop Drawings and other submittals related to the Work designed or certified by the Contractor's design professional, provided the submittals bear such professional's seal and signature when submitted to the Architect. The Architect's review shall be for the limited purpose of checking for conformance with information given and the design concept expressed in the Contract Documents. The Architect shall be entitled to rely upon, and shall not be responsible for, the adequacy and accuracy of the services, certifications, and approvals performed or provided by such design professionals.
- § 3.6.4.4 Subject to Section 4.2, the Architect shall review and respond to requests for information about the Contract Documents. The Architect shall set forth, in the Contract Documents, the requirements for requests for information. Requests for information shall include, at a minimum, a detailed written statement that indicates the specific Drawings or Specifications in need of clarification and the nature of the clarification requested. The Architect's response to such requests shall be made in writing within any time limits agreed upon, or otherwise with reasonable promptness. If appropriate, the Architect shall prepare and issue supplemental Drawings and Specifications in response to the requests for information.
- § 3.6.4.5 The Architect shall maintain a record of submittals and copies of submittals supplied by the Contractor in accordance with the requirements of the Contract Documents.

§ 3.6.5 Changes in the Work

- § 3.6.5.1 The Architect may order minor changes in the Work that are consistent with the intent of the Contract Documents and do not involve an adjustment in the Contract Sum or an extension of the Contract Time, subject to approval by the Owner. Subject to Section 4.2, the Architect shall prepare Change Orders and Construction Change Directives for the Owner's approval and execution in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- § 3.6.5.2 The Architect shall maintain records relative to changes in the Work.

§ 3.6.6 Project Completion

- § 3.6.6.1 The Architect shall:
 - conduct field reviews to determine the date or dates of Substantial Completion and the date of final completion;
 - .2 issue Certificates of Substantial Completion;
 - .3 forward to the Owner, for the Owner's review and records, written warranties and related documents required by the Contract Documents and received from the Contractor; and,
 - issue a final Certificate for Payment based upon a final inspection indicating that, to the best of the Architect's knowledge, information, and belief, the Work complies with the requirements of the Contract Documents.
- § 3.6.6.2 The Architect's field reviews shall be conducted with the Owner to check conformance of the Work with the requirements of the Contract Documents and to verify the accuracy and completeness of the list submitted by the Contractor of Work to be completed or corrected.
- § 3.6.6.3 When Substantial Completion has been achieved, the Architect shall inform the Owner about the balance of the Contract Sum remaining to be paid the Contractor, including the amount to be retained from the Contract Sum, if any, for final completion or correction of the Work.

§ 3.6.6.4 The Architect shall forward to the Owner the following information received from the Contractor: (1) consent of surety or sureties, if any, to reduction in or partial release of retainage or the making of final payment; (2) affidavits, receipts, releases and waivers of liens, or bonds indemnifying the Owner against liens; and (3) any other documentation required of the Contractor under the Contract Documents.

§ 3.6.6.5 Upon request of the Owner, and prior to the expiration of one year from the date of Substantial Completion, the Architect shall, without additional compensation, conduct a meeting with the Owner to review the facility operations and performance.

ARTICLE 4 SUPPLEMENTAL AND ADDITIONAL SERVICES

§ 4.1 Supplemental Services

§ 4.1.1 The services listed below are not included in Basic Services but may be required for the Project. The Architect shall provide the listed Supplemental Services only if specifically designated in the table below as the Architect's responsibility, and the Owner shall compensate the Architect as provided in Section 11.2. Unless otherwise specifically addressed in this Agreement, if neither the Owner nor the Architect is designated, the parties agree that the listed Supplemental Service is not being provided for the Project.

§ 4.1.3 If the Owner identified a Sustainable Objective in Article 1, the Architect shall provide, as a Supplemental Service, the Sustainability Services required in AIA Document E204TM–2017, Sustainable Projects Exhibit, attached to this Agreement. The Owner shall compensate the Architect as provided in Section 11.2.

§ 4.2 Architect's Additional Services (see also SECTION 2.2 of the prime Agreement for Professional Services)

The Architect may provide Additional Services after execution of this Agreement without invalidating the Agreement. Except for services required due to the fault of the Architect, any Additional Services provided in accordance with this Section 4.2 shall entitle the Architect to compensation pursuant to Section 11.3 and an appropriate adjustment in the Architect's schedule.

§ 4.2.1 Upon recognizing the need to perform the following Additional Services, the Architect shall notify the Owner with reasonable promptness and explain the facts and circumstances giving rise to the need. The Architect shall not proceed to provide the following Additional Services until the Architect receives the Owner's written authorization:

- .1 Services necessitated by a change in the Initial Information, previous instructions or approvals given by the Owner, or a material change in the Project including size, quality, complexity, the Owner's schedule or budget for Cost of the Work, or procurement or delivery method;
- .2 Services necessitated by the enactment or revision of codes, laws, or regulations, including changing or editing previously prepared Instruments of Service;
- .3 Changing or editing previously prepared Instruments of Service necessitated by official interpretations of applicable codes, laws or regulations that are either (a) contrary to specific interpretations by the applicable authorities having jurisdiction made prior to the issuance of the building permit, or (b) contrary to requirements of the Instruments of Service when those Instruments of Service were prepared in accordance with the applicable standard of care;
- Services necessitated by decisions of the Owner not rendered in a timely manner or any other failure of .4 performance on the part of the Owner or the Owner's consultants or contractors;
- Preparing digital models or other design documentation for transmission to the Owner's consultants and contractors, or to other Owner-authorized recipients;
- .6 Preparation of design and documentation for alternate bid or proposal requests proposed by the Owner;
- .7 Preparation for, and attendance at, a public presentation, meeting or hearing;
- 8. Preparation for, and attendance at, a dispute resolution proceeding or legal proceeding, except where the Architect is party thereto;
- .9 Evaluation of the qualifications of entities providing bids or proposals;
- .10 Consultation concerning replacement of Work resulting from fire or other cause during construction;
- .11 Assistance to the Initial Decision Maker, if other than the Architect.
- § 4.2.2 To avoid delay in the Construction Phase, the Architect shall offer the following Additional Services, notify the Owner with reasonable promptness, and explain the facts and circumstances giving rise to the need. If, the Additional Services offered are approved by the Owner, the Owner shall give prompt written notice to the Architect of the Owner's determination. The Owner shall compensate the Architect for the services provided per Article 11.
 - .1 Reviewing a Contractor's submittal out of sequence from the submittal schedule approved by the Architect;
 - .2 Responding to the Contractor's requests for information that are not prepared in accordance with the Contract Documents or where such information is available to the Contractor from a careful study and comparison of the Contract Documents, field conditions, other Owner-provided information, Contractor-prepared coordination drawings, or prior Project correspondence or documentation;
 - .3 Preparing Change Orders and Construction Change Directives that require evaluation of Contractor's proposals and supporting data, or the preparation or revision of Instruments of Service;
 - Evaluating an extensive number of Claims as the Initial Decision Maker; or, .4
 - .5 Evaluating substitutions proposed by the Owner or Contractor and making subsequent revisions to Instruments of Service resulting therefrom.
- § 4.2.3 The Architect shall provide Construction Phase Services exceeding the limits set forth below as Additional Services. When the limits below are reached, the Architect shall notify the Owner:
 - .1 Two (2) reviews of each Shop Drawing, Product Data item, sample and similar submittals of the Contractor.
 - .2 Refer to Exhibit B for number of visits to the site by the Architect and Consultants.
 - One (1) field reviews for any portion of the Work to determine whether such portion of the Work is substantially complete in accordance with the requirements of the Contract Documents (one punchlist
 - One (1) field reviews for any portion of the Work to determine final completion (one punchlist backcheck review).
- § 4.2.4 Except for services required under Section 3.6.6.5 and those services that do not exceed the limits set forth in Section 4.2.3, Construction Phase Services provided more than 60 days after (1) the date of Substantial Completion of the Work or (2) the initial date of Substantial Completion identified in the agreement between the Owner and Contractor, whichever is earlier, shall be compensated as Additional Services to the extent the Architect incurs additional cost in providing those Construction Phase Services.

- § 4.2.5 If the services covered by this Agreement have not been completed within twenty-four (24) months of the date of this Agreement, through no fault of the Architect, extension of the Architect's services beyond that time shall be compensated as Additional Services.
- OWNER'S RESPONSIBILITIES (see also SECTION 4 of the prime Agreement for Professional Services) § 5.1 Unless otherwise provided for under this Agreement, the Owner shall provide information in a timely manner regarding requirements for and limitations on the Project, including a written program, which shall set forth the Owner's objectives; schedule; constraints and criteria, including space requirements and relationships; flexibility; expandability; special equipment; systems; and site requirements.
- § 5.2 The Owner shall establish the Owner's budget for the Project, including (1) the budget for the Cost of the Work as defined in Section 6.1; (2) the Owner's other costs; and, (3) reasonable contingencies related to all of these costs. The Owner shall update the Owner's budget for the Project as necessary throughout the duration of the Project until final completion. If the Owner significantly increases or decreases the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work, the Owner shall notify the Architect. The Owner and the Architect shall thereafter agree to a corresponding change in the Project's scope and quality.
- § 5.3 The Owner shall identify a representative authorized to act on the Owner's behalf with respect to the Project. The Owner shall render decisions and approve the Architect's submittals in a timely manner in order to avoid unreasonable delay in the orderly and sequential progress of the Architect's services.
- § 5.4 The Owner shall provide the Supplemental Services designated as the Owner's responsibility in Section 4.1.1.
- § 5.5 The Owner shall coordinate the services of its own consultants with those services provided by the Architect. Upon the Architect's request, the Owner shall furnish copies of the scope of services in the contracts between the Owner and the Owner's consultants. The Owner shall furnish the services of consultants other than those designated as the responsibility of the Architect in this Agreement, or authorize the Architect to furnish them as an Additional Service, when the Architect requests such services and demonstrates that they are reasonably required by the scope of the Project. The Owner shall require that its consultants and contractors maintain insurance, including professional liability insurance, as appropriate to the services or work provided.
- § 5.6 The Owner shall furnish tests, inspections and reports required by law or the Contract Documents, such as structural, mechanical, and chemical tests, tests for air and water pollution, and tests for hazardous materials.
- § 5.7 The Owner shall furnish all legal, insurance and accounting services, including auditing services, that may be reasonably necessary at any time for the Project to meet the Owner's needs and interests.
- § 5.8 The Owner shall provide prompt written notice to the Architect if the Owner becomes aware of any fault or defect in the Project, including errors, omissions or inconsistencies in the Architect's Instruments of Service.
- § 5.9 The Owner shall include the Architect in all communications with the Contractor that relate to or affect the Architect's services or professional responsibilities. The Owner shall promptly notify the Architect of the substance of any direct communications between the Owner and the Contractor otherwise relating to the Project. Communications by and with the Architect's consultants shall be through the Architect.
- § 5.10 Before executing the Contract for Construction, the Owner shall coordinate the Architect's duties and responsibilities set forth in the Contract for Construction with the Architect's services set forth in this Agreement. The Owner shall provide the Architect a copy of the executed agreement between the Owner and Contractor, including the General Conditions of the Contract for Construction.
- § 5.11 The Owner shall provide the Architect access to the Project site prior to commencement of the Work and shall obligate the Contractor to provide the Architect access to the Work wherever it is in preparation or progress.
- § 5.12 Within 15 days after receipt of a written request from the Architect, the Owner shall furnish the requested information as necessary and relevant for the Architect to evaluate, give notice of, or enforce lien rights.

(Paragraphs deleted)

ARTICLE 6 COST OF THE WORK

- § 6.1 For purposes of this Agreement, the Cost of the Work shall be the total cost to the Owner to construct all elements of the Project designed or specified by the Architect and shall include contractors' general conditions costs, overhead and profit. The Cost of the Work also includes the reasonable value of labor, materials, and equipment, donated to, or otherwise furnished by, the Owner. The Cost of the Work does not include the compensation of the Architect; the costs of the land, rights-of-way, financing, sales tax or contingencies for changes in the Work; or other costs that are the responsibility of the Owner.
- § 6.2 The Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work is provided in Initial Information, and shall be adjusted throughout the Project as required under Sections 5.2, 6.4 and 6.5. The Architect's evaluations of the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work, and the preliminary estimate of the Cost of the Work and updated estimates of the Cost of the Work, prepared by the Architect, represent the Architect's best judgment as a design professional. It is recognized, however, that neither the Architect nor the Owner has control over the cost of labor, materials, or equipment; the Contractor's methods of determining bid prices; or competitive bidding, market, or negotiating conditions. Accordingly, the Architect cannot and does not warrant or represent that bids or negotiated prices will not vary from the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work, or from any estimate of the Cost of the Work, or evaluation, prepared or agreed to by the Architect.
- § 6.3 In preparing estimates of the Cost of Work, the Architect shall be permitted to include contingencies for design, bidding, and price escalation; to determine what materials, equipment, component systems, and types of construction are to be included in the Contract Documents; to recommend reasonable adjustments in the program and scope of the Project; and to include design alternates as may be necessary to adjust the estimated Cost of the Work to meet the Owner's budget. The Architect's estimate of the Cost of the Work shall be based on current area, volume or similar conceptual estimating techniques. If the Owner requires a detailed estimate of the Cost of the Work, the Architect shall provide such an estimate, if identified as the Architect's responsibility in Section 4.1.1, as a Supplemental Service.
- § 6.4 If, through no fault of the Architect, the Procurement Phase has not commenced within 90 days after the Architect submits the Construction Documents to the Owner, the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work shall be adjusted to reflect changes in the general level of prices in the applicable construction market.
- § 6.5 If at any time the Architect's estimate of the Cost of the Work exceeds the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work, the Architect shall make appropriate recommendations to the Owner to adjust the Project's size, quality, or budget for the Cost of the Work, and the Owner shall cooperate with the Architect in making such adjustments.
- § 6.6 If the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work (including the \$1,200,000 allowance for an increase in the MACC) at the conclusion of the Construction Documents Phase Services is exceeded by the lowest bona fide bid or negotiated proposal, the Owner shall
 - .1 give written approval of an increase in the budget for the Cost of the Work;
 - authorize rebidding or renegotiating of the Project within a reasonable time;
 - .3 terminate in accordance with Section 9.5;
 - in consultation with the Architect, revise the Project program, scope, or quality as required to reduce the Cost of the Work; or,
 - .5 implement any other mutually acceptable alternative.
- § 6.7 If the Owner chooses to proceed under Section 6.6.4, the Architect shall modify the Construction Documents as necessary to comply with the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work at the conclusion of the Construction Documents Phase Services, or the budget as adjusted under Section 6.6.1. If the Owner requires the Architect to modify the Construction Documents because the lowest bona fide bid or negotiated proposal exceeds the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work due to market conditions the Architect could not reasonably anticipate, the Owner shall compensate the Architect for the modifications as an Additional Service pursuant to Section 11.3; otherwise the Architect's services for modifying the Construction Documents shall be without additional compensation. In any event, the Architect's modification of the Construction Documents shall be the limit of the Architect's responsibility under this Article 6.

ARTICLE 7 COPYRIGHTS AND LICENSES (see also SECTION 9 of the prime Agreement for Professional Services) § 7.1 The Architect and the Owner warrant that in transmitting Instruments of Service, or any other information, the

transmitting party is the copyright owner of such information or has permission from the copyright owner to transmit such information for its use on the Project.

- § 7.2 The Architect and the Architect's consultants shall be deemed the authors of their respective Instruments of Service, including the Drawings and Specifications, and shall retain all common law, statutory and other reserved rights, including copyrights. Submission or distribution of Instruments of Service to meet official regulatory requirements or for similar purposes in connection with the Project is not to be construed as publication in derogation of the reserved rights of the Architect and the Architect's consultants.
- § 7.3 The Architect grants to the Owner a nonexclusive license to use the Architect's Instruments of Service solely and exclusively for purposes of constructing, using, maintaining, altering and adding to the Project, provided that the Owner substantially performs its obligations under this Agreement, including prompt payment of all sums due pursuant to Article 9 and Article 11. The Architect shall obtain similar nonexclusive licenses from the Architect's consultants consistent with this Agreement. The license granted under this section permits the Owner to authorize the Contractor, Subcontractors, Sub-subcontractors, and suppliers, as well as the Owner's consultants and separate contractors, to reproduce applicable portions of the Instruments of Service, subject to any protocols established pursuant to Section 1.3, solely and exclusively for use in performing services or construction for the Project. If the Architect rightfully terminates this Agreement for cause as provided in Section 9.4, the license granted in this Section 7.3 shall terminate.
- § 7.3.1 In the event the Owner uses the Instruments of Service for any purpose following final completion of construction of the Project or following a termination of this Agreement when the Architect is not in default, the Owner releases the Architect and Architect's consultant(s) from all claims and causes of action arising from such uses. The Owner, to the extent permitted by law, further agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Architect and its consultants from all costs and expenses, including the cost of defense, related to claims and causes of action asserted by any third person or entity to the extent such costs and expenses arise from the Owner's use of the Instruments of Service under this Section 7.3.1. The terms of this Section 7.3.1 shall not apply if the Owner rightfully terminates this Agreement for cause under Section 9.4.
- § 7.4 Except for the licenses granted in this Article 7, no other license or right shall be deemed granted or implied under this Agreement. The Owner shall not assign, delegate, sublicense, pledge or otherwise transfer any license granted herein to another party without the prior written agreement of the Architect. Any unauthorized use of the Instruments of Service shall be at the Owner's sole risk and without liability to the Architect and the Architect's consultants.
- § 7.5 Except as otherwise stated in Section 7.3, the provisions of this Article 7 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 8 CLAIMS AND DISPUTES (see also SECTION 19 of the prime Agreement for Professional Services) § 8.1 General

- § 8.1.1 The Owner and Architect shall commence all claims and causes of action against the other and arising out of or related to this Agreement, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, in accordance with the requirements of the binding dispute resolution method selected in this Agreement and within the period specified by applicable law, but in any case not more than 10 years after the date of Substantial Completion of the Work. The Owner and Architect waive all claims and causes of action not commenced in accordance with this Section 8.1.1.
- § 8.1.2 To the extent damages are covered by property insurance, the Owner and Architect waive all rights against each other and against the contractors, consultants, agents, and employees of the other for damages, except such rights as they may have to the proceeds of such insurance as set forth in AIA Document A201–2017, General Conditions of the Contract for Construction. The Owner or the Architect, as appropriate, shall require of the contractors, consultants, agents, and employees of any of them, similar waivers in favor of the other parties enumerated herein.

§ 8.2 Mediation

- § 8.2.1 Any claim, dispute or other matter in question arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be subject to mediation as a condition precedent to binding dispute resolution. If such matter relates to or is the subject of a lien arising out of the Architect's services, the Architect may proceed in accordance with applicable law to comply with the lien notice or filing deadlines prior to resolution of the matter by mediation or by binding dispute resolution.
- § 8.2.2 The Owner and Architect shall endeavor to resolve claims, disputes and other matters in question between them by mediation, which, unless the parties mutually agree otherwise, shall be administered by the American Arbitration Association in accordance with its Construction Industry Mediation Procedures in effect on the date of this Agreement. A request for mediation shall be made in writing, delivered to the other party to this Agreement, and filed with the person or entity administering the mediation. The request may be made concurrently with the filing of a complaint or other appropriate demand for binding dispute resolution but, in such event, mediation shall proceed in advance of binding dispute resolution proceedings, which shall be stayed pending mediation for a period of 60 days from the date of filing, unless stayed for a longer period by agreement of the parties or court order. If an arbitration proceeding is stayed pursuant to this section, the parties may nonetheless proceed to the selection of the arbitrator(s) and agree upon a schedule for later proceedings.
- § 8.2.3 The parties shall share the mediator's fee and any filing fees equally. The mediation shall be held in the place where the Project is located, unless another location is mutually agreed upon. Agreements reached in mediation shall be enforceable as settlement agreements in any court having jurisdiction thereof.
- § 8.2.4 If the parties do not resolve a dispute through mediation pursuant to this Section 8.2, the method of binding dispute resolution shall be the following: (Check the appropriate box.)

§ 8.3 The provisions of this Article 8 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

- § 10.3 The Owner and Architect, respectively, bind themselves, their agents, successors, assigns, and legal representatives to this Agreement. Neither the Owner nor the Architect shall assign this Agreement without the written consent of the other, except that the Owner may assign this Agreement to a lender providing financing for the Project

if the lender agrees to assume the Owner's rights and obligations under this Agreement, including any payments due to the Architect by the Owner prior to the assignment.

- § 10.4 If the Owner requests the Architect to execute certificates, the proposed language of such certificates shall be submitted to the Architect for review at least 14 days prior to the requested dates of execution. If the Owner requests the Architect to execute consents reasonably required to facilitate assignment to a lender, the Architect shall execute all such consents that are consistent with this Agreement, provided the proposed consent is submitted to the Architect for review at least 14 days prior to execution. The Architect shall not be required to execute certificates or consents that would require knowledge, services, or responsibilities beyond the scope of this Agreement.
- § 10.5 Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create a contractual relationship with, or a cause of action in favor of, a third party against either the Owner or Architect.
- § 10.6 The Architect shall have no responsibility for the discovery, presence, handling, removal or disposal of, or exposure of persons to, hazardous materials or toxic substances in any form at the Project site.
- § 10.7 The Architect shall have the right to include photographic or artistic representations of the design of the Project among the Architect's promotional and professional materials. The Architect shall be given reasonable access to the completed Project to make such representations. However, the Architect's materials shall not include the Owner's confidential or proprietary information if the Owner has previously advised the Architect in writing of the specific information considered by the Owner to be confidential or proprietary. The Owner shall provide professional credit for the Architect in the Owner's promotional materials for the Project. This Section 10.7 shall survive the termination of this Agreement unless the Owner terminates this Agreement for cause pursuant to Section 9.4.
- § 10.8 If the Architect or Owner receives information specifically designated as "confidential" or "business proprietary," the receiving party shall keep such information strictly confidential and shall not disclose it to any other person except as set forth in Section 10.8.1. This Section 10.8 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- § 10.8.1 The receiving party may disclose "confidential" or "business proprietary" information after 7 days' notice to the other party, when required by law, arbitrator's order, or court order, including a subpoena or other form of compulsory legal process issued by a court or governmental entity, or to the extent such information is reasonably necessary for the receiving party to defend itself in any dispute. The receiving party may also disclose such information to its employees, consultants, or contractors in order to perform services or work solely and exclusively for the Project, provided those employees, consultants and contractors are subject to the restrictions on the disclosure and use of such information as set forth in this Section 10.8.
- § 10.9 The invalidity of any provision of the Agreement shall not invalidate the Agreement or its remaining provisions. If it is determined that any provision of the Agreement violates any law, or is otherwise invalid or unenforceable, then that provision shall be revised to the extent necessary to make that provision legal and enforceable. In such case the Agreement shall be construed, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to give effect to the parties' intentions and purposes in executing the Agreement.

§ 3.5.3 Negotiated Proposals

§ 3.5.3.1 Proposal Documents shall consist of proposal requirements and proposed Contract Documents.

§ 3.5.3.2 The Architect shall assist the Owner in obtaining proposals by:

- .1 facilitating the distribution of Proposal Documents for distribution to prospective contractors and requesting their return upon completion of the negotiation process;
- .2 organizing and participating in selection interviews with prospective contractors;
- .3 preparing responses to questions from prospective contractors and providing clarifications and interpretations of the Proposal Documents to the prospective contractors in the form of addenda; and,
- .4 participating in negotiations with prospective contractors, and subsequently preparing a summary report of the negotiation results, as directed by the Owner.

§ 3.5.3.3 If the Proposal Documents permit substitutions, upon the Owner's written authorization, the Architect shall, as an Additional Service, consider requests for substitutions and prepare and distribute addenda identifying approved substitutions to all prospective contractors.

§ 3.6 Construction Phase Services (requires prior written authorization by the City to proceed)

- § 3.6.2.1 The Architect shall visit the site at intervals appropriate to the stage of construction, or as otherwise required in Section 4.2.3, to become generally familiar with the progress and quality of the portion of the Work completed, and to determine, in general, if the Work observed is being performed in a manner indicating that the Work, when fully completed, will be in accordance with the Contract Documents. However, the Architect shall not be required to make exhaustive or continuous on-site observations or any inspections to check the quality or quantity of the Work. On the basis of the site visits, the Architect shall keep the Owner reasonably informed about the progress and quality of the portion of the Work completed, and promptly report to the Owner (1) known deviations from the Contract Documents, (2) known deviations from the most recent construction schedule submitted by the Contractor, and (3) defects and deficiencies observed in the Work.
- § 3.6.2.2 The Architect has the authority will consult with the Owner concerning whether to reject Work that does not conform to the Contract Documents. Documents that comes to the attention of the Architect. Whenever the Architect considers it necessary or advisable, the Architect shall have the authority to require inspection or testing of the Work in accordance with the provisions of the Contract Documents, whether or not the Work is fabricated, installed or completed. However, neither this authority of the Architect nor a decision made in good faith either to exercise or not to exercise such authority shall give rise to a duty or responsibility of the Architect to the Contractor, Subcontractors, suppliers, their agents or employees, or other persons or entities performing portions of the Work.

§ 3.6.2.4 Interpretations and decisions recommendations of the Architect shall be consistent with the intent of, and reasonably inferable from, the Contract Documents and shall be in writing or in the form of drawings. § 3.6.3.1 The Architect shall review and certify the amounts due the Contractor and shall issue certificates in such amounts. The Architect's certification for payment shall constitute a representation to the Owner, based on the Architect's evaluation of the Work as provided in Section 3.6.2 and on the data comprising the Contractor's

Application for Payment, that, to the best of the Architect's knowledge, information and belief, the Work has progressed to the point indicated, indicated as reviewed against the agreed upon schedule of values, the quality of the Work is in accordance with the Contract Documents, and that the Contractor is entitled to payment in the amount certified. The foregoing representations are subject to (1) an evaluation of the Work for conformance with the Contract Documents upon Substantial Completion, (2) results of subsequent tests and inspections, (3) correction of minor deviations from the Contract Documents prior to completion, and (4) specific qualifications expressed by the Architect.

§ 3.6.3.2 The issuance of a Certificate for Payment shall not be a representation that the Architect has (1) made exhaustive or continuous on-site <u>observations or any</u> inspections to check the quality or quantity of the Work, (2) reviewed construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures, (3) reviewed copies of requisitions received from Subcontractors and suppliers and other data requested by the Owner to substantiate the Contractor's right to payment, or (4) ascertained how or for what purpose the Contractor has used money previously paid on account of the Contract Sum.

§ 3.6.4.2 The Architect shall review and approve, or take other appropriate action upon, the Contractor's submittals such as Shop Drawings, Product Data and Samples, but only for the limited purpose of checking for conformance with information given and the design concept expressed in the Contract Documents. Subject to Section 4.2, the Architect shall prepare Change Orders and Construction Change Directives for the Owner's approval and execution in accordance with the Contract Documents.

- § 5.7 If the Owner identified a Sustainable Objective in Article 1, the Owner shall fulfill its responsibilities as required in AIA Document E204TM 2017, Sustainable Projects Exhibit, attached to this Agreement. The Owner shall furnish all legal, insurance and accounting services, including auditing services, that may be reasonably necessary at any time for the Project to meet the Owner's needs and interests.
- § 5.8 The Owner shall coordinate the services of its own consultants with those services provided by the Architect. Upon the Architect's request, the Owner shall furnish copies of the scope of services in the contracts between the Owner and the Owner's consultants. The Owner shall furnish the services of consultants other than those designated as the responsibility of the Architect in this Agreement, or authorize the Architect to furnish them as an Additional

The Cost of the Work does not include the compensation of the Architect; the costs of the land, rights-of-way, financing, sales tax or contingencies for changes in the Work; or other costs that are the responsibility of the Owner.
- **§ 6.2** The Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work is provided in Initial Information, and shall be adjusted throughout the Project as required under Sections 5.2, 6.4 and 6.5. Evaluations The Architect's evaluations of the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work, and the preliminary estimate of the Cost of the Work and updated estimates of the Cost of the Work, prepared by the Architect, represent the Architect's best judgment as a design professional. It is recognized, however, that neither the Architect nor the Owner has control over the cost of labor, materials, or equipment; the Contractor's methods of determining bid prices; or competitive bidding, market, or negotiating conditions.

Accordingly, the Architect cannot and does not warrant or represent that bids or negotiated prices will not vary from the Owner's budget for the Cost of the Work, or from any estimate of the Cost of the Work, or evaluation, prepared or agreed to by the Architect.

§ 8.3.1 If the parties have selected arbitration as the method for binding dispute resolution in this Agreement, any claim, dispute or other matter in question arising out of or related to this Agreement subject to, but not resolved by, mediation shall be subject to arbitration, which, unless the parties mutually agree otherwise, shall be administered by the American Arbitration Association in accordance with its Construction Industry Arbitration Rules in effect on the date of this Agreement. A demand for arbitration shall be made in writing, delivered to the other party to this Agreement, and filed with the person or entity administering the arbitration.

- **§ 8.3.1.1** A demand for arbitration shall be made no earlier than concurrently with the filing of a request for mediation, but in no event shall it be made after the date when the institution of legal or equitable proceedings based on the claim, dispute or other matter in question would be barred by the applicable statute of limitations. For statute of limitations purposes, receipt of a written demand for arbitration by the person or entity administering the arbitration shall constitute the institution of legal or equitable proceedings based on the claim, dispute or other matter in question.
- **§ 8.3.2** The foregoing agreement to arbitrate, and other agreements to arbitrate with an additional person or entity duly consented to by parties to this Agreement, shall be specifically enforceable in accordance with applicable law in any court having jurisdiction thereof.
- **§ 8.3.3** The award rendered by the arbitrator(s) shall be final, and judgment may be entered upon it in accordance with applicable law in any court having jurisdiction thereof.

§ 8.3.4 Consolidation or Joinder

- **§ 8.3.4.1** Either party, at its sole discretion, may consolidate an arbitration conducted under this Agreement with any other arbitration to which it is a party provided that (1) the arbitration agreement governing the other arbitration permits consolidation; (2) the arbitrations to be consolidated substantially involve common questions of law or fact; and (3) the arbitrations employ materially similar procedural rules and methods for selecting arbitrator(s).
- **§ 8.3.4.2** Either party, at its sole discretion, may include by joinder persons or entities substantially involved in a common question of law or fact whose presence is required if complete relief is to be accorded in arbitration, provided that the party sought to be joined consents in writing to such joinder. Consent to arbitration involving an additional person or entity shall not constitute consent to arbitration of any claim, dispute or other matter in question not described in the written consent.
- **§ 8.3.4.3** The Owner and Architect grant to any person or entity made a party to an arbitration conducted under this Section 8.3, whether by joinder or consolidation, the same rights of joinder and consolidation as the Owner and Architect under this Agreement.
- § 8.4 The provisions of this Article 8 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 9 TERMINATION OR SUSPENSION (see SECTION 17 and 18 of the prime Agreement for Professional Services)

- **§ 9.1** If the Owner fails to make payments to the Architect in accordance with this Agreement, such failure shall be considered substantial nonperformance and cause for termination or, at the Architect's option, cause for suspension of performance of services under this Agreement. If the Architect elects to suspend services, the Architect shall give seven days' written notice to the Owner before suspending services. In the event of a suspension of services, the Architect shall have no liability to the Owner for delay or damage caused the Owner because of such suspension of services. Before resuming services, the Owner shall pay the Architect all sums due prior to suspension and any expenses incurred in the interruption and resumption of the Architect's services. The Architect's fees for the remaining services and the time schedules shall be equitably adjusted.
- **§ 9.2** If the Owner suspends the Project, the Architect shall be compensated for services performed prior to notice of such suspension. When the Project is resumed, the Architect shall be compensated for expenses incurred in the interruption and resumption of the Architect's services. The Architect's fees for the remaining services and the time schedules shall be equitably adjusted.
- **§ 9.3** If the Owner suspends the Project for more than 90 cumulative days for reasons other than the fault of the Architect, the Architect may terminate this Agreement by giving not less than seven days' written notice.
- § 9.4 Either party may terminate this Agreement upon not less than seven days' written notice should the other party fail substantially to perform in accordance with the terms of this Agreement through no fault of the party initiating the termination.
- **§ 9.5** The Owner may terminate this Agreement upon not less than seven days' written notice to the Architect for the Owner's convenience and without cause.

§ 9.6 If the Owner terminates this Agreement for its convenience pursuant to Section 9.5, or the Architect terminates

Proposed is a Temporary Water Transfer Interlocal Agreement for the City of Yakima to lease 31 shares of Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District water to the City of Tieton for the 2024 irrigation season. The 31 shares of irrigation water is not currently necessary to supply the City of Yakima's irrigation operations for 2024, whereas the City of Tieton has a need for this irrigation water.

Under the proposed agreement, the City of Tieton would pay \$125/share to the City of Yakima; plus a billing charge of \$80 for a total of \$3,955.00 for this year. The arrangement with the City of Tieton was first implemented in 2014.

TEMPORARY WATER TRANSFER AGREEMENT

THIS TEMPORARY WATER TRANSFER INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT is made
and entered into in accordance with the requirements of RCW 39.34, on theday of
, 2024, by and between CITY OF YAKIMA, hereinafter referred to as
the $Transferor$, whose address is 129 N. 2 nd St.; YAKIMA, WA 98901; CITY OF TIETON
hereinafter referred to as the Transferee , whose address is P.O. BOX 357, TIETON, WA
98947; and YAKIMA-TIETON IRRIGATION DISTRICT, an irrigation district organized
under the laws of the State of Washington, hereinafter referred to as the District, and
whose address is 470 Camp Four Road, Yakima, WA 98908;

WITNESSETH:

- 1. Transferor, for and in consideration of good and valuable consideration does hereby transfer to Transferee 31.00 shares of water from the facilities of the District, said water now being appurtenant to Yakima County tax parcel number 181316-31402 & 181316-11400 owned by the Transferor, and situated, lying, and being in Yakima County, Washington, and within the boundaries of the District, does hereby transfer said 31.00 shares of water from the above-described property for the year 2024 to Yakima County parcels within the City of Tieton irrigation service area owned by Transferee and all parcels as listed on the attached irrigation turnout summary, situated, lying, and being in Yakima County, Washington, and within the boundaries of the District; it being the intention of Transferee to use said shares of water on the properties last described for the current irrigation season. This agreement shall continue for the current irrigation season and shall terminate and be of no further force or effect upon the expiration of the current irrigation season without any further action of any party. Other than the one-time transfer of water shares as set forth herein, no other real or personal property shall exchange hands as part of this transaction.
- 2. Transferee does hereby agree to pay the Transferor \$125.00 per share for 31.00 shares plus the billing charge of \$80.00, for use in the water year of 2024, a total of \$3,955.00. Payment is due at the Transferor fifteen (15) days from date of invoice.
- 3. Transferee does hereby agree that the total resulting shares of water to be used on the property last above described, including said shares of water herein transferred, is 31.00 shares of water. The District, for and in consideration of the conditions provided herein, does hereby approve and acknowledge the above transfer of the aforementioned water.
- 4. The water user parties' above-described properties and water herein transferred shall be and remain expressly subject to the rules and regulations of the Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District.

- 5. The water user parties' above-described properties and water herein transferred are expressly subject to assessments, rates, tolls, and charges of the District for any lawful purpose, including but not limited to the care, maintenance, upkeep, operation, management, repair, reconstruction, betterment, and improvement of facilities of the District, for the payment of any indebtedness due the United States and the State of Washington, and for the payment of bonds and interest thereon.
- 6. All assessments, rates, tolls, and charges of the District payable for the current and all prior years associated with the properties involved shall be paid in full prior to the District's approval and acknowledgement of this transfer. The parties shall be responsible for any payments or reimbursements between the parties, and the District shall have no responsibility for the handling or transmittal of such funds.
- 7. The water user parties' above-described properties and water herein transferred are expressly subject to all the terms and conditions of original water deeds and contracts creating and initiating the water rights transferred herein.
 - 8. The parties acknowledge and agree to the following:
 - a. Water rights in the Yakima River Drainage Basin, including but not limited to the right of diversion and use of and the extent and priority of the right to the use of any surface water of the Yakima River Drainage Basin, are have been determined and adjudicated in the case of *State of Washington v. Acquavella*, Yakima County Cause No. 77-2-01484-5 and the final decree signed in May 2019.
 - b. Judge Walter Stauffacher issued an order on August 13, 1992, which provided as follows:
 - IT IS HEREBY FURTHER ORDERED that changes in the place of use of water within the boundaries of an irrigation district may be approved by the board of directors of the irrigation district and do not require the approval of the Department of Ecology.
- 9. Transferor and Transferee hereby release and agree to indemnify, hold harmless and defend the Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District, and its directors, officers, agents, and employees, on account of any and all damages or claims, including but not limited to attorneys' fees and expenses, by whomsoever made and of any nature whatsoever, arising out of or in any manner connected to this Temporary Water Transfer Agreement or arising out of or in any manner connected to the water herein transferred being found or determined to be void or voidable. Transferor's and Transferee's duties under this paragraph to indemnify the Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District shall not apply to liability for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damage to property caused by or resulting from the sole negligence of the Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District or its directors, officers, agents, and employees. The Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District hereby releases and agrees to indemnify, hold harmless and defend Transferor and Transferee

and their elected officials, appointed officials, agents, and employees, on account of all damages or claims, including attorneys' fees and expenses, for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damage to property caused by or resulting from the sole negligence of the Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District or its directors, officers, agents, and employees. In the event of damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damage to property caused by or resulting from the concurrent negligence of (1) the Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District or its directors, officers, agents, or employees, and/or (2) Transferor or its elected officials or appointed officials, employees, or agents, and/or (3) Transferee or its elected officials or appointed officials, employees, and agents, Transferor's, Transferee's and/or the Yakima-Tieton Irrigation District's duty to indemnify under this paragraph shall apply only to the extent of each such party's negligence.

- 10. Transferee shall pay in advance to the District all the District costs associated with this transfer, including but not limited to all costs for administration, orifice plates, parts, mileage, labor, and all other costs associated with the transfer.
- 11. The water user parties hereby certify and warrant under penalty of perjury of the laws of the state of Washington that they are the owners of their respective properties as described herein. Transferor furthermore certifies and warrants under penalty of perjury of the laws of the state of Washington that Transferor is not in default under any mortgage lien covering Transferor's property, that there are no liens on Transferor's property, other than mortgage liens, and that the contract seller of such property, if any, has consented to this temporary transfer by the signature below. In the event of any sale or transfer of Transferor's property described above, Transferor shall take full responsibility for notifying any purchaser or other transferee of this temporary transfer.
- 12. In accordance with RCW 39.34.040, prior to this agreement becoming effective it shall be listed by subject on the City of Yakima web site.

PERSONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

	THIS PERSONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement") is made and entered y and between the City of Yakima, a Washington municipal corporation (hereinafter the "City"), , (hereinafter "Contractor").
and	WHEREAS, the City requires specialized personal services to facilitate the scheduled program of the City Parks and Recreation Division.
specia	WHEREAS, Contractor has the experience and expertise necessary to perform the alized services the City requires.

WHEREAS, the specialized services are outside the usual course of business of the City of Yakima.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises, and agreements set forth herein, it is agreed by and between the City and Contractor as follows:

- 1. <u>Scope of Services</u>. Contractor shall provide services, staff, specialized equipment, and otherwise do all things necessary for or incidental to the performance of work in conjunction with the _____ program of the City Parks and Recreation Division and in accordance with attached and incorporated Attachment "A."
- **2.** Period of Performance. The period of performance under this Agreement shall be one year, commencing at 12:01 a.m. on January 1, 2024 and continuing until 11:59 p.m. on December 31, 2024, unless earlier terminated by either party in accordance with Section 17 or Section 18 of this Contract. The City reserves the right to extend this Agreement for four (4) additional one (1) year periods by City providing Contractor a written notice of City's intent to renew, said notice to be given sixty (60) days prior to the Agreement's annual expiration date. Upon receipt of a renewal notice from the City, Contractor shall indicate its intent to accept the renewal or to terminate the Agreement in writing and signed by Contractor no later than thirty (30) days prior to the annual expiration date. The Parks and Recreation Division Manager has the authority and is authorized to extend this Agreement for up to four (4) one-year extensions. Any such extension does not require further City Council approval.

- 3. <u>Consideration</u>. As consideration for the services performed pursuant to this Agreement, the City agrees to compensate Contractor in accordance with attached and incorporated Attachment "B." The Contractor shall provide the City with an itemized invoice/billing no later than thirty (30) calendar days after the services are provided. The City shall make payment to the Contractor within thirty (30) calendar days following receipt of each invoice/billing; provided, however, that the Contractor waives any and all claims for compensation for services where the Contractor has failed to provide the City with an itemized invoice/billing for said services within sixty (60) calendar days of providing said services. Also, all payments are expressly conditioned upon the Contractor providing training or services hereunder that are satisfactory to the City. Contractor shall also complete and submit to the City IRS Form 1099 included herein as Attachment "C".
- 4. <u>Independent Contractor Status of Contractor</u>. Contractor and the City understand and expressly agree that Contractor is an independent contractor in the performance of each and every part of this Agreement and <u>not</u> an agent or representative of the City. Contractor, as an independent contractor, assumes the entire responsibility for carrying out and accomplishing the services required under this Agreement free from supervision by the City over the methods and details of performance except as described in Attachment "A". Contractor shall not represent that it is, or hold itself out as, an agent or representative of the City. In no event shall Contractor be authorized to enter into any agreement or undertaking for, or on behalf of, City.

Additionally, and as an independent contractor, Contractor and its employees shall make no claim of City employment nor shall claim against the City any related employment benefits, social security, and/or retirement benefits, provided, however that Contractor may be eligible for industrial insurance from the City. Nothing contained herein shall be interpreted as creating a relationship of servant, employee, partnership or agency between Contractor or any officer, employee or agent of Contractor and the City.

- **Taxes and Assessments.** Contractor shall be solely responsible for compensating its employees and for paying all related taxes, deductions, and assessments, including but not limited to, federal income tax, FICA, social security tax, assessments for unemployment and industrial injury, and other deductions from income which may be required by law or assessed against either party as a result of this Agreement. In the event the City is assessed a tax or assessment as a result of this Agreement, Contractor shall pay the same before it becomes due.
- **Nondiscrimination Provision.** During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall not discriminate in violation of any applicable federal, state and/or local law or regulation on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, national origin, creed, marital status, political affiliation, or the presence of any sensory, mental or physical handicap. This provision shall include but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment, advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, selection for training, and the provision of services under this Agreement.

In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the non-discrimination clause of this Agreement, or with any such rules, regulations, laws or orders, this Agreement may be cancelled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the Contractor may be declared ineligible for any future City contracts.

7. The Americans With Disabilities Act. Contractor agrees to comply with the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990, 42 U.S.C. § 12101 et seq. (ADA), and its implementing regulations, and Washington State's anti-discrimination law as contained in RCW Chapter 49.60 and its implementing regulations. The ADA provides comprehensive civil rights to individuals with disabilities in the area

of employment, public accommodations, state and local government services, and telecommunications.

8. <u>Compliance With Law.</u> Contractor agrees to perform those services under and pursuant to this Agreement in full compliance with any and all applicable laws, rules, and regulations adopted or promulgated by any governmental agency or regulatory body, whether federal, state, local, or otherwise. This includes, but is not limited to, the requirement to obtain a City of Yakima business license if Contractor is charging participants for the activities contracted for under this Agreement, or if a business or regulatory license is otherwise required by federal, state, or local law. Proof of such licenses must be provided at the time of execution of this Agreement.

9. <u>Insurance</u>.

- a. It is understood the City does not maintain liability insurance for Contractor and/or its employees.
- b. If Contractor carries a Commercial Liability Insurance policy, Automobile Insurance policy, Umbrella insurance policy and/or other insurance policy that covers Contractor's activities performed under this Agreement, Contractor shall provide the City with the certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements as proof of insurance. The certificates of insurance and endorsements shall name the City, its elected and appointed officials, employees, agents, attorneys and volunteers as additional insureds. The certificate shall clearly state who the provider is, the coverage amount, the policy number, and when the policy and provisions provided are in effect.
- c. Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance with respect to those who are additional insureds under this Agreement. Any insurance, self-insurance, or insurance pool coverage maintained by the City shall be in excess of the Contractor's insurance, and neither the City nor its insurance providers shall contribute to any settlements, defense costs, or other payments made by Contractor's insurance.
- 10. <u>Indemnification and Hold Harmless</u>. Contractor shall take all necessary precautions in performing the services and work under this Agreement to prevent injury to persons or property. The Contractor shall release, defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City, its elected officials, agents, officers, employees, agents, representatives, insurers, attorneys and volunteers from all liabilities, claims, causes of action, damages, losses, and expenses of any kind or nature whatsoever, including but not limited to, attorney's fees and court costs, arising out of, relating to, or related to all claims, suits, arbitration actions, investigations, and regulatory or other governmental proceedings arising from or in connection with this Agreement or the acts, failures to act, errors or omissions of the Contractor, or any of Contractor's agents or subcontractors, in performance of this Agreement.
- **11. Assignment.** This Agreement, or any interest herein, or claim hereunder, shall not be assigned or transferred in whole or in part by Contractor to any other person or entity without the prior written consent of the City, at the City's sole discretion. In the event that such prior written consent to an assignment is granted, then the assignee shall assume all duties, obligations, and liabilities of Contractor stated herein.
- **12. Non-Waiver.** The waiver by Contractor or the City of the breach of any provision of this Agreement by the other party shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach by either party or prevent either party thereafter enforcing any such provision.
- **13. Damages.** If for any reason the Contractor fails to provide the services required under this Agreement, or is found to be in violation of any term or condition of this Agreement, the Contractor

shall be liable for any and all damages to the City, which may include, but is not limited to, any additional expenses incurred by the City in securing such services elsewhere or from another contractor.

14. <u>No Conflict of Interest</u>. Contractor represents that he/she does not have any interest and shall not hereafter acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of this Agreement. Further, the Contractor specifically represents that he/she is not an officer or an employee of the City, nor does he/she reside with or contribute monetary amounts to any City employee or officer.

15. Severability.

- a. If a court of competent jurisdiction holds any part, term or provision of this Agreement to be illegal, or invalid in whole or in part, the validity of the remaining provisions shall not be affected, and the parties' rights and obligations shall be construed and enforced as if the Agreement did not contain the particular provision held to be invalid.
- b. If any provision of this Agreement is in direct conflict with any statutory provision of the State of Washington, that provision which may conflict shall be deemed inoperative and null and void insofar as it may conflict, and shall be deemed modified to conform to such statutory provision.
- **16.** <u>Integration and Supersession</u>. This Agreement sets forth all of the terms, conditions, and agreements of the parties relative to the subject matter hereof and supersedes any and all such former agreements which are hereby declared terminated and of no further force and effect upon the execution and delivery hereof. There are no terms, conditions, or agreements with respect thereto, except as herein provided and no amendment or modification of this Agreement shall be effective unless reduced to writing and executed by the parties.
- **17.** <u>Termination</u>. Either party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause, by giving the other party fifteen (15) days written notice of termination.
 - a. Termination with cause. In the event the Contractor breaches this Agreement, the City may terminate this Agreement at its sole discretion in such event that it provides the Contractor with written notice of Contractor's breach and the Contractor fails to cure its breach during the notice period. In the event the City breaches this Agreement, the Contractor may terminate the Agreement at its sole discretion in such event that it provides the City with written notice of the City's breach and the City fails to cure its breach of the Agreement within the notice period.
 - b. Termination without cause. In the event either party wishes to terminate this Agreement without cause or for convenience, it may do so after providing the required notice. In the event of termination without cause or for convenience, the Contractor shall be entitled to receive compensation for any fees owed under this Agreement, and may continue to provide services that were already scheduled at the time of notice, through the notice period up to the date of termination, and be compensated for those services by the City.
- **18.** Termination/Reduction of Services Due to Withdrawal, Reduction or Limitation of Funding. In the event that City funding from any source is withdrawn, reduced and/or limited in any way after the effective date of and prior to completion of this Agreement, the City may unilaterally reduce the scope of services, work and compensation of this Agreement, or summarily terminate this Agreement notwithstanding any other termination provisions of this Agreement. Termination under this section shall be effective upon hand delivery or delivery by facsimile of a written notice of

termination to Contractor, or three (3) calendar days after mailing (by first class mail) of a written notice of termination to Contractor, whichever is sooner.

- **19. Survival.** Any provision of this Agreement which imposes an obligation after termination or expiration of this Agreement shall survive the term or expiration of this agreement and shall be binding on the parties to this Agreement.
- **20. Notices.** Unless stated otherwise herein, all notices and demands shall be in writing and either hand delivered or sent to the parties at their addresses as follows:

or to such other addresses as the parties may hereafter designate in writing. It is the contractor's obligation to maintain accurate address/contact information with the City. Notices and/or demands shall be sent by first class mail, postage prepaid or hand delivered. Such notices shall be deemed effective three (3) calendar days after mailing or when hand delivered at the addresses specified above.

- **21.** Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington.
- **22.** <u>Venue</u>. The venue for any action to enforce or interpret this Agreement shall lie in the Superior Court of Washington for Yakima County, Washington.

23. Records and Records Retention.

- a. The records relating to the services provided under this Agreement shall, at all times, be subject to inspection by and with the approval of the City, but the making of (or failure of or delay in making) such inspection or approval shall not relieve the Contractor of responsibility for performance of this Agreement in accordance hereto, notwithstanding the City's knowledge of defective or non-complying performance, its substantiality or the ease of its discovery. Contractor shall provide the City sufficient, safe, and proper facilities, and/or send copies of the requested documents to the City. Contractor's records relating to this Agreement will be provided to the City upon the City's request.
- b. Contractor shall promptly furnish the City with such information and records which are related to this Agreement as may be requested by the City. Until the expiration of six (6) years after final payment of the compensation payable under this Agreement, the termination date of this Agreement, or for a longer period if required by law or by the Washington Secretary of State's records retention schedule, Contractor shall retain and provide the City access to (and the City shall have the right to examine, audit and copy) all of Contractor's books, documents, papers and records which are related to this

Agreement. If any litigation, claims or audit findings involving the records is started before the expiration of the six-year period, the records shall be retained until all litigation, claims or audit findings involving the records is resolved.

- c. All records relating to Contractor's work under this Agreement must be made available to the City, and the records relating to this Agreement are City of Yakima records. They must be produced to third parties, if required, pursuant to the Washington State Public Records Act, Chapter 42.56 RCW, or by law.
- d. The terms of this section shall survive any expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- **24.** Pay Transparency Non-Discrimination Provision. The Contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against employees or applicants because they have inquired about, discussed, or disclosed their own pay or the pay of another employee or applicant. However, employees who have access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of their essential job functions cannot disclose the pay of other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to compensation information, unless the disclosure is (a) in response to a formal complaint or charge, (b) in furtherance of an investigation proceedings, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or (c) consistent with the Contractor's legal duty to furnish information.

VI. <u>Comprehensive Plan.</u> The site of the proposed Preliminary "Plat of Marylyn Place" is located within the Mixed Residential Comprehensive Plan designation which provides for areas with a mixture of housing types and densities. The following goals and policies apply to this proposal:

Goal 2.3: Preserve and enhance the quality, character, and function of Yakima's residential neighborhoods.

Policy 2.3.1: Provide for a wide variety of housing types within the city to meet the full range of housing needs for Yakima's evolving population.

Policy 2.3.2: Preserve and enhance established residential neighborhoods. Specifically: (A) Ensure that new development is compatible in scale, density, and aesthetic quality to an established neighborhood.

VII. Zoning and Land Use. The 22.19-acre site is located within the Two-Family Residential (R-2) zoning district and is currently vacant. The main purpose of the Yakima Urban Area Zoning Ordinance (UAZO) in Title 15 of the Yakima Municipal Code (YMC) is to implement the Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan and promote the general health, safety and welfare of the present and future inhabitants of the Yakima Urban Area. YMC §15.03.020(C) states that the purpose and intent of the R-2 zoning district is to:

- (1) Establish and preserve residential neighborhoods for detached single-family dwellings, duplexes and other uses compatible with the intent of this district; and
- (2) Locate residential development with densities up to twelve dwelling units per net residential acre in areas receiving a full range of public services including public water and sewer service, and police and fire protection.
- (3) The district is characterized by up to sixty percent lot coverage, access via local access streets and collectors, one- and two-story buildings, some clustering of units, and required front, rear and side yard setbacks. Typical uses in this district are single-family dwellings and duplexes. The density in this district generally ranges from seven to twelve dwelling units per net residential acre. However, development up to eighteen dwelling units per net residential acre may be allowed in accordance with YMC Chapter 15.04, Table 4-1.
- (4) The zoning and the land uses of the surrounding properties may be described as follows:

VIII. Environmental Review. This application was required to undergo SEPA State Environmental Policy Act review because it proposes to subdivide a parcel of land into more than 30 single-family lots in the R-2 zoning district and because of the requirement that the application undergo a Critical Areas Review. Notice was mailed on November 16, 2023, and the public comment period ended on November 30, 2023. No comments from neighbors or the general public were received, but the comments from several public agencies will be set forth in this Recommendation. A SEPA Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was issued for this proposal by the City's SEPA Responsible Official on December 13, 2023, which was not appealed.

- **IX.** Transportation Concurrency Ordinance. The applicant applied for Transportation Concurrency (TCO#007-23) on September 21, 2023, and this proposal was approved for Concurrency on January 5, 2024, after Engineering coordinated with Yakima County regarding traffic data for County arterial streets. The development will not exceed the PM peak hour capacity of the City arterial system, and reserve capacity exists on all impacted arterial streets.
- **X.** <u>Development Services Team.</u> The following comments were submitted by the Development Services Team which met on October 10, 2023, and by public agencies:
- (1) Code Administration: The City of Yakima Code Administration comments were as follows:
 - (a) Pursuant to the Chapter 5 of the Washington State Fire Code (WSFC), publicly available fire hydrants will be required along streets spaced at intervals that will provide required fire flow coverage for proposed structures pursuant to WSFC Appendix C. Installation of approved hydrants must be completed prior to final plat approval.
 - (b) These findings are not intended to be an exhaustive review of this proposal.
 - (c) All addresses shall be clearly shown on the face of the Final Plat (RCW 58.17.280). Additionally, a note shall be shown on the face of the Final Plat stating: "The addresses shown on this plat are accurate as of the date of recording, but may be subject to change. The City of Yakima Code Administration Division is responsible for the confirmation or reassignment of addresses at the time of building permit issuance." The following addresses shall be utilized for the created lots:

- (2) Engineering: This project proposes that 22.1 acres be developed into 83 new single-family lots at Lower Ahtanum/58th, also known as "Plat of Marylyn Place." The property currently is two vacant parcels. The proposed development will cause increased pedestrian and vehicle traffic without adequate safety precautions for pedestrians. The proposed development has the potential for more frequent trips in and out of the property. Current frontage infrastructure is not adequate enough to handle the new proposed 83 single-family lots. In order to alleviate the resulting impacts from the change in use proposal, the City is requiring the following improvements:
 - (a) YMC 8.60 and 12.05 New curb, gutter, ADA ramps and 5-foot sidewalk, including associated storm drainage, shall be installed. Street improvements shall conform to standard detail R3. New sidewalks shall be constructed per standard detail R5.
 - (b) YMC 8.64 and 15.06.065 Residential driveway approaches are required which meet the requirements of this chapter and standard detail R4. Driveway width shall be a maximum of 20 feet.
 - (c) YMC 12.06.020 Right-of-way Applicant shall determine adequate dedication of right-of-way for all new/proposed roads.
 - (d) YMC 15.05.040 Clear vision triangle shall be maintained per this chapter.
 - (e) YMC 12.06.080 Street lighting Street lights shall be installed per this chapter.
 - (f) YMC 12.02 Easements shall be established and maintained per this chapter.

- (g) YMC 8.72 An excavation and street break permit shall be obtained for all work within the public right-of-way.
- (h) Acknowledge that the parcels to the north are prohibiting the floodway and currently are undergoing mitigation measures to correct.

An ENG permit is required for all civil work to be performed on site. Professional engineered civil plans with PE stamp shall be submitted for review and approval. All improvements shall be completed prior to Certificate of Occupancy. Traffic generated from development enters and exits on a County road, Ahtanum. I understand the County was notified. Will notify the County to get arterial traffic data to complete the TCO.

- (3) Surface Water: Surface water comments relative to this proposed preliminary plat are as follows:
 - (a) This very large development will easily pass the one-acre threshold for ground disturbance. Before any ground clearing activities take place, the applicant shall get a Large Project Stormwater Permit. The requirements of a Large Project Stormwater Permit are: (i) Drainage plan(s) and calculations; (ii) Stormwater maintenance agreement and plan; (iii) Proof that the maintenance agreement was recorded in the Yakima County Auditor's Office; (iv) Construction Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) which shall be reviewed and approved by the Surface Water Engineer prior to any grading or construction and a Temporary Erosion and Sediment Control (TESC) plan shall be submitted for approval; (v) In lieu of turning in a Construction Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan, the applicant can satisfy this requirement by obtaining a Construction Stormwater General Permit through the Washington State Department of Ecology and by providing a copy of the signed General Permit to the Surface Water Engineer. (Go https://ecology.wa.gov/regulations-permits/permits-certifications/stormwatergeneral-permits/construction-stormwater-permit for more information on how to apply for the General Permit); (vi) A narrative explaining how Core Elements 1-8 are being satisfied; and (vii) an operation and maintenance plan for the perpetual maintenance of the facilities is now required.
 - (b) Grading and/or building permits shall not be issued without the project site first passing an erosion control inspection. The erosion control measures shown on the TESC plan must be in place prior to any grading.

- (c) Complete stormwater design plans, specifications and runoff/storage calculations supporting the stormwater design are required pursuant to the Eastern Washington Stormwater Manual and City of Yakima standards. These plans and control measures must be completed by a licensed Professional Engineer and then be reviewed and approved by the City of Yakima Surface Water Engineer prior to construction.
- (d) UIC Registration Stormwater: In accordance with the August 2019 edition of the Department of Ecology's Stormwater Management Manual for Eastern Washington (SMMEW), Underground Injection Control (UIC) wells constructed on or after February 3, 2006 are considered new and must be registered with the Department of Ecology (DOE) 60 days prior to construction. To register your UIC wells, you must go through the Secure Access Washington website. Go to https://secureaccess.wa.gov/ecy/wqwebportal/ to create an account and register your wells. UIC wells that receive polluted runoff shall retain the larger of the 100-year 3-hour and 100-year 24-hour storms and shall be designed for treatment using Table 5.23 of the SMMEW.
- (e) More information on the Industrial Stormwater General Permit Notice of Intent can be found at https://ecology.wa.gov/Regulations-Permits/Guidance-technical-assistance/Water-quality-permits-guidance/WQWebPortal-guidance.
- (4) Wastewater: Sewer is to be extended to site per YMC Title 12 requirements and City of Yakima Engineering Standard Details. Proposed sewer plans will be reviewed per ENG permit requirements.
- (5) Nob Hill Water Association: Nob Hill Water Association has the capacity to serve a long plat in this area. Engineered drawings will need to be submitted to Nob Hill Water in order for the new water infrastructure to be designed and installed by Nob Hill Water.
- (6) Ahtanum Irrigation District: Our Board must sign off on the plat for this subdivision. The surveyor will need to provide us with the original Mylar, <u>as well as one copy</u> [emphasis that of the agency], for District signature. As our Board meets once per month, please telephone in advance for meeting dates to avoid delays.
- (7) Yakima County Flood Control Zone District: The Yakima County Flood Control Zone District comments are as follows:

- (a) The Yakima County Flood Control Zone District (FCZD) attended a meeting with the City of Yakima Planning Division on October 10, 2023. At this meeting, the FCZD raised flood risk related concerns regarding the subject line applications (Marylyn Place). Please find the below comments related to Marylyn Place.
- (b) 44 CFR 60.3(d)(3) states that communities must prohibit encroachments and other development in the floodway, unless certified by an engineer via no-rise certification per YCC 16C.05.36.020. The FCZD recommends a mechanism to inspect and ensure that no unpermitted encroachments or development occurs in the floodway on the north side of the parcel to comply with YCC and FEMA regulations. Encroachments and other development would include structures such as homes, sheds, fences, etc. We also recommend targeted outreach to the existing landowner(s) as well as potential developers and/or buyers next to the floodway of those development restrictions.
- (c) This development proposal is subject to the September 2021 LOMR which was approved by both the City of Yakima and Yakima County. We encourage the City and County to continue to cooperatively maintain those LOMR requirements.
- (d) In the Marylyn Place site plans, there are two roadways leading north that cross generally perpendicular to the floodway. During the 100-year flood event and potentially smaller events, the floodway may become activated causing water over the roadway, which at times would be impassable. FCZD recommends the placement of permanent signage indicating that the roadway may be under water during flooding events.
- (8) Washington State Department of Ecology: If you plan to use water for dust suppression at your project site, be sure that you have a legal right. In Washington State, prospective water users must obtain authorization from the Department of Ecology before diverting surface water or withdrawing ground water, with one exception. Ground water withdrawals of up to 5,000 gallons per day used for single or group domestic supply, up to 5,000 gallons per day used for industrial purposes, stock watering, and for the irrigation of up to one-half acre of non-commercial lawn and garden are exempt from the permitting process. Water use under the RCW 90.44.050 exemption establishes a water right that is subject to the same privileges, restrictions, laws and regulations as a water right permit or certificate obtained directly from Ecology. Temporary permits may be

obtainable in a short time-period. The concern of Water Resources is for existing water rights. In some instances water may need to be obtained from a different area and hauled in or from an existing water right holder. - (9) Washington State Department of Archaeology & Historic Preservation: The Department of Archaeology & Historic Preservation comments for its Project Tracking Code 2023-11-07771 are as follows:
 - (a) Our statewide predictive model indicates that there is a high probability of encountering cultural resources within the proposed project area. Further, the scale of the proposed ground disturbing actions would destroy any archaeological resources present. Identification during construction is not a recommended detection method because inadvertent discoveries often result in costly construction delays and damage to the resource. Therefore, we recommend a professional archaeological survey of the project area be conducted and a report be produced prior to ground disturbing activities. This report should meet DAHP's Standards for Cultural Resource Reporting.
 - (b) We also recommend that any historic buildings or structures (45 years in age or older) located within the project area are evaluated for eligibility for listing in the National Register of Historic Places on Historic Property Inventory (HPI) forms. We highly encourage the SEPA lead agency to ensure that these evaluations are written by a cultural resource professional meeting the SOI Professional Qualification Standards in Architectural History.
 - (c) Please note that the recommendations provided in this letter reflect only the opinions of DAHP. Any interested Tribes may have different recommendations. We appreciate receiving any correspondence or comments from Tribes or other parties concerning cultural resource issues that you receive.
 - (d) Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this project. Please ensure that the DAHP Project Tracking Number is shared with any hired cultural resource consultants and is attached to any communications or submitted reports. Please also ensure that any reports, site forms, and/or historic property inventory (HPI) forms are uploaded to WISAARD by the consultant(s).

- XI. <u>Applicable Subdivision Ordinance and Statutory Provisions.</u> Applicable subdivision ordinance and statutory provisions are as follows:
- (1) YMC §15.03.020(C): R-2 Zoning District Defined: The purposes of the R-2 zoning district are first to establish and preserve residential neighborhoods for detached single-family dwellings, duplexes and other uses compatible with the intent of this district and also to locate residential development with densities up to twelve dwelling units per net residential acre in areas receiving a full range of public services including public water and sewer service, and police and fire protection. The district is characterized by up to sixty percent lot coverage, access via local access streets and collectors, one- and two-story buildings, some clustering of units, and required front, rear and side yard setbacks. Typical uses in this district are single-family dwellings and duplexes. The density in this district generally ranges from seven to twelve dwelling units per net residential acre. However, development up to eighteen dwelling units per net residential acre may be allowed in accordance with YMC Chapter 15.04, Table 4-1.
- (2) YMC §15.05.030(A): Creation of new lots Subdivision requirements: Table of Subdivision Requirements: The YMC §15.05.030(A) Table establishes basic development criteria for lot size and width that must be met when reviewing an application for a new subdivision. For detached single-family dwelling construction in the R-2 zoning district, the required minimum lot size is 6,000 square feet.
- (3) YMC §15.30.040: Airport Safety Overlay Zones: The subject property is located in Zone 6 of the Airport Safety Overlay, and per YMC §15.30.060, detached single-family dwellings are Class (1) uses.
- (4) YMC §15.30.050: Height Limitation: Height Limitation 2 (AOD Zone 6): No building within this zone shall exceed thirty-five feet above the ground. Any building proposed to exceed this height must undergo further review by the airport manager and the FAA. The administrative official may require lights or markers as a warning to aircraft on any buildings, structures, communication towers, uses, or trees, or the topping of any trees to reduce their height, when recommended by the FAA, WSDOT Aviation Division or the airport manager. Lights and markers shall meet FAA specifications. Whenever the height limitations of this section differ from those of any other section of this chapter, or that adopted by another local ordinance or regulation, the more restrictive limitation shall apply.

- (5) YMC §15.05.055(1): New development improvement standards: Fire apparatus access roads for one-, two- or multi-family residential developments shall be subject to the provisions of Sections D106 and D107, respectively, of Appendix D of the applicable International Fire Code. Additionally, such residential developments shall be subject to the requirements of Section D105 of Appendix D of the applicable International Fire Code pertaining to aerial fire apparatus roads, as applicable. All other applicable provisions of the International Fire Code, as now existing or as hereafter amended and adopted by the City, are required. Minimum requirements for the primary and secondary access will be at least twenty feet wide, unobstructed, paved lanes.
- (6) YMC §12.02.010: Establishment of easements: Public utility easements shall be established for the location of new and proposed public utility lines serving new land divisions and land development. Public utility easements shall also be established across the front of new lots and redeveloped lots to provide future utility access as determined necessary by the City Engineer. Public utility easements shall be dedicated (granted) at the time that subdivision and/or land use approval is granted.
- (7) YMC §12.02.020: Easement location and width: Eight-foot-wide utility easements shall be dedicated along the front of each lot in subdivisions and short subdivisions. Easements for new and/or future utility lines shall be a minimum of eight feet in width, or twice the buried depth of the utility, whichever is greater.
- (8) YMC §12.03.010: Sewer service required: Pursuant to YMC §12.03.010, all new lots and development shall be served by a sanitary sewer line located adjacent to the lot or development site.
- (9) <u>YMC §12.03.040</u>: <u>Minimum sewer size</u>: The minimum size for public sewer lines is eight inches in diameter.
- (10) YMC §12.03.070: Side sewer service: Each building containing sanitary facilities shall be served by a separate private side sewer line from a public main. Branched side sewers serving multiple buildings and properties shall not be permitted. Single side sewers serving multi-unit buildings are permitted.
- (11) YMC §12.03.090: Gravity flow required: Sewer lines shall be designed for gravity flow operation. Lift stations and force mains (pressurized lines) shall be limited to those locations and circumstances where they are consistent with the comprehensive sewer plan and are the preferable short-term solution to service the development site and other properties in the vicinity.

- (12) YMC §12.04.010: Water service required: All new lots and development shall be served by a public water supply line maintained by the City of Yakima, Nob Hill Water Company [Association], or other water purveyor, and located adjacent to the lot or development site. The water line shall be capable of providing sufficient flow and pressure to satisfy the fire flow and domestic service requirements of the proposed lots and development as approved by the City Engineer in cooperation with the Code Administration Manager and Water Irrigation Division Manager.
- (13) YMC §12.04.020: Water line extension required: Water lines shall be extended to the point where the adjoining property owner's responsibility for further extension begins. This typically requires extension across the street or easement frontage of the developing property. In some cases it will require dedication of an easement and a line extension across the property or extension along two or more sides of the developing property. Extensions will be consistent with and implement the City's adopted water comprehensive plan.
- (14) YMC §12.04.040: Minimum size and material standards: New water lines in the City of Yakima water system shall be constructed of Class 52 ductile iron and shall be a minimum of eight inches in diameter. Improvements and additions to the Nob Hill Water Company [Association] system shall conform to the requirements of Nob Hill Water Company [Association].
- (15) YMC §12.05.010: Sidewalk installation required: Sidewalks shall be installed along both sides of all new, improved and reconstructed streets. Projects which repair small portions of or maintain existing street shall not be considered "improvement" for the purpose of this section and shall not trigger the requirements of this section. Sidewalks shall also be installed across the frontage of all newly developed or redeveloped lots where feasible.
- (16) YMC §12.06.010: Street types, functional classification: The Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan, and/or the West Valley Neighborhood Plan, designates the functional classification of the principal arterial, minor arterial and collector streets and establishes their functional classification. All other streets are classified as local residential access.
- (17) YMC §12.06.030: Design standards, adjustment of standards: Final design of street improvements is subject to approval by the City Engineer. The City Engineer, at his discretion, is authorized to adjust these standards as necessary to facilitate the construction of new streets and improvement of existing streets. Projects which repair

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small portions of or maintain existing streets shall not be considered "improvements" for the purposes of this section.

- (18) YMC §12.06.070: Provision of street curbing: Barrier curbs shall be installed along all public streets. Rolled mountable curbs may be permitted along residential access streets. Curb design shall be consistent with the standards of the City Engineer.
- (19) YMC §12.06.080: Street lighting: A street light shall be installed at each street intersection and at midblock if the block exceeds five hundred feet in length. Street lights shall meet the design and placement standards of the City Engineer. Lighting improvements shall become the property of the City of Yakima upon installation and will thereafter be maintained by the City.
- (20) YMC §14.05.200(A-B): Allowance of bond in lieu of actual construction of improvements prior to approval of short plat or final plat: The subdivision or short subdivision applicant may, as an alternative to actual construction of any required improvements, provide a surety bond or other secure method providing for and securing to the City the actual construction of required improvements within a specified period of time and expressed in a bond or other appropriate instrument establishing such security. Any bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall specify the improvements covered and the schedule for completion. In cases of subdivision, the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall be subject to approval by the City Engineer and City Attorney prior to approval of the final plat by the City Council. In cases of short subdivisions, the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall be subject to approval by the City Engineer and City Attorney prior to approval of the final short plat by the Administrator. In no case shall the amount of the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements be less than one hundred ten percent of the estimated actual cost of the improvements based upon the approved civil engineering design of the required improvements.
- (21) RCW 58.17.110(1), YMC §14.20.100(A) and YMC §14.20.120(A): The city, town, or county legislative body shall inquire into the public use and interest proposed to be served by the establishment of the subdivision and dedication. It shall determine (a) if appropriate provisions are made for, but not limited to, the public health, safety and general welfare and for open spaces, drainage ways, streets or roads, alleys, other public ways, transit stops, potable water supplies, sanitary wastes, parks and recreation, playgrounds, schools and schoolgrounds, sidewalks, and other planning features that assure

safe walking conditions for students who walk to and from school; and (b) whether the public interest will be served by the subdivision and dedication.

XII. <u>Applicable Critical Areas Ordinance Provisions.</u> Applicable Critical Areas Ordinance regulatory provisions are as follows:

- (1) <u>Critical Area Development Authorization Required</u>: Pursuant to YMC §15.27.300(A), no new development, construction or use shall occur within a designated critical area without obtaining a development authorization in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, except for those provided for in YMC §15.27.303.
- (2) <u>General Critical Areas Protective Measures—Subdivision Standards</u>: Pursuant to YMC §15.27.321(B)(2)(a-d), critical areas shall be actively protected through the following:
 - (a) Roads and utilities for the subdivision shall avoid critical areas and their buffers, as much as possible.
 - (b) When geologically hazardous areas (excluding erosion, oversteepened slopes of intermediate risk, stream undercutting, and earthquake hazards), FEMA floodways, channel migration zones (CMZs), streams, wetlands and/or vegetative buffers fall within the boundary of a subdivision:
 - (i) Said critical areas shall be protected by placing them entirely within a separate critical area tract or by including them entirely within one of the developable parcels. Other options, such as conservation easements and building envelopes, may be deemed appropriate by the administrative official as meeting this provision when special circumstances obstruct the viability of this provision;
 - (ii) For those new lots that do contain said critical areas, usable building envelopes (five thousand square feet or more for residential uses) shall be provided on the plat that lies outside said critical areas.
 - (c) New lots partially within the floodplain shall provide a usable building envelope (five thousand square feet or more for residential uses) outside the floodplain.

- (d) Floodplains and critical areas shall be depicted on preliminary subdivision plats and relevant information about them disclosed on the final plat.
- (3) <u>Permitted Uses Floodway Fringe</u>: Pursuant to YMC §15.27.409(A), Detached Single-Family Dwellings is a permitted use within the floodway fringe (floodplain) as long as the proposal complies with the flood hazard protection standards of YMC §15.27.407 and YMC §15.27.408.
- (4) <u>Permitted Uses Floodway</u>: Pursuant to YMC §15.27.411(A), Detached Single-Family Dwellings is a permitted use within the floodway as long as the proposal complies with the flood hazard protection standards of YMC §15.27.407 and YMC §15.27.408. Pursuant to YMC §15.27.411(H), roads and bridges are permitted uses within the floodway as long as they comply with the regulations that are set forth in YMC §15.27.411(D).
- (5) <u>Subdivision Proposals</u>: YMC §15.27.407(F) requires that all subdivision proposals shall:
 - (a) Be consistent with the need to minimize flood damage;
 - (b) Have roadways, public utilities, and other facilities such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems located and constructed to minimize flood damage;
 - (c) Have adequate drainage provided to reduce exposure to flood damage;
 - (d) Include base flood elevation data; and
 - (e) In the cases where base flood elevation is not available and the subdivision is greater than five acres or fifty lots, a step-back water analysis shall be required to generate the base flood elevation data.
- **XIII.** <u>Preliminary Plat Findings.</u> YMC §14.20.100(A) provides that the Hearing Examiner shall consider a proposed preliminary plat during an open record public hearing in order to inquire into and determine whether the following standards and criteria are satisfied:
- (1) Subsection 14.20.100(A)(1) Consistency with the City's Urban Area Zoning Ordinance Intent, Design, Improvement and Development Provisions Applicable to the R-2 Zoning District. A determination of consistency with the City's

Urban Area Zoning Ordinance intent, design, improvement and development provisions applicable to the R-2 zoning district involves a consideration of the following provisions of Title 15 and Title 12 of the Yakima Municipal Code (YMC):

- (a) Consistency with the Intent of the Two-Family Residential (R-2) Zoning District: YMC §15.03.020(C) indicates that the intent of the R-2 zoning district is in part to establish and preserve residential neighborhoods for detached single-family dwellings, duplexes and other uses that are compatible with the intent of the district.
- (b) <u>Consistency with Design, Improvement and Development Provisions</u> <u>Applicable to the Two-Family Residential (R-2) Zoning District</u>: YMC Chapter 15.05 establishes certain basic development requirements. These are the minimum criteria that must be met to assure land use compatibility and promote the public health, safety and welfare. The proposed development meets the requirements applicable in the R-2 zoning district as follows:
 - (i) *Minimum Lot Size:* The lots ranging in size from 6,318 square feet to 47,895 square feet will meet the minimum 6,000-square-foot lot size requirement for single-family residences that will be located in the R-2 zoning district.
 - (ii) Building Envelopes: The preliminary plat indicates that building envelopes on the lots partially within the floodplain will range from approximately 6,745 to 12,660 square feet in size, which is consistent with the minimum 5,000-square-foot standard in YMC §15.27.321(B)(2)(c) of the CAO for residential uses.
 - (iii) *Minimum Lot Width:* The lots will all meet or exceed the minimum lot width of 50 feet prescribed for the R-2 zoning district by Table 5-2 of YMC Chapter 15.05.
 - (iv) *Maximum Lot Coverage:* The maximum lot coverage is the percentage of net land area of a site that can be covered with structures and other impervious surfaces. In the R-2 zoning district, the maximum lot coverage is 60%. All lots within the proposed preliminary plat have sufficient lot area to comply with this development standard.
 - (v) Structure Setbacks: In the residential zoning districts, structure setbacks are intended to provide light, air and emergency access. All lots in

the proposed preliminary plat have sufficient area to meet the setback requirements specified for the R-2 zoning district by YMC Table 5-1 in YMC Chapter 15.05 which are as follows:

Location	From Centerline Of Right-of-Way	From Property Line
Front	45 feet	20 feet
Rear	N/A	15 feet
Side (internal)	N/A	5 feet
Side (street)	40 feet	10 feet

- (vi) Maximum Building Height: The maximum building height in the R-2 zoning district is 35 feet (YMC Chapter 15.05, Table 5-1). The property is entirely within Zone 6 of the Airport Safety Overlay (ASO) which also limits the building height to 35 feet. The applicant's SEPA Environmental Policy Act Checklist states that the tallest structure will be no more than 35 feet in height so as to comply with both standards.
- (vii) Access: All lots will have at least 20 feet of frontage upon a public street or be accessed by a minimum 20-foot-wide access easement in accordance with YMC §15.05.020(H).
- (viii) *Sidewalk*: Curb, gutter and sidewalk will be constructed along all interior street frontages within the proposed preliminary plat as required by YMC §15.05.020(J).
- (ix) *Density:* The proposed preliminary plat which divides 15.62 net residential acres not including streets into 83 residential lots will have a density of 5.31 dwelling units per net residential acre with streets excluded (680,381 square feet ÷ 43,560 square feet = 15.62 acres; 83 dwelling units ÷ 15.62 acres = 5.31 dwelling units per net residential acre). This density complies with YMC §15.05.030(B) and YMC Table 4-1 of YMC Chapter 15.04 which allow up to 7 dwelling units per net residential acre in the R-2 zoning district as Class (1) permitted uses.
- (x) Street Right-of-Way/Dedication of Right-of-Way: The internal local access streets connecting to the existing Occidental Road by way of South 57th Avenue and South 58th Avenue on the north and connecting to

Ahtanum Road on the south all require the dedication of 50-foot-wide rights-of-way for the streets within the subdivision which shall be improved with curb, gutter and a five-foot-wide sidewalk on both sides of the streets.

- (xi) Frontage Improvements: Curb, gutter and sidewalk shall be installed along the lot frontages of internal streets in accordance with YMC 12.05.010. The street section shall conform to standard detail R3 and the new sidewalks shall be constructed per standard detail R5, in accordance with YMC Chapters 8.67 and 12.05. At a minimum, one street light shall be installed midblock on the westernmost section of the loop since the street exceeds 500 feet in total length. Street lighting shall meet the design and placement standards of the City Engineer. Lighting improvements shall become the property of the City of Yakima upon installation and will thereafter be maintained by the City. Pursuant to YCC Chapter 8.72, an excavation and street break permit shall be obtained for all work within the public right-of-way. Roads less than five years old can be cut, but will cost 150 percent of the restoration fee with no PCI discount.
- (xii) Wastewater: Sewer and a lift station have been extended across Occidental Road to the subject site. A minimum sixteen foot easement shall be maintained over all public utility lines in accordance with YMC §12.02.010 and YMC §12.02.020. All lots within the subject plat shall be served by a separate side sewer line from a public main in accordance with YMC §12.03.070. Sewer is to be installed per the Yakima Municipal Code.
- (xiii) *Water:* The applicant shall extend potable water to the lots of the plat in accordance with YMC §12.04.010. Water is provided by the Nob Hill Water Association, and the preliminary plat displays water service across all street frontages to serve all lots.
- (xiv) *Irrigation:* The subject parcel is located within the Ahtanum Irrigation District and therefore irrigation district approval is required upon the final plat.
- (xv) Easements: Easements are to be established in accordance with YMC §12.02.010 and YCC §12.02.020.
- (2) Subsection 14.20.100(A)(2) Consistency with the provisions of the Comprehensive Plan. The Future Land Use Map III-3 of the 2040 Yakima Urban Area

Comprehensive Plan designates the property within the proposed preliminary plat as suitable for Mixed Residential development which provides for a mixture of housing types and densities. As noted above, the proposed preliminary plat is consistent with the following Goal and Policies of the City's Comprehensive Plan:

- (a) Goal 2.3 which is to preserve and enhance the quality, character and function of Yakima's residential neighborhoods.
- (b) <u>Policy 2.3.1</u> which is to provide for a wide variety of housing types within the City to meet the full range of housing needs for Yakima's evolving population.
- (c) <u>Policy 2.3.2</u> which is to preserve and enhance established residential neighborhoods. Specifically: (A) Ensure that new development is compatible in scale, density and aesthetic quality to an established neighborhood.
- (3) Subsection 14.20.100(A)(3) Consistency with the provisions of this title, Title 14 entitled "Subdivision Ordinance." As proposed and with the recommended conditions, this preliminary plat will meet all the design requirements in YMC Chapter 14.20 of the City's subdivision ordinance and in the City's Title 12 development standards. This review and the recommended conditions are intended to ensure consistency with the provisions of the City's subdivision ordinance as well as other applicable City ordinances.
- (4) Subsection 14.20.100(A)(4) Appropriate provisions for enumerated features. As proposed and with the recommended conditions, this 83-lot Preliminary "Plat of Marylyn Place" will make appropriate provisions for the following features required by YMC 14.20.100(A)(4) and RCW 58.17.110:
 - (a) Public health, safety, welfare: The construction of new detached single-family dwellings will complement the existing adjacent single-family development to the north. It will promote the public health, safety and general welfare insofar as there is a need in this community for additional housing and insofar as this proposed preliminary plat will be required to comply with all applicable City development standards, and all conditions of approval that will be specified by the City Council.
 - (b) *Open spaces:* The proposed lots are larger than the minimum lot size required in the R-2 zoning district for single-family dwellings. The lot coverage limitation of not more than 60% in the R-2 zoning district will provide adequate

light and air for future residents in accordance with the standards in the zoning ordinance without additional open spaces.

- (c) *Drainage systems:* Drainage system facilities must be provided in accordance with state and local regulations, including the City of Yakima Municipal Code and the Eastern Washington Storm Water Manual.
- (d) Streets, alleys, and other public ways: The subject property will have access from the north by way of South 57th Avenue and South 58th Avenue which extend southerly from Occidental Road and also will have access from the south off of Ahtanum Road by way of South 58th Avenue. Those streets and the additional interior streets to be named South 60th Avenue, West Larch Avenue, West Oak Avenue and Woolsey Road will provide access to all of the lots.
- (e) *Water supplies:* Public water is required to be used for domestic and fire flow purposes. Nob Hill Water Association water is available to the site from Nob Hill Water Association by way of South 58th Avenue.
- (f) Sanitary waste disposal: Public sewer is required to service all lots within the subject development. A City of Yakima sewer main capable of serving the development which has been extended along Occidental Road runs southerly to the northern boundary of the proposed preliminary plat.
- (g) Parks and playgrounds: Open space, parks, recreation and playgrounds are located about 2.5 miles away from this subdivision at West Valley Park. The lot coverage limitation also provides open space on the lots for recreation and play areas.
- (h) Sites for schools: West Valley Middle Level Campus is located about 1.9 miles from this proposed subdivision, while Wide Hollow Elementary School is located about 2.4 miles from this proposed subdivision and West Valley High School is located approximately 2.9 miles from this proposed subdivision. No comments were submitted by the West Valley School District.
- (i) *Sidewalks:* Sidewalks are required and shall be provided along this development's internal streets (South 57th Avenue, South 58th Avenue. South 60th Avenue, West Larch Avenue, West Oak Avenue and Woolsey Road).
- (j) *Public Transit:* Yakima Transit Routes 2 and 5 pass the intersection of South 64th Avenue and West Washington Avenue approximately 0.9 of a mile north of the subdivision.

- (k) Serves the public use and interest: This proposed 83-lot residential subdivision is consistent with neighboring residential land uses, better serves the needs of the City than the present undeveloped status of the property and helps satisfy the need for additional housing within the City.
- (l) *Time Limitation:* Upon preliminary plat approval, the applicant has five years from the date of preliminary plat approval to submit the final plat. If more time is needed, at least 30 days prior to the expiration of preliminary approval, the applicant must submit to the City Council a written request to extend the approval period for a maximum period of one additional year (YMC §14.20.160). Before the final plat can be recorded, all required infrastructure must either be engineered, completed and inspected or be engineered and financially secured, and approval of the final plat must be obtained from the City of Yakima Community Development Department.

XIV. <u>Critical Areas Ordinance Findings.</u> Critical Areas Ordinance Findings are as follows:

- (1) This application was subject to Environmental Review which resulted in the issuance of a Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) on December 13, 2023.
- (2) Consistent with YMC §15.27.031(C)(2), the Administrative Official reviewed the available information pertaining to the proposal and made a determination that Critical Areas were present, but there is no impact.
- (3) Per YMC §15.27.309, it has been determined that a Standard Development Permit is required.
- (4) Consistent with YMC §15.27.311 relative to Authorization Decisions Basis for Action, the applicant meets the following criteria:

(a) Impact of the project to critical area features on the property and abutting property: The impact to critical area features will be minimal as long as the subdivision provides adequate building envelopes of at least 5,000 square feet outside the floodplain that crosses a northerly and westerly portion of Lot 78 and a northerly portion of lots 73 to 77 and of Lot 79. The floodplain does not cross any of the interior streets within the proposed preliminary plat.

- (b) Danger to life or property that would likely occur as a result of the project: The floodplain of Spring Creek Tributary 1 is located on a portion of Lots 73 to 79, but adequate building envelopes are provided on those lots.
- (c) Compatibility of the project to critical area features: Each lot encumbered by the floodplain will have a building envelope located outside of the floodplain. Since those lots are larger than the average size of the lots in the subdivision, floodwaters will be able to flow across them in a manner that will avoid the building envelopes where the homes will be located.
- (d) Conformance with applicable development standards: All applicable standards of YMC Chapter 15.27 will be met.
- (e) Compliance with the flood hazard mitigation requirements of YMC §15.27.400 through §15.27.436: The existing FEMA FIRM Panels 53077C1029F and 53077C1037E were revised in 2020 (Case No. 20-10-0066R) which on the site channelized the floodplain through Cottonwood Place on the subdivision to the north which allowed the building envelopes for the affected lots in this subdivision to be located outside of the floodplain.
- (f) Adequacy of the information provided by the applicant or available to the division: The application that was submitted is adequate for review.
- (g) Alternative Courses of Action: Based upon the project evaluation, the decision maker shall take one of the following actions:
 - (i) Grant the development authorization;
 - (ii) Grant the development authorization with conditions as allowed by YMC §15.27.312 in order to mitigate impacts to the critical area feature(s); or
 - (iii) Deny the development authorization.
- (5) Since the consideration of the Critical Areas Standard Development Permit has been consolidated for review with the Preliminary Long Plat application, the Hearing Examiner recommends that the City Council grant the Critical Areas Standard Development Permit development authorization in conjunction with approval of the Preliminary "Plat of Marylyn Place."

- XV. <u>Consistency Analysis Conducted Pursuant to Subsection 16.06.020(B) of</u>
 <u>the Yakima Municipal Code.</u> The consistency analysis for this proposed Preliminary
 "Plat of Marylyn Place" is as follows:
- (1) The type of land use contemplated by the proposal (a single-family residential development) is permitted on this site so long as it complies with the conditions imposed by the Yakima City Council, as well as the regulations of the zoning ordinance, subdivision ordinance, building codes and other applicable regulations. The proposed single-family dwellings are Class (1) permitted uses in the R-2 zoning district.
- (2) The level of development with the maximum lot coverage density of 60% and with lots that are larger than the minimum lot size requirements will not exceed the allowable level of development in the Two-Family Residential (R-2) zoning district.
- (3) The availability and adequacy of infrastructure and public facilities is not an issue because the additional infrastructure that will be provided at the applicant's expense will ensure that adequate infrastructure and public facilities are available for the proposed preliminary long plat.
- (4) The character of the proposal, such as the proposal's consistency with applicable development standards of the City's Urban Area Zoning Ordinance, primarily involves consideration of specific development standards relating to lot size, access, potable water, sewage disposal and other features of the proposed preliminary plat which have been discussed in detail above. With the recommended conditions, the proposed Preliminary "Plat of Marylyn Place" with the requisite Standard Critical Areas Standard Development Permit will be consistent with the development standards of applicable City ordinances.

CONCLUSIONS

Based on the foregoing Findings, the Hearing Examiner concludes as follows:

(1) The Hearing Examiner has jurisdiction to recommend to the Yakima City Council the approval of the proposed Preliminary "Plat of Marylyn Place" with a Critical Areas Standard Development Permit pursuant to YMC §1.43.080, YMC §14.20.100 and YMC Chapter 15.27.

- (2) A SEPA Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was issued for this proposed preliminary plat on December 13, 2023, which became final without any appeal.
- (3) Notices for the public hearing were given in accordance with applicable ordinance requirements.
- (4) The proposed Preliminary "Plat of Marylyn Place," with the requested Critical Areas Standard Development Permit and subject to all of the conditions detailed below, is in compliance with the applicable provisions of the City's 2040 Comprehensive Plan, zoning ordinance and subdivision ordinance; makes appropriate provisions for the public health, safety and general welfare and for open spaces, drainage ways, streets, transit stops, potable water supplies, sanitary wastes, parks and recreation, playgrounds and sidewalks; and, according to the weight of the evidence presented at the hearing, does not require that specific provisions be made for the other requisite plat considerations such as additional schools, additional schoolgrounds or additional planning features that assure safe walking conditions for students who walk to and from school; and said plat will serve the public use and interest.
- (5) This proposed Preliminary "Plat of Marylyn Place" with the requested Critical Area Standard Development Permit is in compliance with all of the consistency requirements of Subsection 16.06.020(B) of the Yakima Municipal Code.

RECOMMENDATION

The Hearing Examiner recommends to the Yakima City Council that the proposed 83-lot Preliminary "Plat of Marylyn Place" dated September 20. 2023, and the requested Critical Areas Standard Development Permit which are described in the application, staff report, this Recommendation and the other related documents assigned the file numbers PLP#001-23, CAO#021-23 and SEPA#009-23 be APPROVED, subject to compliance with the following conditions:

(A) Prior to approval of the final plat, all required improvements shall be constructed or financially secured according to the standards and requirements of the City Engineer and YMC Title 12;

- (B) All lots shall be served with public water from the Nob Hill Water Association. No individual domestic or irrigation wells shall be permitted for any of the lots. Prior to final plat approval, written verification from the Nob Hill Water Association must be submitted to the Planning Division indicating that each lot within the plat has been served with domestic water and applicable fees have been paid;
- (C) All lots shall be provided with public sewer service according to YMC Title 12 standards. Prior to final plat approval, written verification from the City of Yakima Engineering Department must be provided to the Planning Division indicating that all sewer extensions have been completed and inspected or financially secured;
- (D) Eight-foot-wide utility easements shall be dedicated along the front of each lot in subdivisions and short subdivisions. Easements for new and/or future utility lines shall be a minimum eight feet in width or twice the buried depth of the utility, whichever is greater;
- (E) All public and private utilities shall be located underground, with the exception of telephone boxes and such similar structures;
- (F) All public and private utilities to be located within public road rights-of-way must be constructed prior to the start of road construction;
- (G) All interior roads shown on the preliminary plat shall be constructed with curb, gutter and five-foot-wide sidewalks on both sides of the street, and street lighting in accordance with YMC Chapter 12.06, Standard Detail R5, and WSDOT Curb and Sidewalk Plans F-10.12-03;
- (H) An excavation and street break permit shall be obtained for all work within the public right-of-way. Roads less than five years old can be cut, but will cost 150 percent of the restoration fee with no PCI discount;
- (I) All frontage improvements shall be completed or bonded for prior to long plat approval. Civil engineering plans for public improvements shall be approved prior to bonding for public improvements;
- (J) At the discretion of the City Engineer, the owner may bond for required frontage improvements or enter into a deferral agreement for future participation in the cost of any frontage and/or roadway improvement by means of a Local Improvement District (LID) which is constructed abutting the owner's property. The bond or deferral agreement shall be executed and recorded prior to or as part of approval of the plat;

- (K) Roadway sections within the floodplain/floodway shall be constructed in accordance with applicable regulations of YMC Chapter 15.27, Part Four;
- (L) Fire hydrants shall be placed at the locations specified by Code Administration and the Washington State Fire Code. All lots must be provided with adequate fire flow;
 - (M) All permits required by the Department of Ecology shall be obtained;
 - (N) A Large Project Stormwater Permit shall be obtained;
 - (O) Streetlights shall be installed per the direction of the Engineering Division;
- (P) This plat shall be subject to the following notes, which must be placed on the face of the plat:
 - (1) The addresses shown on this plat are accurate as of the date of recording, but may be subject to change. The City of Yakima Code Administration is responsible for the confirmation or reassignment of addresses at the time of building permit issuance.

- **A.** <u>Introduction.</u> The preliminary findings relative to the hearing process for this matter are as follows:
- (1) The Hearing Examiner conducted an open record public hearing for this application on January 11, 2024.
- (2) The Planning Division staff report presented by Assistant Planner Connor Kennedy recommended approval subject to conditions of this application for a 93-lot single-family residential preliminary long plat with 46 of the lots having attached single-family common wall dwellings located on them. The applicant's representative for this application who testified at the hearing, Colleda Monick of HLA Engineering and Land Surveying, Inc., presented testimony in favor of the approval of the proposed preliminary plat that has lots for 47 detached single-family dwellings and for 46 Class (2) attached single-family common wall dwellings.

- (3) Written comments were submitted prior to the hearing by the City's Development Services Team, the Nob Hill Water Association, the Ahtanum Irrigation District, the Washington State Department of Ecology and the Washington State Department of Transportation Aviation Division.
- (4) No other testimony or written comments were submitted at or before the open record public hearing. This Recommendation has been submitted to the Planning Division within 10 business days of the public hearing.
- **B.** <u>Summary of Recommendation.</u> The Hearing Examiner recommends that the City Council approve this proposed 93-lot single-family residential Preliminary "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1" with 46 of the lots to have attached single-family common wall dwellings located on them, subject to conditions.
- C. <u>Basis for Recommendation</u>. Based on a view of the site with no one else present on January 10, 2024; the staff report, exhibits, testimony and other evidence presented at the open record public hearing conducted on January 11, 2024; and a consideration of the applicable subdivision requirements, zoning ordinance requirements, development standards and consistency criteria; the Hearing Examiner makes the following:

FINDINGS

I. Applicant, Property Owner and Representative. The applicant/property owner is Prickly Pear Holdings, LLC, 2550 Borton Road, Yakima, WA 98903. The representative of the applicant/property owner for this proposal who testified at the hearing is Colleda Monick of HLA Engineering and Land Surveying, Inc., 2803 River Road, Yakima, WA 98902.

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II. Location. The location of the proposed preliminary plat is north of Ahtanum Road

in the vicinity of 4607 and 4701 Ahtanum Road east of South 52nd Avenue. The Yakima

County Assessor's Parcel Numbers of the site are 181204-13016 and 181204-13018.

III. Applications. The application for a 21.06-acre 93-lot Preliminary Long Plat (PLP)

was received on October 9, 2023, and deemed complete for processing on November 7,

2023. The Preliminary Long Plat application and related applications for Type (2)

Review to allow Class (2) attached single-family common wall dwellings to be located

on 46 of the lots and for State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) Review are being

processed under Yakima Municipal Code (YMC) Chapter 14.20 for Subdivision Review,

defines such uses as two single-family dwellings that are attached, but with each dwelling

VI. Comprehensive Plan. The site of the proposed Preliminary "Plat of Champions

Park Phase 1" is located both within the Low Density Residential designation and the

Mixed Residential designation of the Comprehensive Plan. Those designations

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respectively provide areas for low density residential uses and areas for a mixture of housing types and densities. The following goals and policies apply to this proposal:

Goal 2.2: Provide a mix of land use designations consistent with the community's vision.

Policy 2.2.1: Low density residential – this designation provides for low density residential development. Single-family detached dwellings are the predominant dwelling type. Other dwelling types may be allowed under certain circumstances, such as accessory dwellings and cottage housing. The permitted density is up to seven net dwelling units per acre for infill development. On larger sites (over two acres), more flexibility in lot sizes and layout are envisioned, provided overall density standards are met. Permitted maximum densities on large sites is up to seven gross dwelling units per acre. Density bonuses allowing up to six gross dwelling units may be allowed subject to conformance with traditional neighborhood design concepts.

Goal 2.3: Preserve and enhance the quality, character, and function of Yakima's residential neighborhoods.

Policy 2.3.1: Provide for a wide variety of housing types within the city to meet the full range of housing needs for Yakima's evolving population.

Policy 2.3.2: Preserve and enhance established residential neighborhoods. Specifically: (A) Ensure that new development is compatible in scale, density, and aesthetic quality to an established neighborhood.

VII. Zoning and Land Use. The 21.06-acre site is located within the Single-Family Residential (R-1) zoning district and the Two-Family Residential (R-2) zoning district. It is currently vacant. The main purpose of the Yakima Urban Area Zoning Ordinance (UAZO) in Title 15 of the Yakima Municipal Code (YMC) is to implement the Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan and promote the general health, safety and welfare of the present and future inhabitants of the Yakima Urban Area. YMC §15.03.020(B)

provides that the purpose and intent of the Single-Family Residential (R-1) zoning district is to:

- (1) Establish new residential neighborhoods for detached single-family dwellings free from other uses except those which are compatible with, and serve the residents of, this district, which may include duplexes and zero lot lines if established during the subdivision process; and
- (2) Preserve existing residential neighborhoods for detached single-family dwellings free from other uses to ensure the preservation of the existing residential character, and serve the residents of this district; and
- (3) Locate moderate-density residential development, up to seven dwelling units per net residential acre, in areas served by public water and sewer system.
- (4) Detached single-family dwellings are the primary use in this district. The district is characterized by up to sixty percent lot coverage; access to individual lots by local access streets; required front, rear and side yard setbacks; and one- and two-story structures. The density in the district is generally seven dwelling units per net residential acre or less.
- (5) This zone is intended to afford single-family neighborhoods the highest level of protection from encroachment by potentially incompatible nonresidential land uses or impacts. Nonresidential uses within these zones are not allowed; except for public or quasi-public uses, which will be required to undergo extensive public review and will have all necessary performance or design standards assigned to them as necessary to mitigate potential impacts to adjacent residences.
- (6) Duplex and multifamily development up to seven dwelling units per net residential acre may be allowed in accordance with YMC Chapter 15.04, Table 4-1.

Relative to the Two-Family Residential (R-2) zoning district, YMC §15.03.020(C) states that the purpose and intent of the R-2 zoning district is to:

- (1) Establish and preserve residential neighborhoods for detached single-family dwellings, duplexes and other uses compatible with the intent of this district; and
- (2) Locate residential development with densities up to twelve dwelling units per net residential acre in areas receiving a full range of public services including public water and sewer service, and police and fire protection.

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- (3) The district is characterized by up to sixty percent lot coverage, access via local access streets and collectors, one- and two-story buildings, some clustering of units, and required front, rear and side yard setbacks. Typical uses in this district are single-family dwellings and duplexes. The density in this district generally ranges from seven to twelve dwelling units per net residential acre. However, development up to eighteen dwelling units per net residential acre may be allowed in accordance with YMC Chapter 15.04, Table 4-1.
 - (4) The zoning and the land uses of the surrounding properties are as follows:

VIII. Environmental Review. This application was required to undergo SEPA State Environmental Policy Act review because it proposes to subdivide the property into more than 30 single-family lots. Notice was mailed on November 17, 2023, and the public comment period ended on December 1, 2023. No comments from neighbors or the general public were received, but comments from several public agencies will be set forth in this Recommendation. A SEPA Determination of Nonsignficance (DNS) was issued for this proposal by the City's SEPA Responsible Official on December 13, 2023, which was not appealed.

IX. Transportation Concurrency Ordinance. The applicant applied for Transportation Concurrency (TCO#008-23) on October 9, 2023, and this proposal was approved for Concurrency on January 4, 2024, after Engineering coordinated with Yakima County regarding traffic data for County arterial streets. The development will

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not exceed the PM peak hour capacity of the City arterial system, and reserve capacity exists on all impacted arterial streets.

- X. <u>Written Comments.</u> The following written comments were submitted by the City of Yakima Development Services Team which met on November 14, 2023, and also by the Nob Hill Water Association, the Ahtanum Irrigation District, the Washington State Department of Ecology and the Washington State Department of Transportation Aviation Division.
- (1) Code Administration: The City of Yakima Code Administration comments were as follows:
 - (a) Pursuant to the Chapter 5 of the Washington State Fire Code (WSFC), publicly available fire hydrants will be required along streets spaced at intervals that will provide required fire flow coverage for proposed structures pursuant to WSFC Appendix C.
 - (b) Required items such as, but not limited to, fire department apparatus access roads, turnarounds, hammerheads, sanitary sewer systems, fire hydrants or other fire/life/safety site improvements shall be installed and approved prior to final plat approval.
 - (c) Bonding (if applicable) in lieu of required improvements is subject to approval of the City Engineer.
 - (d) These findings are not intended to be an exhaustive review of this proposal.
 - (e) All addresses shall be clearly shown on the face of the Final Plat (RCW 58.17.280). Additionally, a note shall be shown on the face of the Final Plat stating: "The addresses shown on this plat are accurate as of the date of recording, but may be subject to change. The City of Yakima Code Administration Division is responsible for the confirmation or reassignment of addresses at the time of building permit issuance." - (2) Engineering: This project proposes that 21.06 acres be developed into 93 new single-family lots, including 46 common wall dwellings at 4607 & 4701 Lower Ahtanum Rd., also known as "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1." The property currently is two vacant parcels. The proposed development will cause increased pedestrian and vehicle traffic without adequate safety precautions for pedestrians. The proposed development has the potential for more frequent trips in and out of the property. Current frontage infrastructure is not adequate enough to handle the new proposed 93 single-family lots, including 46 common wall dwellings. In order to alleviate the resulting impacts from the change in use proposal, the City is requiring the following improvements:
 - (a) YMC 8.60 and 12.05 New curb, gutter, ADA ramps and 5-foot sidewalk, including associated storm drainage, shall be installed. Street improvements shall conform to standard detail R3. New sidewalks shall be constructed per standard detail R5.
 - (b) YMC 8.64 and 15.06.065 Residential driveway approaches are required which meet the requirements of this chapter and standard detail R4. Driveway width shall be a maximum of 20 feet.
 - (c) YMC 12.06.020 Right-of-way Applicant shall determine adequate dedication of right-of-way for all new/proposed roads.
 - (d) YMC 15.05.040 Clear vision triangles shall be maintained per this chapter.

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- (e) YMC 12.06.080 Street lighting Street lights shall be installed per this chapter.
- (f) YMC 12.02 Easements shall be established and maintained per this chapter.
- (g) YMC 8.72 An excavation and street break permit shall be obtained for all work within the public right-of-way.

An ENG permit is required for all civil work to be performed on site. Professional engineered civil plans with PE stamp shall be submitted for review and approval. All improvements shall be completed prior to Certificate of Occupancy. Traffic generated from development is proposed to enter/exit the Arterial Street System on the County roads of Ahtanum Road and Washington Avenue.

- (3) Surface Water: Surface water commented that this large project will require a SWPPP Permit for construction activities. Prior to any grading, a stormwater pollution prevention plan shall be submitted for approval to the Surface Water Engineer, and all temporary erosion and sediment control measures shall be in place and be inspected by the City. For the long plat itself I have no comments.
- (4) Wastewater: Sewer will need to be extended on site per City of Yakima Title 12 requirements and Engineering standard details.
- (5) Nob Hill Water Association: Nob Hill Water Association has the capacity to serve a long plat in this area. Engineered drawings will need to be submitted to Nob Hill Water in order for the new water infrastructure to be designed and installed by Nob Hill Water.
- (6) Ahtanum Irrigation District: The above parcels have no surface water rights established in the Final Decree (2019), the Conditional Final Order Subbasin No. 23 (Ahtanum) (2019), and the Final Schedule of Rights dated May 9, 2019 in State of Washington. Dept. of Ecology v. Acquavella, et al (2019). No irrigation water will be provided by our District to these parcels. However, our Board must sign off on the plat for this subdivision. The surveyor will need to provide us with the original Mylar, as well as one copy, for District signature. As our Board meets once per month, please telephone in advance for meeting dates to avoid delays. If any further information is required, you can contact us at (509) 249-0226.

- (7) **Department of Ecology (DOE):** DOE water resources comments regarding the proposed Preliminary Plat of Champions Park Phase 1 were as follows:
 - (a) Dust Control from a Well: If you plan to use water for dust suppression at your project site, be sure that you have a legal right. In Washington State, prospective water users must obtain authorization from the Department of Ecology before diverting surface water or withdrawing ground water, with one exception. Ground water withdrawals of up to 5,000 gallons per day used for single or group domestic supply, up to 5,000 gallons per day used for industrial purposes, stock watering, and for the irrigation of up to one-half acre of non-commercial lawn and garden are exempt from the permitting process. Water use under the RCW 90.44.050 exemption establishes a water right that is subject to the same privileges, restrictions, laws and regulations as a water right permit or certificate obtained directly from Ecology. Temporary permits may be obtainable in a short time-period. The concern of Water Resources is for existing water rights. In some instances water may need to be obtained from a different area and hauled in or from an existing water right holder. If you have any questions or would like to respond to these Water Resources comments, please contact Christopher Kossik at 509-379-1826 or email at christopher.kossik@ecy.wa.gov.
 - (b) Dam Safety Office: Under RCW 90.03.350, a Dam Safety construction permit is required for those dams or ponds that can impound a volume of 10 acrefeet or more of water or other liquids above ground level. The Prickly Pear Holdings LLC "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1" development references the construction of stormwater facilities, if this includes a stormwater pond(s) that can meet or exceed the above referenced criteria, you will need to apply for a dam construction permit. To determine if a Dam Safety construction permit is required for your project, the applicant must submit a set of construction plans to: WA Department of Ecology, Dam Safety Office, P.O. Box 47600, Olympia, WA 98504-7600. The construction permit application can be found by entering the following link into your search engine: https://apps.ecology.wa.gov/publications/summarypages/ecy07038.html. For additional information, please contact Charlotte Lattimore by e-mail at clat461@ecy.wa.gov or by telephone at 360-407-6066.
- (8) WSDOT Aviation Division: The documentation for this proposal was reviewed on November 27, 2023, and December 20, 2023. This development is within Land Use Compatibility Zone 6 for the Yakima Air Terminal in which this type of project is permitted. Due to the proximity to the Yakima Air Terminal Airport, it is

recommended that a real estate disclosure about the airport be required for all sales of homes within this site to notify individuals that they are in close proximity to the airport (1.2 miles) and may be exposed to aircraft noise and overflights of the property.

XI. <u>Applicable Subdivision Ordinance and Statutory Provisions.</u> Applicable subdivision ordinance and statutory provisions are as follows:

- (1) YMC §15.05.030(A): Creation of new lots Subdivision requirements: Table of Subdivision Requirements: The YMC §15.05.030(A) Table establishes basic development criteria for lot size and width that must be met when reviewing an application for a new subdivision. For detached single-family dwelling construction in the R-2 zoning district, the required minimum lot size is 6,000 square feet.
- (2) YMC §15.30.040: Airport Safety Overlay Zones: The subject property is located in Zone 6 of the Airport Safety Overlay, and per YMC §15.30.060, detached single-family dwellings are Class (1) uses.
- (3) YMC §15.30.050: Height Limitation: Height Limitation 2 (AOD Zone 6): No building within this zone shall exceed thirty-five feet above the ground. Any building proposed to exceed this height must undergo further review by the airport manager and the FAA. The administrative official may require lights or markers as a warning to aircraft on any buildings, structures, communication towers, uses, or trees, or the topping of any trees to reduce their height, when recommended by the FAA, WSDOT Aviation Division or the airport manager. Lights and markers shall meet FAA specifications. Whenever the height limitations of this section differ from those of any other section of this chapter, or that adopted by another local ordinance or regulation, the more restrictive limitation shall apply.
- (4) YMC §15.05.055(1): New development improvement standards: Fire apparatus access roads for one-, two- or multiple-family residential developments shall be subject to the provisions of Sections D106 and D107, respectively, of Appendix D of the applicable International Fire Code. Additionally, such residential developments shall be subject to the requirements of Section D105 of Appendix D of the applicable International Fire Code pertaining to aerial fire apparatus roads, as applicable. All other applicable provisions of the International Fire Code, as now existing or as hereafter amended and adopted by the City, are required. Minimum requirements for the primary and secondary access will be at least twenty feet wide, unobstructed, paved lanes.

- (5) YMC §12.02.010: Establishment of easements: Public utility easements shall be established for the location of new and proposed public utility lines serving new land divisions and land development. Public utility easements shall also be established across the front of new lots and redeveloped lots to provide future utility access as determined necessary by the City Engineer. Public utility easements shall be dedicated (granted) at the time that subdivision and/or land use approval is granted.
- (6) YMC §12.02.020: Easement location and width: Eight-foot-wide utility easements shall be dedicated along the front of each lot in subdivisions and short subdivisions. Easements for new and/or future utility lines shall be a minimum of eight feet in width, or twice the buried depth of the utility, whichever is greater.
- (7) YMC §12.03.010: Sewer service required: Pursuant to YMC §12.03.010, all new lots and development shall be served by a sanitary sewer line located adjacent to the lot or development site.
- (8) YMC §12.03.040: Minimum sewer size: The minimum size for public sewer lines is eight inches in diameter.
- (9) YMC §12.03.070: Side sewer service: Each building containing sanitary facilities shall be served by a separate private side sewer line from a public main. Branched side sewers serving multiple buildings and properties shall not be permitted. Single side sewers serving multi-unit buildings are permitted.
- (10) YMC §12.03.090: Gravity flow required: Sewer lines shall be designed for gravity flow operation. Lift stations and force mains (pressurized lines) shall be limited to those locations and circumstances where they are consistent with the comprehensive sewer plan and are the preferable short-term solution to service the development site and other properties in the vicinity.
- (11) YMC §12.04.010: Water service required: All new lots and development shall be served by a public water supply line maintained by the City of Yakima, Nob Hill Water Company [Association], or other water purveyor, and located adjacent to the lot or development site. The water line shall be capable of providing sufficient flow and pressure to satisfy the fire flow and domestic service requirements of the proposed lots and development as approved by the City Engineer in cooperation with the Code Administration Manager and Water Irrigation Division Manager.
- (12) YMC §12.04.020: Water line extension required: Water lines shall be extended to the point where the adjoining property owner's responsibility for further

extension begins. This typically requires extension across the street or easement frontage of the developing property. In some cases it will require dedication of an easement and a line extension across the property or extension along two or more sides of the developing property. Extensions will be consistent with and implement the City's adopted water comprehensive plan.

- (13) YMC §12.04.040: Minimum size and material standards: New water lines in the City of Yakima water system shall be constructed of Class 52 ductile iron and shall be a minimum of eight inches in diameter. Improvements and additions to the Nob Hill Water Company [Association] system shall conform to the requirements of Nob Hill Water Company [Association].
- (14) YMC §12.05.010: Sidewalk installation required: Sidewalks shall be installed along both sides of all new, improved and reconstructed streets. Projects which repair small portions of or maintain existing street shall not be considered "improvement" for the purpose of this section and shall not trigger the requirements of this section. Sidewalks shall also be installed across the frontage of all newly developed or redeveloped lots where feasible.
- (15) YMC §12.06.010: Street types, functional classification: The Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan, and/or the West Valley Neighborhood Plan, designates the functional classification of the principal arterial, minor arterial and collector streets and establishes their functional classification. All other streets are classified as local residential access.
- (16) YMC §12.06.030: Design standards, adjustment of standards: Final design of street improvements is subject to approval by the City Engineer. The City Engineer, at his discretion, is authorized to adjust these standards as necessary to facilitate the construction of new streets and improvement of existing streets. Projects which repair small portions of or maintain existing streets shall not be considered "improvements" for the purposes of this section.
- (17) YMC §12.06.070: Provision of street curbing: Barrier curbs shall be installed along all public streets. Rolled mountable curbs may be permitted along residential access streets. Curb design shall be consistent with the standards of the City Engineer.
- (18) YMC §12.06.080: Street lighting: A street light shall be installed at each street intersection and at midblock if the block exceeds five hundred feet in length. Street lights shall meet the design and placement standards of the City Engineer. Lighting

improvements shall become the property of the City of Yakima upon installation and will thereafter be maintained by the City.

- (19) YMC §14.05.200(A-B): Allowance of bond in lieu of actual construction of improvements prior to approval of short plat or final plat: The subdivision or short subdivision applicant may, as an alternative to actual construction of any required improvements, provide a surety bond or other secure method providing for and securing to the City the actual construction of required improvements within a specified period of time and expressed in a bond or other appropriate instrument establishing such security. Any bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall specify the improvements covered and the schedule for completion. In cases of subdivision, the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall be subject to approval by the City Engineer and City Attorney prior to approval of the final plat by the City Council. In cases of short subdivisions, the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall be subject to approval by the City Engineer and City Attorney prior to approval of the final short plat by the Administrator. In no case shall the amount of the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements be less than one hundred ten percent of the estimated actual cost of the improvements based upon the approved civil engineering design of the required improvements.
- (20) RCW 58.17.110(1), YMC §14.20.100(A) and YMC §14.20.120(A): The city, town, or county legislative body shall inquire into the public use and interest proposed to be served by the establishment of the subdivision and dedication. It shall determine (a) if appropriate provisions are made for, but not limited to, the public health, safety and general welfare and for open spaces, drainage ways, streets or roads, alleys, other public ways, transit stops, potable water supplies, sanitary wastes, parks and recreation, playgrounds, schools and schoolgrounds, sidewalks, and other planning features that assure safe walking conditions for students who walk to and from school; and (b) whether the public interest will be served by the subdivision and dedication.

XII. <u>Applicable Type (2) Review Ordinance Provisions.</u> Applicable Ordinance provisions relative to Type (2) Review of Class (2) uses are as follows:

(1) <u>Class (2) Land Use Defined:</u> Pursuant to YMC §15.04.020(B), "Class (2) uses are generally permitted in the district. However, the compatibility between a Class

- (2) use and the surrounding environment cannot be determined in advance, and occasionally a Class (2) use may be incompatible at a particular location. Therefore, a Type (2) review by the administrative official is required in order to promote compatibility with the intent and character of the district and the policies and development criteria of the Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan. The procedures in YMC Ch. 15.14 shall be used to review and evaluate Class (1) uses that require a Type (2) review process."
- (2) <u>Type (2) Review</u>: Pursuant to YMC §15.14.020, Type (2) Review is required for any proposed use shown on Table 4-1 as a Class (2) use, for Class (1) uses requiring Type (2) review in YMC 15.13.020; and for other specific reviews established by this title.
- **XIII.** <u>Preliminary Plat Findings.</u> YMC §14.20.100(A) provides that the Hearing Examiner shall consider a proposed preliminary plat during an open record public hearing to inquire into and determine whether the following standards and criteria are satisfied:
- (1) Subsection 14.20.100(A)(1) Consistency with the City's Urban Area Zoning Ordinance Intent, Design, Improvement and Development Provisions Applicable to the R-1 and R-2 Zoning Districts. A determination of consistency with the City's Urban Area Zoning Ordinance intent, design, improvement and development provisions applicable to the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts involves a consideration of the following provisions of Title 15 and Title 12 of the Yakima Municipal Code (YMC):
 - (a) Consistency with the Intent of the Single-Family Residential (R-1) and Two-Family Residential (R-2) Zoning Districts: YMC §15.03.020(B) and YMC §15.03.020(C) indicate that the intent of both the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts is in part to establish and preserve residential neighborhoods for detached single-family dwellings, duplexes and other uses that are compatible with the district.
 - (b) <u>Consistency with Design, Improvement and Development Provisions</u>
 <u>Applicable to the Single-Family Residential (R-1) and Two-Family Residential (R-2) Zoning Districts</u>: YMC Chapter 15.05 establishes certain basic development requirements. These are the minimum criteria that must be met to assure land use compatibility and promote the public health, safety and welfare. The proposed

development meets the requirements applicable in the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts as follows:

- (i) *Minimum Lot Size*: The proposed lots which range in size from 3,718 square feet to 30,746 square feet will meet the minimum lot sizes required by Table 5-1 of YMC Chapter 15.05 for both the detached single-family residential dwellings as well as the attached single-family common wall dwellings.
- (ii) Minimum Lot Width: All of the lots will meet or exceed the minimum lot width of 50 feet prescribed for detached single-family dwellings and attached single-family common wall dwellings in the R-1 zoning district and the minimum lot width of 35 feet prescribed for attached single-family common wall dwellings in the R-2 zoning district by Table 5-2 of YMC Chapter 15.05.
- (iii) Maximum Lot Coverage: The maximum lot coverage is the percentage of net land area of a site that can be covered with structures and other impervious surfaces. In the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts, the maximum lot coverage is 60%. All lots within the proposed preliminary plat have sufficient lot area to comply with this development standard.
- (iv) *Structure Setbacks:* In the residential zoning districts, structure setbacks are intended to provide light, air and emergency access. All lots in the proposed preliminary plat have sufficient area to meet the setback requirements specified by YMC Table 5-1 in YMC Chapter 15.05 for the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts which are as follows:

(v) *Maximum Building Height:* The maximum building height in the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts is 35 feet (YMC Chapter 15.05, Table 5-1). The property is entirely within Zone 6 of the Airport Safety Overlay (ASO)

which also limits the building height to 35 feet. The applicant's SEPA Environmental Policy Act Checklist states that the tallest structure will be no more than 35 feet in height so as to comply with both standards.

- (vi) Access: All lots will have at least 20 feet of frontage upon a public street or be accessed by a minimum 20-foot-wide access easement in accordance with YMC §15.05.020(H).
- (vii) *Sidewalk*: Curb, gutter and sidewalk will be constructed along all interior street frontages of the proposed preliminary plat as required by YMC §15.05.020(J).
- (viii) *Density:* The proposed preliminary plat which divides 13.34 net residential acres not including streets into 93 residential lots will have a density of 6.97 dwelling units per net residential acre with streets excluded (581,223 square feet ÷ 43,560 square feet = 13.34 acres; 93 dwelling units ÷ 13.34 acres = 6.97 dwelling units per net residential acre). This density complies with YMC §15.05.030(B) and YMC Table 4-1 of YMC Chapter 15.04 which allow up to 7 dwelling units per net residential acre in the R-1 zoning district and which allow up to 12 dwelling units per net residential acre in the R-2 zoning district as Class (1) and Class (2) uses.
- (ix) Street Right-of-Way/Dedication of Right-of-Way: The internal local access streets connecting to Ahtanum Road on the south and connecting to South 52nd Avenue on the west all require the dedication of 50-foot-wide rights-of-way for the connecting streets and all of the streets within the subdivision which shall be improved with curb, gutter and a five-foot-wide sidewalk on both sides of the streets.
- (x) Frontage Improvements: Curb, gutter, ADA ramps and sidewalk shall be installed along the lot frontages of internal streets in accordance with YMC 12.05.010. The street section shall conform to standard detail R3 and the new sidewalks shall be constructed per standard detail R5, in accordance with YMC Chapters 8.67 and 12.05. At a minimum, one street light shall be installed midblock where the street exceeds 500 feet in total length. Street lighting shall meet the design and placement standards of the City Engineer. Lighting improvements shall become the property of the City of Yakima upon installation and will thereafter be maintained by the City. Pursuant to YCC Chapter 8.72, an excavation and street break permit

shall be obtained for all work within the public right-of-way. Roads less than five years old can be cut, but will cost 150 percent of the restoration fee with no PCI discount.

- (xi) *Wastewater:* A minimum sixteen foot easement shall be maintained over all public utility lines in accordance with YMC §12.02.010 and YMC §12.02.020. All lots within the subject plat shall be served by a separate side sewer line from a public main in accordance with YMC §12.03.070. Sewer is to be installed per the Yakima Municipal Code.
- (xii) *Water*: The applicant shall extend potable water to the lots of the plat in accordance with YMC §12.04.010. Water is provided by the Nob Hill Water Association, and the preliminary plat displays water service across all street frontages to serve all lots.
- (xiii) *Irrigation:* The subject parcel is located within the Ahtanum Irrigation District and therefore irrigation district approval is required upon the final plat.
- (xiv) *Easements:* Easements are to be established in accordance with YMC §12.02.010 and YCC §12.02.020.
- (2) Subsection 14.20.100(A)(2) Consistency with the provisions of the Comprehensive Plan. The Future Land Use Map III-3 of the 2040 Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan designates part of the property within the proposed preliminary plat as suitable for Low Density Residential development and part of the property as suitable for Mixed Residential development which may have a mixture of housing types and densities. As noted above, the proposed preliminary plat is consistent with the following Goals and Policies of the City's Comprehensive Plan:
 - (a) Goal 2.2: Provide a mix of land use designations consistent with the community's vision.
 - (b) Policy 2.2.1: Low density residential this designation provides for low density residential development. Single-family detached dwellings are the predominant dwelling type. Other dwelling types may be allowed under certain circumstances, such as accessory dwellings and cottage housing. The permitted density is up to seven net dwelling units per acre for infill development. On larger sites (over two acres), more flexibility in lot sizes and layout are envisioned, provided overall density standards are met. Permitted maximum densities on large

sites is up to seven gross dwelling units per acre. Density bonuses allowing up to six gross dwelling units may be allowed subject to conformance with traditional neighborhood design concepts.

- (c) <u>Goal 2.3</u> which is to preserve and enhance the quality, character and function of Yakima's residential neighborhoods.
- (d) <u>Policy 2.3.1</u> which is to provide for a wide variety of housing types within the City to meet the full range of housing needs for Yakima's evolving population.
- (c) <u>Policy 2.3.2</u> which is to preserve and enhance established residential neighborhoods. Specifically: (A) Ensure that new development is compatible in scale, density and aesthetic quality to an established neighborhood.
- (3) Subsection 14.20.100(A)(3) Consistency with the provisions of this title, Title 14 entitled "Subdivision Ordinance." As proposed and with the recommended conditions, this preliminary plat will meet all the design requirements in YMC Chapter 14.20 of the City's subdivision ordinance and in the City's Title 12 development standards. This review and the recommended conditions are intended to ensure consistency with the provisions of the City's subdivision ordinance as well as other applicable City ordinances.
- (4) Subsection 14.20.100(A)(4) Appropriate provisions for enumerated features. As proposed and with the recommended conditions, this 93-lot Preliminary "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1" will make appropriate provisions for the following features required by YMC §14.20.100(A)(4) and RCW 58.17.110:
 - (a) *Public health, safety, welfare:* The construction of new detached single-family dwellings and new attached single-family common wall dwellings will promote the public health, safety and general welfare insofar as there is a need in this community for additional housing and insofar as this proposed preliminary plat will be required to comply with all applicable City development standards, and all conditions of approval that will be specified by the City Council.
 - (b) Open spaces: The proposed lots are larger than the minimum lot sizes required in the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts for detached single-family dwellings and for attached single-family common wall dwellings. The 60% lot coverage limitation in the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts will provide adequate light and air

for future residents in accordance with the standards in the zoning ordinance without additional open spaces.

- (c) *Drainage systems:* Drainage system facilities must be provided in accordance with state and local regulations, including the City of Yakima Municipal Code and the Eastern Washington Storm Water Manual.
- (d) *Streets, alleys, and other public ways:* The subject property will have access from the south off of Ahtanum Road by way of South 47th Avenue and from the west off of South 52nd Avenue by way of Woolsey Road. New public interior streets (South 47th Avenue, West Larch Avenue, West Oak Avenue, and Woolsey Road) will provide adequate access to all lots.
- (e) Water supplies: Public water is required to be used for domestic and fire flow purposes. Nob Hill Water Association water is available to the site.
- (f) Sanitary waste disposal: Public sewer is required to service all lots within the subject development.
- (g) *Parks and playgrounds:* Open space, parks, recreation and playgrounds are located about one mile away from this subdivision at SOZO Sports Complex and are also available at Randall Park. The lot coverage limitation also provides open space on the lots for recreation and play areas.
- (h) Sites for schools: West Valley Middle Level Campus is located about 4.5 miles from this proposed subdivision, while Wide Hollow Elementary School is located about 4.9 miles from this proposed subdivision and West Valley High School is located approximately 5.6 miles from this proposed subdivision. No comments were submitted by the West Valley School District.
- (i) *Sidewalks*: Sidewalks are required and shall be provided along this development's internal streets (South 47th Avenue, West Larch Avenue, West Oak Avenue and Woolsey Road).
- (j) *Public Transit:* A Yakima Transit route exists along West Washington Avenue north of the subdivision.
- (k) Serves the public use and interest: This proposed 93-lot residential subdivision is consistent with neighboring residential land uses, better serves the needs of the City than the present undeveloped status of the property and helps satisfy the need for additional housing within the City.

(l) *Time Limitation:* Upon preliminary plat approval, the applicant has five years from the date of preliminary plat approval to submit the final plat. If more time is needed, at least 30 days prior to the expiration of preliminary approval, the applicant must submit to the City Council a written request to extend the approval period for a maximum period of one additional year (YMC §14.20.160). Before the final plat can be recorded, all required infrastructure must either be engineered, completed and inspected or be engineered and financially secured, and approval of the final plat must be obtained from the City of Yakima Community Development Department.

Type (2) Review Findings for the Proposed Class (2) Attached Single- Family Common Wall Dwellings. Since YMC Table 4-1 in YMC §15.04.030 designates attached single-family common wall dwellings as a Class (2) use in the Single-Family Residential (R-1) zoning district where some of those dwellings are proposed to be located, the Hearing Examiner's findings and conclusions relative to those dwellings in the R-1 zoning district are required to include specific reasons and ordinance provisions demonstrating that they satisfy the following Class (2) use requirements set forth in YMC §15.04.020(B), §15.14.040(G), §15.02.020 and similar Type (3) Review criteria that are set forth in YMC §15.15.040(I):

- (1) Compliance and Compatibility with the Policies, Objectives and Development Standards of the Comprehensive Plan. The Yakima Comprehensive Plan 2040 Land Use Element provides for the distribution of land uses meeting Yakima's needs for housing, employment, recreation, public facilities and other land uses in development patterns that support the City's vision for the future. The proposed attached single-family common wall dwellings would be compliant and compatible with the policies, objectives and development standards of the Comprehensive Plan which include Goals 2.2 and 2.3 and Policies 2.2.1, 2.3.1 and 2.3.2 set forth above in Section VI and in Subsection XIII(2) of this Recommendation.
- (2) Compliance and Compatibility with the Intent and Character of the Single-Family Residential (R-1) Zoning District. The attached single-family common

wall dwellings that are proposed to be located in the R-1 zoning district would be compliant and compatible with the intent of that zoning district set forth in YMC §15.03.020(B). That stated intent includes an intent to establish new residential neighborhoods free from other uses except those which are compatible with the district and serve the residents of the district. Attached single-family common wall dwellings are designated as Class (2) uses within the R-1 zoned portion of the preliminary plat. Class (2) uses are generally permitted within that zoning district. Attached single-family common wall dwellings would also be compliant and compatible with the character of the proposed preliminary plat because the adjacent portion of the proposed preliminary plat to the north that is located within the R-2 zoning district is also proposed to include attached single-family common wall dwellings. They are Class (1) permitted uses there.

- (3) Compliance with the Provisions and Standards Established in the Zoning Ordinance. YMC Chapters 15.05 to 15.07 establish basic development requirements as minimum criteria which must be met to assure land use compatibility and promote the public health, safety, and welfare. The lots proposed for attached single-family common wall dwellings will be required to comply with all of the applicable development standards such as, for example, the following:
 - (a) <u>Lot Size</u>: All of the lots will comply with the minimum lot size requirement of 4,000 square feet for the proposed attached single-family common wall dwellings to be located in the R-1 zoning district where they are a Class (2) use and with the minimum lot size requirement of 3,500 square feet in the adjacent R-2 zoning district to the north where they are a Class (1) permitted use.
 - (b) <u>Lot Coverage</u>: The proposed attached single-family common wall dwellings will all comply with the 60% maximum lot coverage limitation applicable to both the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts.
 - (c) <u>Setbacks</u>: The proposed attached single-family common wall dwellings are required to comply with all applicable structure setbacks.
 - (d) <u>Public Facilities</u>: City of Yakima sewer and Nob Hill Water Association water are available to serve the attached single-family common wall dwellings.
 - (e) <u>Frontage Improvements</u>: Frontage improvements are required for the proposed preliminary plat.

- XV. <u>Consistency Analysis Conducted Pursuant to Subsection 16.06.020(B) of</u>
 <u>the Yakima Municipal Code.</u> The consistency analysis for this proposed Preliminary
 "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1" is as follows:
- (1) The type of land use contemplated by the proposal (a single-family residential development) is permitted on this site so long as it complies with the conditions imposed by the Yakima City Council, as well as the regulations of the zoning ordinance, subdivision ordinance, building codes and other applicable regulations. The proposed detached single-family dwellings and the proposed attached single-family common wall dwellings are both Class (1) permitted uses in the portion of the proposed preliminary plat that is zoned R-2, and the proposed attached single-family common wall dwellings are Class (2) generally permitted uses in the portion of the proposed preliminary plat that is zoned R-1.
- (2) The level of development with the maximum lot coverage density of 60% and with lots that are larger than the minimum lot size requirements will not exceed the allowable level of development in the R-1 and R-2 zoning districts.
- (3) The availability and adequacy of infrastructure and public facilities is not an issue because the additional infrastructure that will be provided at the applicant's expense would ensure that adequate infrastructure and public facilities are available for the proposed preliminary long plat.
- (4) The character of the proposal, such as the proposal's consistency with applicable development standards of the City's Urban Area Zoning Ordinance, primarily involves consideration of specific development standards relating to lot size, access, potable water, sewage disposal and other features of the proposed preliminary plat which have been discussed in detail above. With the recommended conditions, the proposed Preliminary "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1" with the proposed Class (1) and Class (2) single-family dwellings will be consistent with the development standards of applicable City ordinances.

CONCLUSIONS

Based on the foregoing Findings, the Hearing Examiner reaches the following conclusions:

- (1) The Hearing Examiner has jurisdiction to recommend to the Yakima City Council the approval of the proposed Preliminary "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1" with the proposed Class (1) and Class (2) single-family dwellings pursuant to YMC §1.43.080, YMC §14.20.100, YMC Chapter 15.14 and YMC Chapter 15.15.
- (2) A SEPA Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was issued for this proposed preliminary plat on December 13, 2023, which became final without any appeal.
- (3) Notices for the public hearing were given in accordance with applicable ordinance requirements.
- (4) The proposed Preliminary "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1," with the proposed single-family dwellings and subject to all of the conditions detailed below, is in compliance with the applicable provisions of the City's 2040 Comprehensive Plan, zoning ordinance and subdivision ordinance; makes appropriate provisions for the public health, safety and general welfare and for open spaces, drainage ways, streets, transit stops, potable water supplies, sanitary wastes, parks and recreation, playgrounds and sidewalks; and, according to the weight of the evidence presented at the hearing, does not require that specific provisions be made for the other requisite plat considerations such as additional schools, additional schoolgrounds or additional planning features that assure safe walking conditions for students who walk to and from school; and said plat will serve the public use and interest.
- (5) The proposed attached single-family common wall dwellings to be located on 46 of the 93 lots satisfy all of the criteria for their approval as Class (2) uses within the portion of the preliminary plat that is zoned Single-Family Residential (R-1).
- (6) This proposed Preliminary "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1" with the proposed single-family dwellings is in compliance with all of the consistency requirements of Subsection 16.06.020(B) of the Yakima Municipal Code.

RECOMMENDATION

The Hearing Examiner recommends to the Yakima City Council that the proposed 93-lot Preliminary "Plat of Champions Park Phase 1" dated October 6. 2023, to be developed with 47 detached single-family dwellings and 46 attached single-family common wall dwellings as is described in the application, the staff report, this

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Recommendation and the other related documents assigned file numbers PLP#002-23, CL2#038-23 and SEPA#011-23 be **APPROVED**, subject to compliance with the following conditions:

- (A) Prior to approval of the final plat, all required improvements shall be constructed or financially secured according to the standards and requirements of the City Engineer and YMC Title 12;
- (B) All lots shall be served with public water from the Nob Hill Water Association. No individual domestic or irrigation wells shall be permitted for any of the lots. Prior to final plat approval, written verification from the Nob Hill Water Association must be submitted to the Planning Division indicating that each lot within the plat has been served with domestic water and applicable fees have been paid;
- (C) All lots shall be provided with public sewer service according to YMC Title 12 standards. Prior to final plat approval, written verification from the City of Yakima Engineering Department must be provided to the Planning Division indicating that all sewer extensions have been completed and inspected or financially secured;
- (D) Eight-foot-wide utility easements shall be dedicated along the front of each lot in subdivisions and short subdivisions. Easements for new and/or future utility lines shall be a minimum eight feet in width or twice the buried depth of the utility, whichever is greater;
- (E) All public and private utilities shall be located underground, with the exception of telephone boxes and such similar structures;
- (F) All public and private utilities to be located within public road rights-of-way must be constructed prior to the start of road construction;
- (G) All interior roads shown on the preliminary plat shall be constructed with curb, gutter and five-foot-wide sidewalks on both sides of the street, and street lighting in accordance with YMC Chapter 12.06, Standard Detail R5, and WSDOT Curb and Sidewalk Plans F-10.12-03;
- (H) An excavation and street break permit shall be obtained for all work within the public right-of-way. Roads less than five years old can be cut, but will cost 150 percent of the restoration fee with no PCI discount;

- (I) All frontage improvements shall be completed or bonded for prior to long plat approval. Civil engineering plans for public improvements shall be approved prior to bonding for public improvements;
- (J) At the discretion of the City Engineer, the owner may bond for required frontage improvements or enter into a deferral agreement for future participation in the cost of any frontage and/or roadway improvement by means of a Local Improvement District (LID) which is constructed abutting the owner's property. The bond or deferral agreement shall be executed and recorded prior to or as part of approval of the plat;
- (K) Fire hydrants shall be placed at the locations specified by Code Administration and the Washington State Fire Code. All lots must be provided with adequate fire flow;
 - (L) All permits required by the Department of Ecology shall be obtained;
 - (M) A Large Project Stormwater Permit shall be obtained;
 - (N) Streetlights shall be installed per the direction of the Engineering Division;
- (O) This plat shall be subject to the following notes, which must be placed on the face of the plat:
 - (1) The addresses shown on this plat are accurate as of the date of recording, but may be subject to change. The City of Yakima Code Administration is responsible for the confirmation or reassignment of addresses at the time of building permit issuance.
 - (2) The owners shown hereon, their grantees and assignees in interest hereby covenant and agree to retain all surface water generated within the plat on-site.
 - (P) Irrigation approval is required, and shall be shown on the face of the final plat;
- (Q) A current title report covering the subject property must accompany the final long plat;
- (R) Upon preliminary plat approval, the applicant has five years to submit the final plat. If additional time is needed, 30 days prior to the expiration of said approval the applicant must submit to the City Council a written request asking to extend the approval period for a maximum period of one year;

(S) All other requirements of the zoning and subdivision ordinance, although not specifically set forth herein, shall be complied with in their entirety.

Special Terms and Conditions

1. AUTHORITY

COMMERCE and Contractor enter into this Contract pursuant to the authority granted by Chapter 39.34 RCW.

2. CONTRACT MANAGEMENT

The Representative for each of the parties shall be responsible for and shall be the contact person for all communications and billings regarding the performance of this Contract.

The Representative for COMMERCE and their contact information are identified on the Face Sheet of this Contract.

The Representative for the Contractor and their contact information are identified on the Face Sheet of this Contract.

3. **COMPENSATION**

COMMERCE shall pay an amount not to exceed \$150,000, for the performance of all things necessary for or incidental to the performance of work under this Contract as set forth in the Scope of Work.

EXPENSES

Contractor shall receive reimbursement for travel and other expenses as identified below or as authorized in advance by COMMERCE as reimbursable. The maximum amount to be paid to the Contractor for authorized expenses shall not exceed \$150,000, which amount is included in the Contract total above.

Such expenses may include airfare (economy or coach class only), other transportation expenses, and lodging and subsistence necessary during periods of required travel. Contractor shall receive compensation for travel expenses at current state travel reimbursement rates.

4. BILLING PROCEDURES AND PAYMENT

COMMERCE will pay Contractor upon acceptance of reports submitted <u>and</u> receipt of properly completed invoices, which shall be submitted to the Representative for COMMERCE via the Commerce Contract Management System. Reports must be submitted prior to submitting invoices.

The invoices shall describe and document, to COMMERCE's satisfaction, a description of the work performed, the progress of the project, and fees. The invoice shall include the Contract Number S24-34444-016. If expenses are invoiced, provide a detailed breakdown of each type. A receipt must accompany any single expenses in the amount of \$50.00 or more in order to receive reimbursement. It should be noted the receipts must be dated within the fiscal year (ending June 30, 2024). All purchases and receipts must be dated within the fiscal year (ending June 30, 2024).

Payment shall be considered timely if made by COMMERCE within thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of properly completed invoices. Payment shall be sent to the address designated by the Contractor.

COMMERCE may, in its sole discretion, terminate the Contract or withhold payments claimed by the Contractor for services rendered if the Contractor fails to satisfactorily comply with any term or condition of this Contract.

No payments in advance or in anticipation of services or supplies to be provided under this Agreement shall be made by COMMERCE.

Invoices and End of Fiscal Year



Invoices are due on the 20th of the month following the provision of services.

Final invoices for a state fiscal year may be due sooner than the 20th and Commerce will provide notification of the end of fiscal year due date.

The Contractor must invoice for all expenses from the beginning of the contract through June 30, regardless of the contract start and end date.

<u>Duplication of Billed Costs</u>

The Contractor shall not bill COMMERCE for services performed under this Agreement, and COMMERCE shall not pay the Contractor, if the Contractor is entitled to payment or has been or will be paid by any other source, including grants, for that service.

Disallowed Costs

The Contractor is responsible for any audit exceptions or disallowed costs incurred by its own organization or that of its subcontractors.

COMMERCE may, in its sole discretion, withhold ten percent (10%) from each payment until acceptance by COMMERCE of the final report (or completion of the project, etc.).

5. SUBCONTRACTOR DATA COLLECTION

Contractor will submit reports, in a form and format to be provided by Commerce and at intervals as agreed by the parties, regarding work under this Contract performed by subcontractors and the portion of Contract funds expended for work performed by subcontractors, including but not necessarily limited to minority-owned, woman-owned, and veteran-owned business subcontractors. "Subcontractors" shall mean subcontractors of any tier.

6. INSURANCE

Each party certifies that it is self-insured under the State's or local government self-insurance liability program, and shall be responsible for losses for which it is found liable.

7. FRAUD AND OTHER LOSS REPORTING

Contractor shall report in writing all known or suspected fraud or other loss of any funds or other property furnished under this Contract immediately or as soon as practicable to the Commerce Representative identified on the Face Sheet.

8. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

In the event of an inconsistency in this Contract, the inconsistency shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order:

- Applicable federal and state of Washington statutes and regulations
- Special Terms and Conditions
- General Terms and Conditions
- Attachment A Scope of Work
- Attachment B Budget
- Attachment C Reporting



General Terms and Conditions

1. **DEFINITIONS**

As used throughout this Contract, the following terms shall have the meaning set forth below:

- A. "Authorized Representative" shall mean the Director and/or the designee authorized in writing to act on the Director's behalf.
- B. "COMMERCE" shall mean the Washington Department of Commerce.
- C. "Contract" or "Agreement" or "Grant" means the entire written agreement between COMMERCE and the Contractor, including any Attachments, documents, or materials incorporated by reference. E-mail or Facsimile transmission of a signed copy of this contract shall be the same as delivery of an original.
- **D.** "Contractor" or "Grantee" shall mean the entity identified on the face sheet performing service(s) under this Contract, and shall include all employees and agents of the Contractor.
- E. "Personal Information" shall mean information identifiable to any person, including, but not limited to, information that relates to a person's name, health, finances, education, business, use or receipt of governmental services or other activities, addresses, telephone numbers, social security numbers, driver license numbers, other identifying numbers, and any financial identifiers, and "Protected Health Information" under the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA).
- F. "State" shall mean the state of Washington.
- G. "Subcontractor" shall mean one not in the employment of the Contractor, who is performing all or part of those services under this Contract under a separate contract with the Contractor. The terms "subcontractor" and "subcontractors" mean subcontractor(s) in any tier.

2. ALL WRITINGS CONTAINED HEREIN

This Contract contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. No other understandings, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Contract shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the parties hereto.

3. AMENDMENTS

This Contract may be amended by mutual agreement of the parties. Such amendments shall not be binding unless they are in writing and signed by personnel authorized to bind each of the parties.

4. ASSIGNMENT

Neither this Contract, work thereunder, nor any claim arising under this Contract, shall be transferred or assigned by the Contractor without prior written consent of COMMERCE.

5. CONFIDENTIALITY AND SAFEGUARDING OF INFORMATION

- A. "Confidential Information" as used in this section includes:
 - i. All material provided to the Contractor by COMMERCE that is designated as "confidential" by COMMERCE;
 - ii. All material produced by the Contractor that is designated as "confidential" by COMMERCE; and



- iii. All Personal Information in the possession of the Contractor that may not be disclosed under state or federal law.
- B. The Contractor shall comply with all state and federal laws related to the use, sharing, transfer, sale, or disclosure of Confidential Information. The Contractor shall use Confidential Information solely for the purposes of this Contract and shall not use, share, transfer, sell or disclose any Confidential Information to any third party except with the prior written consent of COMMERCE or as may be required by law. The Contractor shall take all necessary steps to assure that Confidential Information is safeguarded to prevent unauthorized use, sharing, transfer, sale or disclosure of Confidential Information or violation of any state or federal laws related thereto. Upon request, the Contractor shall provide COMMERCE with its policies and procedures on confidentiality. COMMERCE may require changes to such policies and procedures as they apply to this Contract whenever COMMERCE reasonably determines that changes are necessary to prevent unauthorized disclosures. The Contractor shall make the changes within the time period specified by COMMERCE. Upon request, the Contractor shall immediately return to COMMERCE any Confidential Information that COMMERCE reasonably determines has not been adequately protected by the Contractor against unauthorized disclosure.
- C. Unauthorized Use or Disclosure. The Contractor shall notify COMMERCE within five (5) working days of any unauthorized use or disclosure of any confidential information, and shall take necessary steps to mitigate the harmful effects of such use or disclosure.

6. COPYRIGHT

Unless otherwise provided, all Materials produced under this Contract shall be considered "works for hire" as defined by the U.S. Copyright Act and shall be owned by COMMERCE. COMMERCE shall be considered the author of such Materials. In the event the Materials are not considered "works for hire" under the U.S. Copyright laws, the Contractor hereby irrevocably assigns all right, title, and interest in all Materials, including all intellectual property rights, moral rights, and rights of publicity to COMMERCE effective from the moment of creation of such Materials.

"Materials" means all items in any format and includes, but is not limited to, data, reports, documents, pamphlets, advertisements, books, magazines, surveys, studies, computer programs, films, tapes, and/or sound reproductions. "Ownership" includes the right to copyright, patent, register and the ability to transfer these rights.

For Materials that are delivered under the Contract, but that incorporate pre-existing materials not produced under the Contract, the Contractor hereby grants to COMMERCE a nonexclusive, royalty-free, irrevocable license (with rights to sublicense to others) in such Materials to translate, reproduce, distribute, prepare derivative works, publicly perform, and publicly display. The Contractor warrants and represents that the Contractor has all rights and permissions, including intellectual property rights, moral rights and rights of publicity, necessary to grant such a license to COMMERCE.

The Contractor shall exert all reasonable effort to advise COMMERCE, at the time of delivery of Materials furnished under this Contract, of all known or potential invasions of privacy contained therein and of any portion of such document which was not produced in the performance of this Contract. The Contractor shall provide COMMERCE with prompt written notice of each notice or claim of infringement received by the Contractor with respect to any Materials delivered under this Contract. COMMERCE shall have the right to modify or remove any restrictive markings placed upon the Materials by the Contractor.

7. DISPUTES

In the event that a dispute arises under this Agreement, it shall be determined by a Dispute Board in the following manner: Each party to this Agreement shall appoint one member to the Dispute Board. The members so appointed shall jointly appoint an additional member to the Dispute Board. The Dispute Board shall review the facts, Agreement terms and applicable statutes and rules and make a determination of the dispute. The Dispute Board shall thereafter decide the dispute with the majority



prevailing. The determination of the Dispute Board shall be final and binding on the parties hereto. As an alternative to this process, either of the parties may request intervention by the Governor, as provided by RCW 43.17.330, in which event the Governor's process will control.

8. GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE

This Contract shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the state of Washington, and the venue of any action brought hereunder shall be in the Superior Court for Thurston County.

9. INDEMNIFICATION

Each party shall be solely responsible for the acts of its employees, officers, and agents.

10. LICENSING, ACCREDITATION AND REGISTRATION

The Contractor shall comply with all applicable local, state, and federal licensing, accreditation and registration requirements or standards necessary for the performance of this Contract.

11. RECAPTURE

In the event that the Contractor fails to perform this Contract in accordance with state laws, federal laws, and/or the provisions of this Contract, COMMERCE reserves the right to recapture funds in an amount to compensate COMMERCE for the noncompliance in addition to any other remedies available at law or in equity.

Repayment by the Contractor of funds under this recapture provision shall occur within the time period specified by COMMERCE. In the alternative, COMMERCE may recapture such funds from payments due under this Contract.

12. RECORDS MAINTENANCE

The Contractor shall maintain books, records, documents, data and other evidence relating to this contract and performance of the services described herein, including but not limited to accounting procedures and practices that sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of any nature expended in the performance of this contract.

The Contractor shall retain such records for a period of six years following the date of final payment. At no additional cost, these records, including materials generated under the contract, shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, review or audit by COMMERCE, personnel duly authorized by COMMERCE, the Office of the State Auditor, and federal and state officials so authorized by law, regulation or agreement.

If any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration of the six (6) year period, the records shall be retained until all litigation, claims, or audit findings involving the records have been resolved.

13. SAVINGS

In the event funding from state, federal, or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date of this Contract and prior to normal completion, COMMERCE may suspend or terminate the Contract under the "Termination for Convenience" clause, without the ten calendar day notice requirement. In lieu of termination, the Contract may be amended to reflect the new funding limitations and conditions.

14. SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this contract are intended to be severable. If any term or provision is illegal or invalid for any reason whatsoever, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the contract.



15. SUBCONTRACTING

The Contractor may only subcontract work contemplated under this Contract if it obtains the prior written approval of COMMERCE.

If COMMERCE approves subcontracting, the Contractor shall maintain written procedures related to subcontracting, as well as copies of all subcontracts and records related to subcontracts. For cause, COMMERCE in writing may: (a) require the Contractor to amend its subcontracting procedures as they relate to this Contract; (b) prohibit the Contractor from subcontracting with a particular person or entity; or (c) require the Contractor to rescind or amend a subcontract.

Every subcontract shall bind the Subcontractor to follow all applicable terms of this Contract. The Contractor is responsible to COMMERCE if the Subcontractor fails to comply with any applicable term or condition of this Contract. The Contractor shall appropriately monitor the activities of the Subcontractor to assure fiscal conditions of this Contract. In no event shall the existence of a subcontract operate to release or reduce the liability of the Contractor to COMMERCE for any breach in the performance of the Contractor's duties.

Every subcontract shall include a term that COMMERCE and the State of Washington are not liable for claims or damages arising from a Subcontractor's performance of the subcontract.

16. SURVIVAL

The terms, conditions, and warranties contained in this Contract that by their sense and context are intended to survive the completion of the performance, cancellation or termination of this Contract shall so survive.

17. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE

In the event COMMERCE determines the Contractor has failed to comply with the conditions of this contract in a timely manner, COMMERCE has the right to suspend or terminate this contract. Before suspending or terminating the contract, COMMERCE shall notify the Contractor in writing of the need to take corrective action. If corrective action is not taken within 30 calendar days, the contract may be terminated or suspended.

In the event of termination or suspension, the Contractor shall be liable for damages as authorized by law including, but not limited to, any cost difference between the original contract and the replacement or cover contract and all administrative costs directly related to the replacement contract, e.g., cost of the competitive bidding, mailing, advertising and staff time.

COMMERCE reserves the right to suspend all or part of the contract, withhold further payments, or prohibit the Contractor from incurring additional obligations of funds during investigation of the alleged compliance breach and pending corrective action by the Contractor or a decision by COMMERCE to terminate the contract. A termination shall be deemed a "Termination for Convenience" if it is determined that the Contractor: (1) was not in default; or (2) failure to perform was outside of his or her control, fault or negligence.

The rights and remedies of COMMERCE provided in this contract are not exclusive and are, in addition to any other rights and remedies, provided by law.

18. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE

Except as otherwise provided in this Contract, COMMERCE may, by ten (10) business days' written notice, beginning on the second day after the mailing, terminate this Contract, in whole or in part. If this Contract is so terminated, COMMERCE shall be liable only for payment required under the terms of this Contract for services rendered or goods delivered prior to the effective date of termination.

19. TERMINATION PROCEDURES

Upon termination of this contract, COMMERCE, in addition to any other rights provided in this contract, may require the Contractor to deliver to COMMERCE any property specifically produced or acquired for the performance of such part of this contract as has been terminated. The provisions of the "Treatment of Assets" clause shall apply in such property transfer.



COMMERCE shall pay to the Contractor the agreed upon price, if separately stated, for completed work and services accepted by COMMERCE, and the amount agreed upon by the Contractor and COMMERCE for (i) completed work and services for which no separate price is stated, (ii) partially completed work and services, (iii) other property or services that are accepted by COMMERCE, and (iv) the protection and preservation of property, unless the termination is for default, in which case the Authorized Representative shall determine the extent of the liability of COMMERCE. Failure to agree with such determination shall be a dispute within the meaning of the "Disputes" clause of this contract. COMMERCE may withhold from any amounts due the Contractor such sum as the Authorized Representative determines to be necessary to protect COMMERCE against potential loss or liability.

The rights and remedies of COMMERCE provided in this section shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this contract.

After receipt of a notice of termination, and except as otherwise directed by the Authorized Representative, the Contractor shall:

- A. Stop work under the contract on the date, and to the extent specified, in the notice;
- **B.** Place no further orders or subcontracts for materials, services, or facilities except as may be necessary for completion of such portion of the work under the contract that is not terminated;
- C. Assign to COMMERCE, in the manner, at the times, and to the extent directed by the Authorized Representative, all of the rights, title, and interest of the Contractor under the orders and subcontracts so terminated, in which case COMMERCE has the right, at its discretion, to settle or pay any or all claims arising out of the termination of such orders and subcontracts;
- D. Settle all outstanding liabilities and all claims arising out of such termination of orders and subcontracts, with the approval or ratification of the Authorized Representative to the extent the Authorized Representative may require, which approval or ratification shall be final for all the purposes of this clause;
- E. Transfer title to COMMERCE and deliver in the manner, at the times, and to the extent directed by the Authorized Representative any property which, if the contract had been completed, would have been required to be furnished to COMMERCE;
- **F.** Complete performance of such part of the work as shall not have been terminated by the Authorized Representative; and
- G. Take such action as may be necessary, or as the Authorized Representative may direct, for the protection and preservation of the property related to this contract, which is in the possession of the Contractor and in which COMMERCE has or may acquire an interest.

20. TREATMENT OF ASSETS

Title to all property furnished by COMMERCE shall remain in COMMERCE. Title to all property furnished by the Contractor, for the cost of which the Contractor is entitled to be reimbursed as a direct item of cost under this contract, shall pass to and vest in COMMERCE upon delivery of such property by the Contractor. Title to other property, the cost of which is reimbursable to the Contractor under this contract, shall pass to and vest in COMMERCE upon (i) issuance for use of such property in the performance of this contract, or (ii) commencement of use of such property in the performance of this contract, or (iii) reimbursement of the cost thereof by COMMERCE in whole or in part, whichever first occurs.

- A. Any property of COMMERCE furnished to the Contractor shall, unless otherwise provided herein or approved by COMMERCE, be used only for the performance of this contract.
- B. The Contractor shall be responsible for any loss or damage to property of COMMERCE that results from the negligence of the Contractor or which results from the failure on the part of the Contractor to maintain and administer that property in accordance with sound management



practices.

- C. If any COMMERCE property is lost, destroyed or damaged, the Contractor shall immediately notify COMMERCE and shall take all reasonable steps to protect the property from further damage.
- **D.** The Contractor shall surrender to COMMERCE all property of COMMERCE prior to settlement upon completion, termination or cancellation of this contract.
- **E.** All reference to the Contractor under this clause shall also include Contractor's employees, agents or Subcontractors.

21. WAIVER

Waiver of any default or breach shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent default or breach. Any waiver shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Contract unless stated to be such in writing and signed by Authorized Representative of COMMERCE.



Attachment A: Scope of Work

This funding will be provided solely to the Yakima Police Department for the purpose of purchasing the following modern vehicle pursuit management technology:

- 60 Stop Sticks and vehicle mounting
- 3 UAS (drones) DJI Matrice 30T Combo Kit and accessories:
 - o 6 Extra Batteries for DJI Matrice
 - o 3 Attachments and Vehicle Up-fitting
- 20 ALPR Falcon License Plate readers and installation

The technology will be used in accordance with data-sharing, management policies, and training requirements for those who have access to the vehicle pursuit technology and data.

This technology will assist local law enforcement patrol activities including, but not limited to, vehicle pursuit mitigation.



Attachment B: Budget

The Budget for the award period of January 24, 2024 through June 30, 2024 is \$150,000.

Technical Proposal

Project Approach/Methodology of Technical Proposal (3.3 A)

The City of Yakima is uniquely positioned in central Washington. The geographical location of Yakima is important as it serves as the only urban area between the west side of the cascade and larger cities to the east, such as Spokane. This, along with over 19% of the population living below the poverty line, makes Yakima an attractive location for criminal activity.

The Yakima Police Department, the largest police agency within 150 miles, has continued to adapt to criminal patterns and, in recent years, began employing innovative techniques to deal with community problems. Here are a few examples:

- 2003 First department in the area to equip cars with dashcams.
- 2005 First department in the area to equip officers with less lethal conductive energy devices.
- 2012 Implementation of a bait car program to reduce the number of stolen vehicles.
- 2014 Equipped select police cars with automatic license plate reader cameras.
- 2018 the first department in the region to implement cell phone forensic methods.
- 2019 First department in the area to deploy unmanned aerial systems to track/ locate fleeing suspects.
- 2020 Introduced the domestic violence intimate partner program to measure the extent of domestic violence through data and adopt policies to reduce those numbers.
- 2021 Expanded the crime analyst position to an actual unit consisting of multiple analysts providing crime intelligence and data.
- 2021 Implementation of stationary automatic license plate reader (ALPR) cameras.
- 2021 Integration of all dashcam-equipped vehicles with the LPR program.

None of the above-listed advancements would have been possible without public funding opportunities and they have made the department more efficient. At the same time, our actual and budgeted staffing numbers have decreased since 2005. The City and the Department have a recognized track record of responsibly utilizing public funds.

Even with advancements in technology, the community continues to endure crime. In 2015, Yakima was ranked 19th in the nation for stolen cars per capita (470.20 per 100,000 population). In 2019, the last available report, Yakima was ranked 9th in the nation with 528.16 per 100,000 population.

While property crime is on the rise, we are lucky to see violent crime trending downward, but we are starting to see slight increases after coming out of the pandemic. We implemented stationary license plate readers in areas of the community where we saw the most crime. The effect of these cameras was seen almost immediately. The police department has solved multiple crimes that would have otherwise gone unsolved. Here is an example of some of the cases that have been solved using technology:

- Murder
- Burglary
- Kidnapping
- Robbery
- · Assault with firearms
- · Drive-by shooting
- Stolen Vehicle
- Fraud
- Shoplifting

The City of Yakima and the Yakima Police Department embrace technology in an effort to make our community safer.

Project Approach/Methodology

2. Demonstrate a need for pursuit technology equipment and that such is necessary for the operation of the law enforcement agency and protection of public safety.

Project Approach/Methodology of Technical Proposal (3.3 A.1)

I. Since 2020, the Yakima Police Department has averaged nine eluding incidents per month. This number is actually higher when you consider that when Washington State passed HB 1054 in 2021, officers were required to stop efforts to pursue vehicles that would not stop. Merely accelerating away from officers does not satisfy the reckless driving requirement of the eluding statute, so an eluding incident would not be counted in those instances. The Yakima Police Department has seen a

101% increase in vehicle pursuits from 2021 to 2022. In 2023, we have seen an increase of 7.9% through August₂₅

Vehicle pursuits are dangerous. The failure to pursue also has grievous impacts. A balance of when to pursue and how to mitigate the dangers of pursuits is delicate. We believe that technology is providing the ability for the police to enforce serious crimes more safely.

- II. The Yakima Police Department has had the opportunity to test different variations of equipment that assist in stopping and/or apprehending suspects who have fled over the last two decades. The Department believes that a three-pronged approach for stopping, identifying and arresting eluding suspects is the best way to combat this particular criminal behavior.
- Pursuit intervention devices The Yakima Police Department uses a product called "Stop Stick'. Stop Sticks have been around for over three decades. The product is mounted in patrol vehicles and the officer will deploy the device ahead of a fleeing vehicle. In some cases, the sticks can be deployed while the suspect vehicle is stationary to prevent a possible pursuit from beginning. Once the vehicle tires roll over the device, its small but sharp hollow tubes puncture the tires allowing for slow deflation, which causes the suspect vehicle to deaccelerate to safer speeds, at which point continued fleeing becomes futile since the suspect can no longer create distance from pursuing police cruisers.
- Automatic License Plate Reader Technology ALPRs can be mounted or be mobile. They work by taking a picture of license plates in their path. The plates are checked against state and federal databases to determine if the vehicle is stolen or has been involved in some other crime. The City of Yakima currently has 31 cameras covering approximately 8 of the 21 square miles that make up the city limits. The existing cameras only cover the eastern part of the city and we have seen a dramatic increase in the number of cases that are solved since their implementation.
- Unmanned Aerial Systems Or, more commonly, drone technology. Unarmed drones in the field make it possible for officerpilots to launch the device once a pursuit starts. This allows pursuing officers to back-off from the suspect vehicle, allowing for the suspect to slow down and find a place where they can abandon the vehicle and walk away. Drones allow officers to follow the vehicle without being detected and communicate where the suspect has fled.
- III. The Yakima Police Department already employs the technology we are seeking to purchase. Most of the department personnel have been trained on the requested equipment. The only exception would be for training new UAS officer-pilot. The department policy requires that officer-pilots obtain a FAA Part 107 license. The Department's training budget will absorb the cost of the training and licensing.
- IV. The Department will have four phases to implement the program:
- 1. Budget Authority Assuming that awarded funds are only eligible for reimbursement, the Department must request an increase in budget authority from the city council after being notified of the award. Budget amendments are approved each quarter, and based on award/contract dates contained in the notice of proposal, the budget amendment would be approved at the council budget meeting held in Q1 of 2024.
- 2. Ordering Once the council has approved the expenditures, the Department will enlist the assistance of the city's purchasing department. Due to the city already having contracts with the vendors providing equipment we are using I believe the projects will qualify for sole-source acquisition. In the best case, we could have orders placed within Q1 of 2024. If a bidding process becomes necessary, it will add approximately four weeks to the project to prepare the bid, award the bid, and make the order, which will put the order/acquisition into Q2 of 2024
- 3. Acquisition / Training It is difficult to put a timeline on acquisition. Over the past few years we have seen severe delays due to disrupted supply lines. Those seem to be easing, but we still are seeing some delays. I expect to receive all products one to two months after ordering, but no later than June 1, 2024.
- a. Stop Sticks We train personnel on Stop Sticks regularly. Once received our fleet maintenance staff will mount these items in the vehicle and be deployed in the field.
- b. ALPRS Department personnel will not require additional training. The vendor will need to deploy technicians to the area to seek necessary permits and install the devices. This generally takes 1-2 months.
- c. UAS Delivery is expected within 1-2 weeks of ordering. An internal selection process for interested personnel wanting to become officer-pilots will be completed upon learning of the award. Testing for certification can begin before the delivery of the devices. Once the devices are delivered, they are expected to be in the field almost immediately. Training consists of online

instruction, which takes approximately two weeks followed by a certification test administered by FAA satellite sites. Our current officer-pilots train on practical skills once per month.

Project Approach/Methodology of Technical Proposal (3.3 A.2)

Stop Sticks - Only a quarter of the Department's current fleet is equipped with Stop Sticks. We propose to purchase 60 more stop sticks so that each vehicle is equipped. This allows every officer, detective and command officer to participate in bringing dangerous pursuits to a conclusion.

ALPRs - We believe that additional cameras in the central and western parts of the city will have the same dramatic effect in solving crime. As our Chief said when referring to ALPRs, "This is the single greatest change since DNA – what this system does is a game-changer." The Department will seek to add approximately 20 more cameras to the western part of the city where we are starting to see upticks in crime.

While the Department currently has a UAS program, it only consists of two devices (one for training and one for deployments) that must to be shared among three pilot-officers. This requires storing the device in an accessible area for the other officer-pilots. This causes delays in deployment. The goal is that all officer-pilots would be equipped with a platform while in the field and be "flight ready" when needed. On average, vehicle pursuits last less than 10 minutes. Our request is to add 3 platforms to our fleet and train one additional patrol officer-pilot for a total of 4 field-ready units. Additionally, monitors mounted in the rear of designated patrol vehicles make piloting the UAVs easier and safer.

Project Approach/Methodology of Technical Proposal (3.3 A.3)

All police officers are trained on our existing technology, to include Stop Sticks and ALPRS. The exception of UAS. Officers selected as pilot must receive FAA Part 107 Training and pass the FAA license certification prior to becoming pilots. In addition, all pilots are paired with "spotters" who assist the pilot in looking for possible dangers. All spotters, must take a test to understand basic drone/aircraft operation. As mentioned in section 2, the Department's training budget will absorb the costs of training and certification.

Risks of Technical Proposal (3.3 E)

The Yakima Police Department has been successfully deploying the requested technology in some cases for over ten years (Stop Sticks). Undoubtedly, the technology has assisted the Department in solving violent crime. With all technology, there are inherent risks that come with its possible deployment. The City of Yakima Police Department takes this seriously, which is why the Department adheres to a shift schedule that provides training each month. The Department takes into consideration the requirement for training each time new policies or equipment is deployed.

With that said, we do not see any risks with training, but rather with the failure of the equipment. See the following risks we believe are possible with the equipment being requested.

- Stop Sticks The Department has used Stop Sticks for almost two decades. There are many success stories, but there have been some failures and there are risks.
- o At low speeds, the sticks may not puncture tires and not prevent a pursuit from continuing.
- o Personnel must be out in front of the fleeing vehicle and throw the sticks in its path. This is done before the suspect vehicle reaches the area, however, this places the officer at risk if the suspect loses control or swerves. The Department mitigates this with training to retreat to a place of cover after deployment.
- o Suspects may see the sticks and swerve to avoid them, causing them to lose control at high speeds and increasing the potential for a collision.
- o Deflated tires will slow the vehicle considerably and make it more difficult to control. Continued driving will cause the tire to fall off the rim, causing sparks on the roadway, which could result in fires.
- UAS The Department has successfully used a UAS for searching for approximately four years. Here are the potential risks.
- o Pilot error could cause the UAS to collide with property. The department policy mitigates this by requiring a spotter to assist the officer-pilot during deployments.
- o Technology failures can cause a UAS to fall from the sky or "fly away" if the connection to the controller is lost (referred to as "link loss"). The department only purchases equipment that will "fly home" if it experiences link loss.

- o Most UAS use a nickel-cadmium battery. While improbable, these batteries can catch fire. Our officer-pilots inspect the batteries regularly and replace any batteries that begin to "swell".
- o UAS operates using four props. If one prop was to fail or become disabled, it would make the device more difficult to control. Our officer-pilots train for this type of malfunction.
- ALPR The Department has been using ALPR's since 2022. There has been little risk.
- o A potential risk is that the ALPR system misreads a plate and provides a hit on criminal activity. Department policy requires the plate to be confirmed with dispatch prior to police action.
- o With all technology, abuse of access is a possibility. The Department takes this seriously and keeps an audit of all searches to ensure the technology is used for legitimate criminal justice purposes.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION:

In an effort to further the City's ability to hire and retain qualified and experienced personnel, and to assess internal pay equity concerns, the City Council authorized, and City staff subsequently issued a request for qualifications and proposals (RFQP) 12127QP to conduct a classification and salary survey via an external consulting service.

Trüpp HR was awarded the project which kicked-off in April of 2022 with the goal of completing the salary survey by early 2023. While these were the initial projections agreed to by Trüpp, the project proved to be more comprehensive and labor intensive than they originally anticipated, which caused delays in the project's completion.

At this time the City has received a final report which outlines the work performed by Trüpp as well as their recommendations as to salary. This process is only one piece of the total compensation puzzle.

In evaluating the consultant's recommendations and information, it is critical to recognize multiple factors were not evaluated as part of the salary study which include other important employee compensation factors, such as pension and retirement benefits, medical, health and wellness benefits, incentive or premium pays, shift differentials, training or certification reimbursements, union costs and benefits, or any other employee benefits. These factors together comprise an employee's total compensation/benefit package.

The work of factoring these considerations is underway and will be a part of discussions with the various employee units. Of note, the survey did not evaluate commissioned Fire and Police positions as these units enjoy binding interest arbitration rights.

- In 2021, the City of Yakima issued a Request for Qualifications and Proposals (RFQP) 12127QP.
- Trüpp HR was awarded the project. The project kick-off meeting took place April 5, 2022 with the goal of completing the salary survey by early 2023.
- Due to the breath of services provided by a full-service city, the project proved to be more comprehensive and labor intensive than the contractor had anticipated, which caused significant delays in the project's completion.
- The salary survey is just <u>ONE</u> piece of the total compensation puzzle.

SURVEY SCOPE

- 1. Review of the City of Yakima's job classifications and align classifications based on:
 - substantially similar authority
 - scope of responsibility
 - knowledge, skills and abilities
 - experience, education, certification
 - salary alignment/equity
- 2. Conduct a market study to evaluate the City's pay allocations in relation to the competitive market.

JOB ANALYSIS

City classifications were evaluated utilizing two different compensation methodologies.

- 1. Municipality Comparisons
 - City of Yakima job classifications evaluated and "matched" with other "like" job descriptions.
 - Wage allocations were adjusted for geography by applying cost of labor metrics from the 2023 Economic Research Institute (ERI) Geographic Assessor.
- Two (2) market survey sources were utilized to collect data for selected benchmark jobs and other classifications for which municipal matches had not been obtained
 - CompAnalyst
 - ERI

FINDINGS

- 370 City of Yakima classifications were identified.
- Job placement recommendations were made based on market position, equity groupings and job family progression.
 - Commissioned police & fire classifications were excluded from placement recommendations.
- Report findings identified:
 - 173 classifications (47%) = Within market
 Of these:
 - 27 classifications > market
 - 197 classifications (53%) = Outside of market Of these:
 - 33 classifications ≤ 5%
 - 38 classifications = 5.1%-10%
 - 126 classifications = 10.1% +

CHALLENGES

- It is important to remember that wage data provided is raw data and limited.
- This report is just <u>ONE</u> piece of total compensation analysis.
- Only published, on-line data was used from comparable agencies.
- Limited availability of job classification matches w/comparable municipal agencies.
- Cost of Labor values vs. City's base wage structure.
- Candidate pool considerations:
 - Professional positions regional competition
 - Trade positions local competition

ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

Factors not evaluated:

- 1. Other important employee compensation, such as:
 - · pension and retirement benefits
 - medical, health and wellness benefits
 - · health plan premiums and/or contributions
 - incentive or premium pays
 - shift differentials
 - training or certification reimbursements
 - · all other employee benefits

These factors together comprise an employee's total compensation package.

- 2. Research and findings also did not take into consideration or review the salary structure of the other municipalities or private industries, including step structure or increase intervals.
- 3. City's budget restrictions or funding sources were not considered.

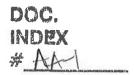
WHEREAS, Under the provisions of YMC Ch. 1.42 the Yakima Planning Commission (YPC) is responsible for the review of these applications and for recommending the approval, modification or denial of each request; and

WHEREAS, On October 5, 2023 an application for a Rezone was submitted by William F. Almon, to Rezone from Professional Business (B-1) to Local Business (B-2), parcel 181328-41405 & 181328-41427 (City File RZ#002-23); and

WHEREAS, The applications were considered complete for processing on November 17, 2023 and public notice was provided, in accordance with the provisions of YMC Ch. 15.23, on November 21, 2023; and

WHEREAS, SEPA Environmental Review was completed with a Determination of Nonsignificance issued on December 27, 2023, which was not appealed (City File SEPA#010-23); and

FINDINGS OF FACT:

1. The applicant requests to Rezone from Professional Business (B-1) to Local Business (B-2).

2. The subject parcels are approximately 6.06 acres in size and are surrounded by

residential and commercial uses and zoning.

3. The City of Yakima Planning Division provided a detailed staff report to the Planning Commission for review during their January 24, 2024 public hearing, with the recommendation of APPROVAL of the proposed rezone.

4. The proposed Rezone from Professional Business (B-1) to Local Business (B-2) is consistent with the applicable approval criteria in YMC § 15.23.030, as follows:

a. Bill Almon Jr., representing the applicant, testified in favor of the proposed rezone.

b. The property is suitable for uses within the B-2 zoning district and will facilitate future commercial development.

c. The B-2 zoning district is an implementing zone of the Community Mixed-Use Future

Land Use Designation.

d. The property is currently capable of being served by all necessary public utilities, or have utilities extended, and can be accessed by public streets.

e. The proposed Rezone is considered compatible with the surrounding neighborhood

and no mitigation is proposed at this time.

f. The public need for this Rezone is to provide for additional developable commercial

5. During YPC deliberation, it was decided to adopt the recommendation as presented by the Planning Division.

CONCLUSIONS

- 1. The Rezone is minor in nature:
- 2. No adverse impacts have been identified;
- 3. No written comments were received from the public;
- 4. This proposal underwent Environmental Review;
- 5. The proposed Rezone from Professional Business (B-1) to Local Business (B-2) is consistent with the Yakima Urban Area Zoning Ordinance and Yakima Comprehensive Plan 2040;

I. <u>DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST:</u>

On October 5, 2023, the City of Yakima Planning Division received an application from William F. Almon for a proposal to rezone two parcels totaling 6.06 acres from Professional Business (B-1) to Local Business (B-2).

II. SUMMARY OF DECISION:

The Administrative Official recommends approval of the Rezone, subject to conditions.

III. FACTS:

A. Processing

- 1. The applications for a Rezone and Environmental Review were received on October 5, 2023.
- 2. The applications were deemed complete for processing on November 17, 2023.
- 3. The applications are being processed under YMC Ch. 15.23 (Amendments and Rezones) and YMC Ch. 6.88 (Environmental Review).
- 4. Pursuant to YMC Ch. 1.42 and YMC § 15.23.030, the Planning Commission has the authority to hold a public hearing and provide a recommendation to the City Council on a Rezone request.
- 5. **Public Notice:** In accordance with YMC § 15.11.080 and YMC § 16.05.010, notice was provided for this application as follows:
 - a. The subject property was posted with a land use action sign on November 15, 2023.





- b. A Notice of Application and Environmental Review was sent to the applicant, SEPA agencies, and adjoining property owners within 300 feet of the subject property on November 21, 2023.
- c. A Notice of Public Hearing and Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was sent to the applicant, SEPA agencies, and adjoining property owners within 300 feet of the subject property on December 27, 2023.
- d. A legal notice was provided in the *Yakima Herald-Republic* on December 27, 2023.
- **B.** Environmental Review. This application was required to undergo State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) review because it was not reviewed as part of the previous comprehensive plan update. Notice was mailed on November 21, 2023, and the public comment period ended on December 5, 2023. Two comments were received from SEPA agencies which are outlined in Section IV (C).

C. Current Zoning and Land Use.

- 1. The subject property is approximately 6.06 acres in size and is zoned Professional Business (B-1). The parcels are currently vacant.
- 2. The surrounding properties contain uses and zoning as follows:

<u>Direction</u>	Zoning	Land Use
North	B-1, B-2, R-1	Commercial, Residential
South	B-1	Vacant Land
East	B-1, R-1	Commercial, Residential
West	B-1, R-3	Commercial, Residential

3. Existing Infrastructure

- a. The property is accessed by W. Nob Hill Blvd., which is a Principal Arterial, and S. 48th Ave., which is a Collector Arterial.
- b. The property is served by City of Yakima sewer and Nob Hill Water Association water.

D. Statement of Cause – Rezone:

Pursuant to YMC Ch. 15.23, the applicant provided the following paraphrased statements explaining their reasons for the proposed Rezone:

1. How is the subject property suitable for uses permitted under the proposed zoning?

Minor rezone from B-1 to B-2 meant only to open the property up to more potential uses.

What is the status of the existing land use?

Vacant land with no project in hand.



- 2. How is the rezone request in compliance with and/or how does the request deviate from the Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan?

 Minor rezone that does not deviate from the Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan and does not require a Comp Plan Amendment.
- 3. Are there adequate public facilities, such as traffic capacity, sewer services, potable water, stormwater drainage, schools, fire and police services, and other public services and infrastructure existing on and around the subject property?

 Yes.

Are the existing public facilities capable of supporting the most intensive use of the new (requested) zone? If not, what mitigating measures are going to be implemented to address any short falls in public services that may exist?

Yes.

4. How is the proposed zone change compatible with the existing neighboring uses?

Proposed rezone is complimentary and consistent with neighboring uses and zoning, noting properties to the north are B-2. Applicant is comfortable with B-2 or GC, whichever the Planning Commission prefers.

What mitigating measures are planned to address incompatibility, such as sitescreening, buffering building design, open space, traffic flow alteration, etc.?

Not applicable.

5. What is the public need for the proposed change?

None, rather the proposed change is meant to potentially open the property up to more commercial uses.

IV. FINDINGS

- A. Rezone Approval Criteria: In accordance with the provisions of YMC § 15.23.030 (D) (1-7), recommendations to approve or deny proposed rezones shall include the following consideration:
 - 1. The testimony at the public hearing:

A Notice of Application was mailed to SEPA agencies and all property owners within 300 feet of the subject properties on November 21, 2023, wherein the public was invited to submit written comments on the SEPA application. Notice of the public hearing was sent on December 27, 2023, wherein the public was invited to submit written and/or oral comments at the public hearing on this proposed rezone. No public comments were received prior to the drafting of this recommendation.

Any testimony at the hearing can be considered by the Planning Commission.

2. The suitability of the property in question for uses permitted under the proposed zoning:

The subject property is suitable for uses permitted in the B-2 zoning district.

- 3. The recommendation from interested agencies and departments:

 No agencies or departments have registered any opposition to this rezone.
- 4. The extent to which the proposed amendments are in compliance with and/or deviate from the goals and policies as adopted in the Yakima Urban Area Comprehensive Plan and the intent of this title:

The proposed B-2 zoning district is an implementing zone of the Comprehensive Plan 2040 designation of Community Mixed-Use and is compatible with the following goals and policies:

- Goal 2.1: Establish a development pattern consistent with the community's vision.
 - Policy 2.1.1: Designate the general distribution, location, and extent of the uses of land for housing commerce, recreation, open spaces, public utilities, and facilities and other uses.
 - Policy 2.1.4: Manage and maintain the City's Official Zoning Map to ensure continued consistency with the Future Land Use Map.
- Goal 2.5: Enhance the character, function, and economic vitality of Yakima's arterial corridors and mixed-use centers.
 - Policy 2.5.1: Allow for a mixture of compatible land uses along corridors and within mixed-use designated areas. This includes the integration of multi-family residential and office uses with retail service and commercial uses. Provide zoning and design standards to maintain compatibility between different uses and zones.
 - Policy 2.5.3: Utilize strict access management standards to enhance safety and maintain the arterial traffic functions of the corridor.
- 5. The adequacy of public facilities, such as roads, sewer, water and other required public services:

This property is able to be served by all public utilities necessary to support future development.

6. The compatibility of the proposed zone change and associated uses with neighboring land uses:

The proposed rezone is compatible with existing neighboring land uses. The property is currently vacant.



7. The public need for the proposed change:

The public need for this proposed change is to enable additional land uses on a property already zoned for commercial uses.

B. Development Services Team (DST) Review

On November 21, 2023, a DST meeting was held to discuss the possible impacts of this rezone, and the following comments were received:

1. Nob Hill Water Association

a. Nob Hill Water is available to serve, but a water service will need to be purchased once there is a proposed structure for this lot.

C. Public Comments

No comments from the public were received. Two agency comments were received:

1. Department of Ecology

a. Historical aerial photos indicate your property was occupied by orchard when the pesticide lead arsenate was used, often resulting in shallow soil contamination from lead and/or arsenic. Ecology requires soil sampling if vacant, commercial, industrial, or agricultural properties change land use as there may be an increased risk of exposure to contaminated soil.

Ecology can provide soil sampling at no cost. If sampling shows elevated levels of lead and/or arsenic, cleanup will be required prior to occupancy. There are simple steps that can be taken to reduce risk of exposure and Ecology can provide free technical assistance.

Additionally, Ecology uses Model Remedies to guide cleanup for lead and arsenic pesticide contamination in historical orchards of Central Washington. The Model Remedy document is available at https://apps.ecology.wa.gov/publications/SummaryPages/2109006.html

Compliance with a Model Remedy ensures your project meets the minimum standards of the Model Toxics Control Act, and if implemented as described, your property will be successfully cleaned up to Washington State standards.

2. Washington State Department of Transportation

a. WSDOT Aviation Division reviewed these documents on 11/27/23. Due to the proximity to the Yakima Air Terminal Airport, the FAA requests notification of construction (see https://oeaaa.faa.gov/oeaaa/external/portal.jsp). It is also



recommended that a real estate disclosure of the proximity of the airport be required in all lease or sale agreements.

Staff Response: This is a non-project rezone to rezone a lot from B-1 to B-2. Land use review will be required for any future development proposed to take place on this property, which may or may not require additional agency review.

V. CONCLUSIONS

- A. The Planning Commission has jurisdiction to issue a recommendation on this application to the City Council.
- B. The proposed Rezone is consistent with the goals and policies of the Yakima Comprehensive Plan 2040.
- C. SEPA review resulted in the issuance of a DNS on December 27, 2023. The appeal period for this determination ended on January 10, 2024. No appeal was filed.
- D. No adverse impacts have been identified from granting this approval that cannot be mitigated at the time of future development.
- E. Public notice for this hearing was provided in accordance with zoning ordinance requirements.

VI. RECOMMENDATION

The Community Development Department recommends approval of this non-project Rezone request from Professional Business (B-1) to Local Business (B-2).

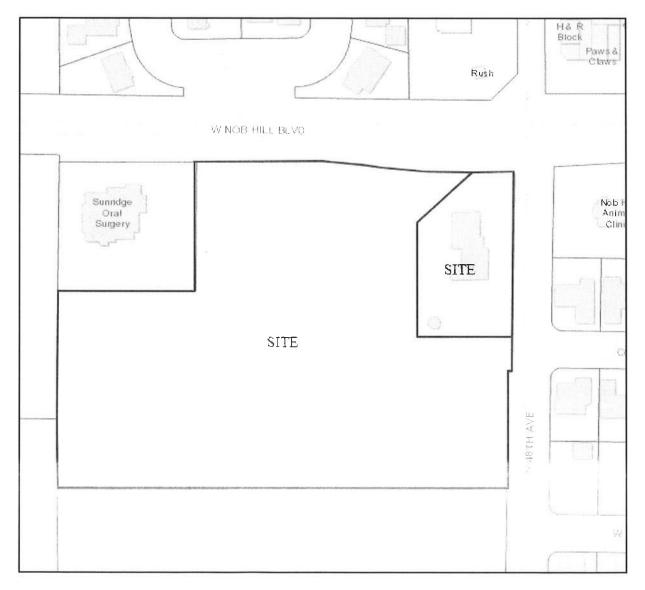

Thank you again for the opportunity to comment during the Notice of Application process for William Almon's proposal. The Department of Ecology (Ecology) would like to add the following comments.

Toxics Cleanup

Historical aerial photos indicate your property was occupied by orchard when the pesticide lead arsenate was used, often resulting in shallow soil contamination from lead and/or arsenic. Ecology **requires** soil sampling if vacant, commercial, industrial, or agricultural properties change land use as there may be an increased risk of exposure to contaminated soil.

Ecology can provide soil sampling at no cost. If sampling shows elevated levels of lead and/or arsenic, cleanup will be required prior to occupancy. There are simple steps that can be taken to reduce risk of exposure and Ecology can provide free technical assistance.

Additionally, Ecology uses Model Remedies to guide cleanup for lead and arsenic pesticide contamination in historical orchards of Central Washington. The Model Remedy document is available at https://apps.ecology.wa.gov/publications/SummaryPages/2109006.html

Compliance with a Model Remedy ensures your project meets the minimum standards of the Model Toxics Control Act, and if implemented as described, your property will be successfully cleaned up to Washington State standards.

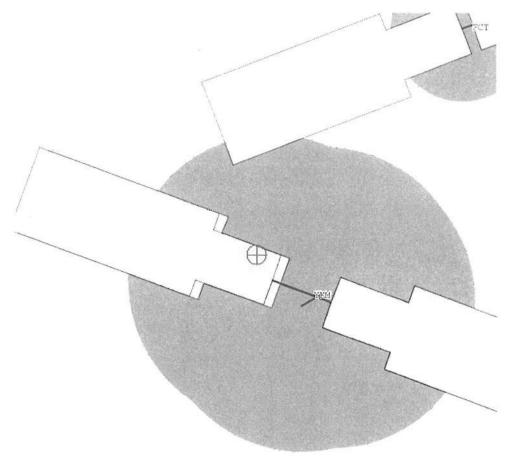

YAKIMA PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION TO THE YAKIMA CITY COUNCIL FOR AMENDMENT TO YAKIMA MUNICIPAL CODE February 14, 2024

WHEREAS, Pursuant to RCW 36.70A.130(1) the City is required to take legislative action to review and revise its development regulations in accordance with the Growth Management Act; and

WHEREAS, These updates to Yakima Municipal Code (YMC) Title 14 are considered to be a non-project application without a specific use or site plan to be considered; and

WHEREAS, Under the provisions of YMC Ch. 1.42 the Yakima Planning Commission is responsible for the review of amendments to the City's Yakima Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision Ordinance, and other land use matters, and for recommending the approval, modification, or denial of each amendment; and

WHEREAS, The Yakima Planning Commission held a study session to review the proposed amendments on January 10, 2024; and

WHEREAS, All required public notice for these amendments were provided, in accordance with the provisions of YMC Ch. 16.10, on January 24, 2024; and

WHEREAS, SEPA Environmental Review for these updates was considered with the Preliminary Determination of Nonsignificance issued on January 24, 2024 being retained on February 8, 2024; and

WHEREAS, The Yakima Planning Commission held an open record public hearing on February 14, 2024 to hear testimony from the public, consider the amendments, and provide a recommendation to the Yakima City Council;

Now therefore, the Yakima City Planning Commission presents the following findings and recommendation to the Yakima City Council:

Based upon a review of the information contained in the application, staff report, exhibits, and other evidence presented at an open record public hearing held on **February 14, 2024**, the Planning Commission makes the following:

PURPOSE AND DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS:

The City of Yakima Planning Division is proposing non-project minor amendments to the City of Yakima's Municipal Code Title 14. The first approval in the Preliminary Short Plat/Long Plat process includes a decision with various requirements such as frontage improvements and utility connections. Before the Final Short Plat/Long Plat can be signed off by the City Engineer and Subdivision Administrator, those requirements have to be completed or bonded for.

There are currently two locations within the Subdivision Ordinance that discuss this process, which are not consistent. The following changes remove ambiguity in the interpretation of multiple code sections by providing consistency and clarification by outlining the process and review criteria in a single section.

Proposed Amendment Sections:

14.05.200 Allowance of bond in lieu of actual construction of improvements prior to approval of short plat or final plat.

- A. The subdivision or short subdivision applicant may request, as an alternative to actual construction of any required improvements, previde that they be allowed to provide a surety bond or other secure method providing for and securing to the city the actual construction of required improvements within a specified period of time and expressed in a bond or other appropriate instrument establishing such security. Any bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements authorized and approved pursuant to subsection B herein shall specify the improvements covered and the schedule for completion.
- B. In cases of subdivision or short subdivision, the request for bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall be subject to approval by the city engineer and city attorney prior to approval of the final plat by the administrator and cannot be appealed. In cases of short subdivisions, the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall be subject to approval by the city engineer and city attorney prior to approval of the final short plat by the administrator and cannot be appealed. The decision to approve or deny the request for the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements by the city engineer and city attorney cannot be appealed. In no case shall the amount of the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements be less than one hundred ten fifteen percent of the estimated actual cost of the improvements based upon the approved civil engineering design of the required improvements.

14.20.130 Preliminary plat—Allowance of bond in lieu of actual improvements prior to approval of final plat.

As an alternative to construction of required improvements prior to final plat approval, the subdivision applicant may request to obtain provide that they be allowed to provide a surety bond or other secure method acceptable to the city council engineer and city attorney pursuant to YMC 14.05.200. The request shall be approved or denied in accordance with YMC 14.05.200, which provides for and secures to the city the actual construction of the improvements.

B. The value of the bond or security shall be one hundred ten percent of the estimated cost of the improvements. The estimated cost shall be based upon the approved civil engineering design of the required improvements.

C. An application for use of a surety bond or other method of security shall be made to the city engineer and shall describe the method of security to be provided and the estimated cost of the required improvements. The application, including the estimated cost of improvements and the general terms of the security agreement, shall be subject to review and approval by the city





engineer and the city attorney, who shall notify the subdivision applicant of tentative approval or rejection of the application within fourteen days after its filing and cannot be appealed.

D. After tentative approval of an application has been given by the city engineer and the city attorney as provided in subsection C of this section, the subdivision applicant shall submit the bond or other method of security to the city engineer for final review and approval.

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. This project underwent Environmental Review with the Determination of Nonsignificance being retained on February 8, 2024.
- 2. Public notice was provided in accordance with YMC Ch. 16.10, with a Notice of Public Hearing and Legal Ad Publication in the Yakima Herald newspaper on January 24, 2024.
- 3. The proposed amendments are consistent with the following Goals and Policies of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan:

Goal 2.1: Establish a development pattern consistent with the community's vision. Policy 2.1.6: Adopt coordinated development regulations that facilitate Yakima's preferred land use pattern (e.g. allowed density, uses, and site provisions)

- Refine the land use code on an ongoing basis to make it user-friendly by employing simple language, easy to read charts, and illustrative graphics.
- Monitor and refine the land use code as needed to facilitate the preferred land use pattern and development character.
- Integrate an appropriate balance of predictability and flexibility when updating development regulations that allow ease of administration and interpretation and offer optional ways of meeting requirements when possible.

YAKIMA PLANNING COMMISSION'S CONCLUSIONS

- 1. No adverse impacts have been identified;
- 2. The proposed updates underwent Environmental Review;
- 3. The proposed amendments are consistent with the Yakima Urban Area Zoning Ordinance and 2040 Comprehensive Plan.

Based on the testimony and evidence presented during this afternoon's public hearing, it was moved and seconded that Planning staff draft findings of fact and forward a recommendation of approval to the Yakima City Council. The motion carried unanimously.

RECOMMENDATION TO CITY COUNCIL

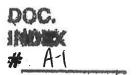
The City of Yakima Planning Division is proposing non-project minor amendments to the City of Yakima's Municipal Code Title 14. The first approval in the Preliminary Short Plat/Long Plat process includes a decision with various requirements such as frontage improvements and utility connections. Before the Final Short Plat/Long Plat can be signed off by the City Engineer and Subdivision Administrator, those requirements have to be completed or bonded for.

There are currently two locations within the Subdivision Ordinance that discuss this process, which are not consistent. The following changes remove ambiguity in the interpretation of multiple code sections by providing consistency and clarification by outlining the process and review criteria in a single section.

Proposed Amendment Sections:

14.05.200 Allowance of bond in lieu of actual construction of improvements prior to approval of short plat or final plat.

- A. The subdivision or short subdivision applicant may request, as an alternative to actual construction of any required improvements, provide that they be allowed to provide a surety bond or other secure method providing for and securing to the city the actual construction of required improvements within a specified period of time and expressed in a bond or other appropriate instrument establishing such security. Any bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements authorized and approved pursuant to subsection B herein shall specify the improvements covered and the schedule for completion.
- In cases of subdivision or short subdivision, the request for bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall be subject to approval by the city engineer and city attorney prior to approval of the final plat by the administrator and cannot be appealed. In cases of short subdivisions, the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements shall be subject to approval by the city engineer and city attorney prior to approval of the final short plat by the administrator and cannot be appealed. The decision to approve or deny the request for the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements by the city engineer and city attorney cannot be appealed. In no case shall the amount of the bond or other method of securing actual construction of required improvements be less than one hundred ten-fifteen percent of the





estimated actual cost of the improvements based upon the approved civil engineering design of the required improvements.

14.20.130 Preliminary plat—Allowance of bond in lieu of actual improvements prior to approval of final plat.

A. As an alternative to construction of required improvements prior to final plat approval, the subdivision applicant may request to obtain provide that they be allowed to provide a surety bond or other secure method acceptable to the city council engineer and city attorney pursuant to YMC 14.05.200. The request shall be approved or denied in accordance with YMC 14.05.200, which provides for and secures to the city the actual construction of the improvements.

B. The value of the bond or security shall be one hundred ten percent of the estimated cost of the improvements. The estimated cost shall be based upon the approved civil engineering design of the required improvements.

C. An application for use of a surety bond or other method of security shall be made to the city engineer and shall describe the method of security to be provided and the estimated cost of the required improvements. The application, including the estimated cost of improvements and the general terms of the security agreement, shall be subject to review and approval by the city engineer and the city attorney, who shall notify the subdivision applicant of tentative approval or rejection of the application within fourteen days after its filing and cannot be appealed.

D. After tentative approval of an application has been given by the city engineer and the city attorney as provided in subsection C of this section, the subdivision applicant shall submit the bond or other method of security to the city engineer for final review and approval.

The proposed text amendments are consistent with the following goals and policies of the Comprehensive Plan 2040

- Refine the land use code on an ongoing basis to make it user-friendly by employing simple language, easy to read charts, and illustrative graphics.
- Monitor and refine the land use code as needed to facilitate the preferred land use pattern and development character.
- Integrate an appropriate balance of predictability and flexibility when updating development regulations that allow ease of administration and interpretation and offer optional ways of meeting requirements when possible.
